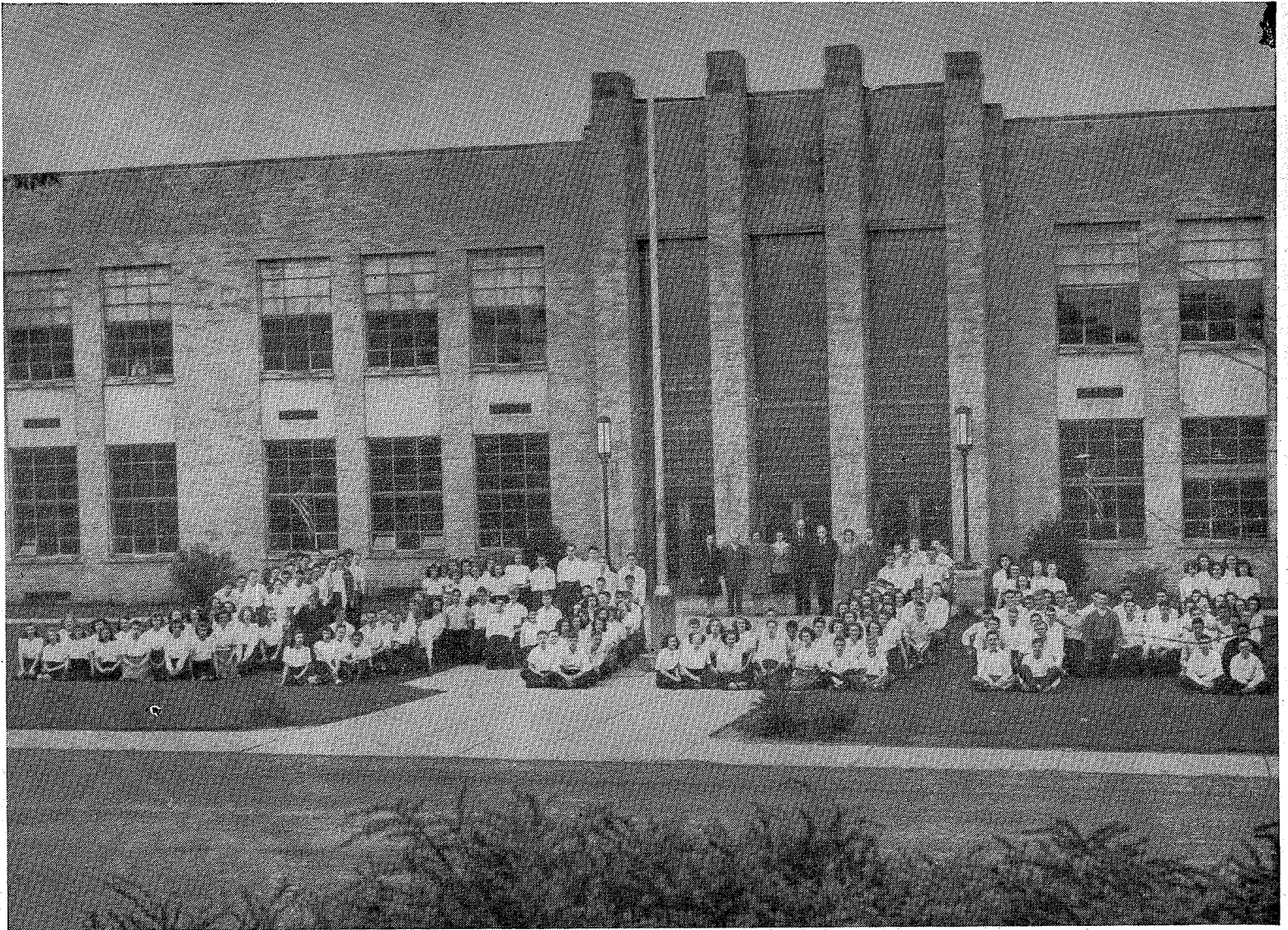

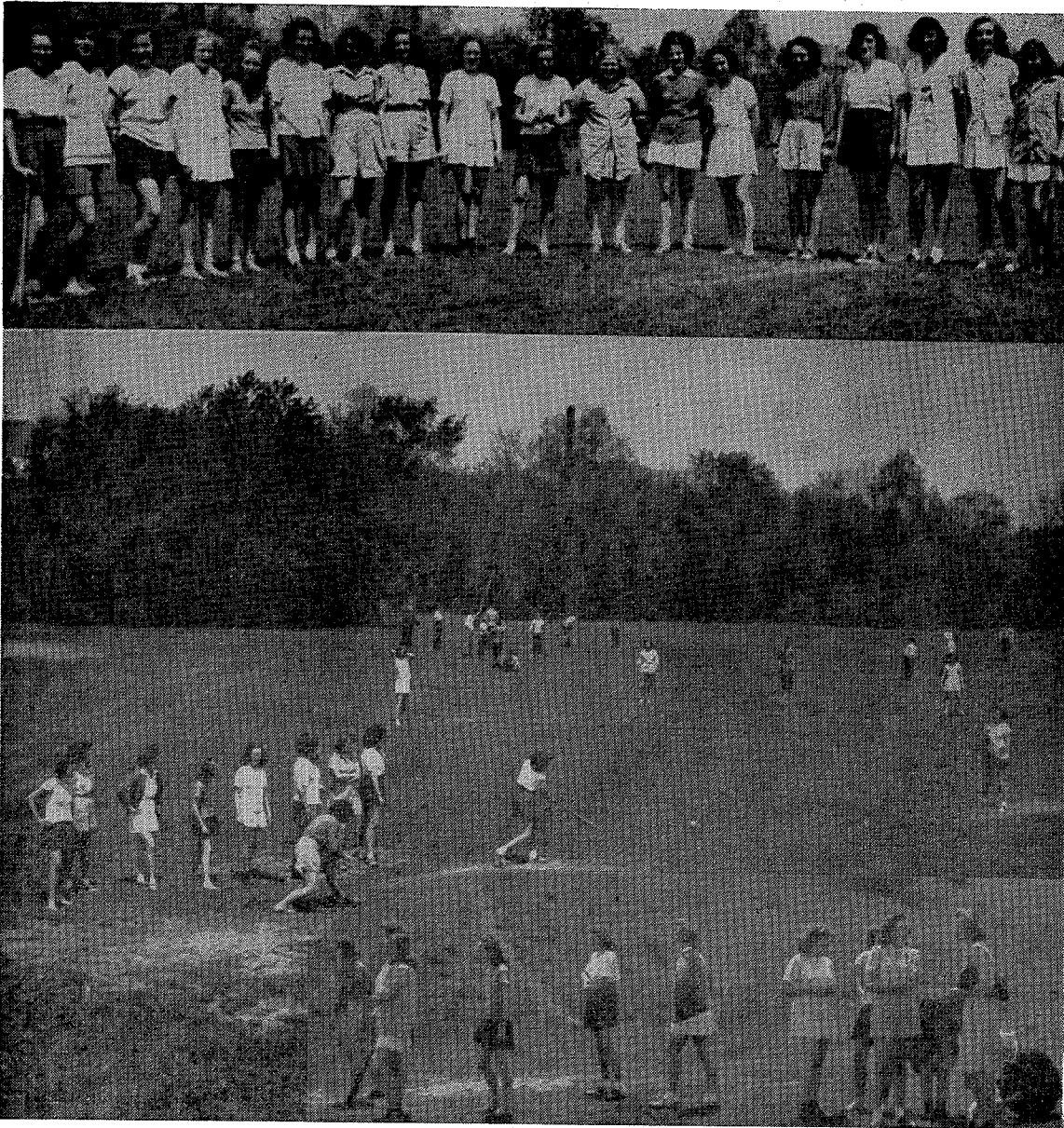

Taking first in eight out of twelve events, Appleseed's Pioneers defeated Ashland High's reserve team, 55-45, on the high school cinder path. Ferguson's 9 ft. 9 in. effort in the pole vault was his highest this year and the outstanding event of the meet. Appleseed monopolized the high jump with McKown, Ferguson, and Weaver tying for first with 5 ft. 4 in. Appleseed took sixteen individual places and the 440-yard relay, including eight firsts, four seconds, and four thirds. McKown took firsts in the 100-yard dash and high jump and one third for top scoring honors.

