Make Final Count Of United Appeal

The final tabulation of the United Appeal drive held during the week of October 19 to 24 showed that the amount contributed was two hundred sixty-two dollars and seventy-one cents.

The United Appeal will receive one hundred eighteen dollars and twenty-two cents, the Junior Red Cross: twenty-three dollars and sixty-four cents, and T.B. and Polio: forty-seven dollars and twenty-nine cents. Ten per cent of the total amount contributed has been set aside for an emergency.

The Student Council headed the drive. Envelopes were given to each student in which to put their contributions.

The following fourteen Red Feather agencies participated: Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Friendly House, YMCA, YWCA, Dental Clinic, Hospital Bureau, Milk Fund, Richland County Mental Health Association, Salvation Army, St. Vincent de Paul Society, Vision Aid, Visiting Nurses, and United Defense Fund. Also included in the drive were: J. C. Heart Fund, Junior Red Cross, American Cancer Society, and Muscular Dystrophy.

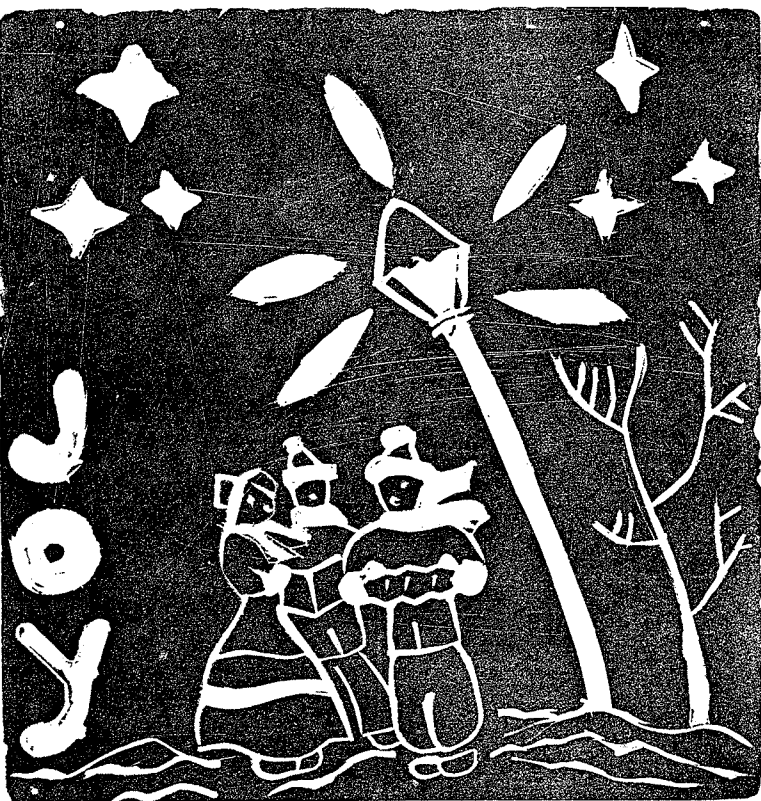

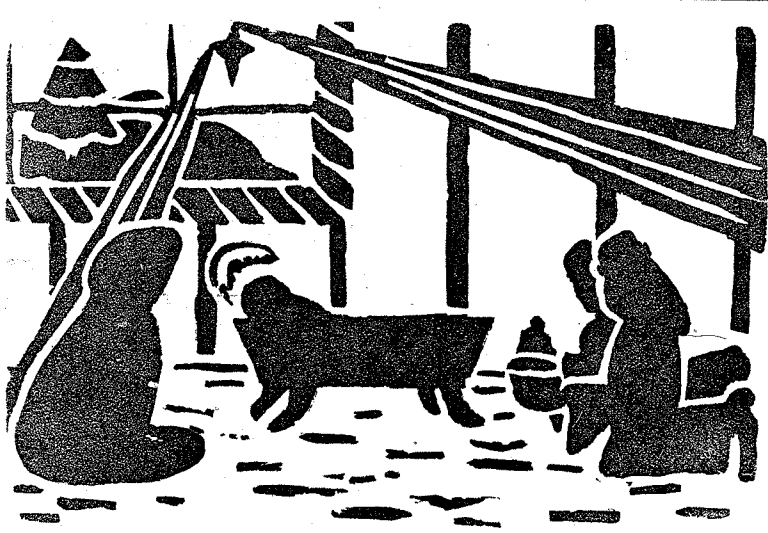

Christmas Customs Vary With Country

The celebration of Christmas is found in all Christian countries. Where and when the Christmas festival began is not definitely known. These are some of the ways other countries spend the holiday.

In Yugoslavia, the second and first Sundays before Christmas are known as Mother and Father's Day. The children quietly tie their parents to chairs and then demand their Christmas gifts. Not until after they have received them are their parents released.