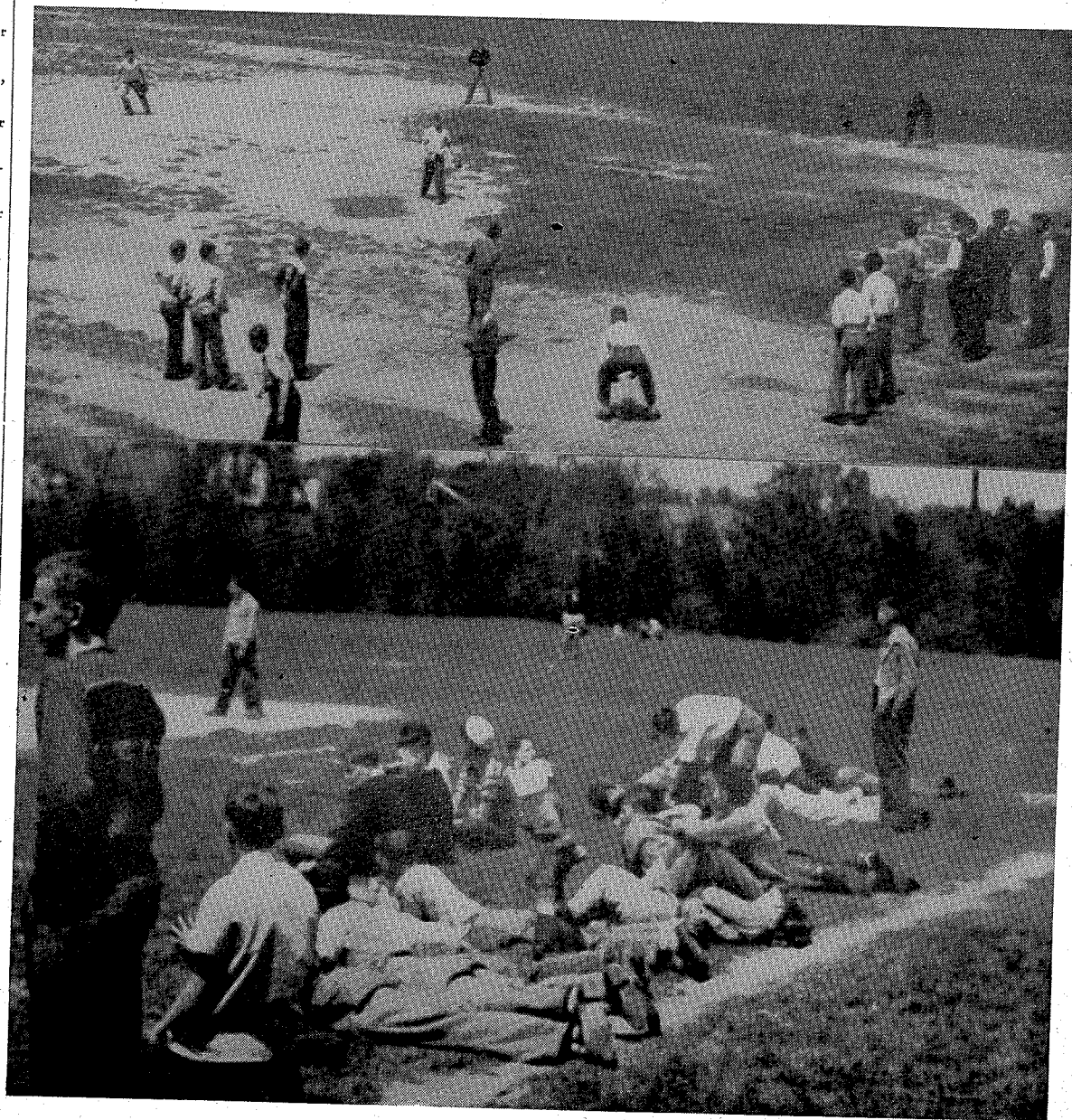

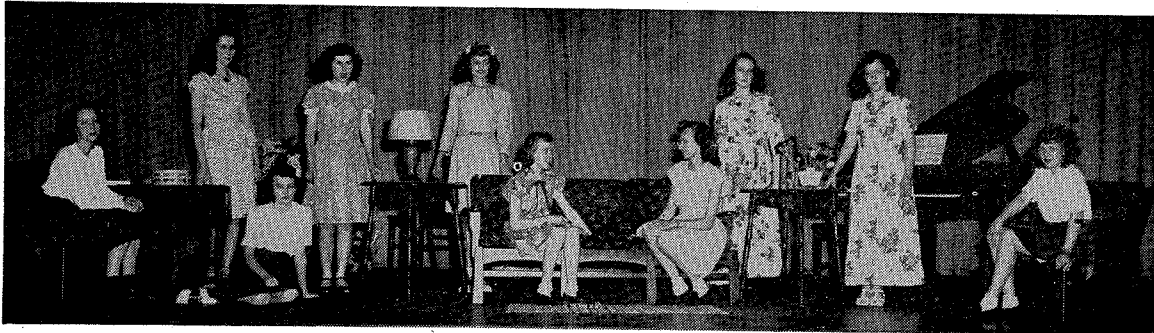

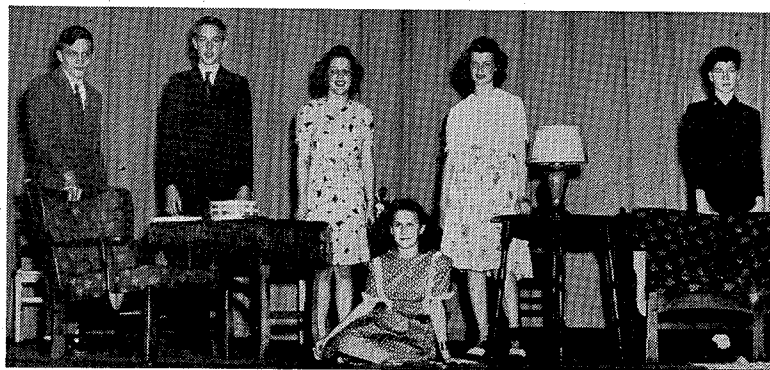
