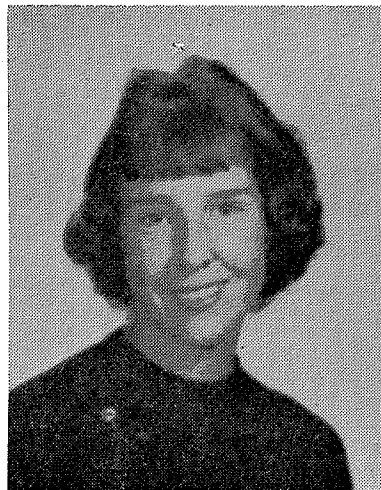

This program promises to be one of the highlights of the concert series. Tickets are available from Huber Furniture Co., Smucker Studio, and members of the chorus.

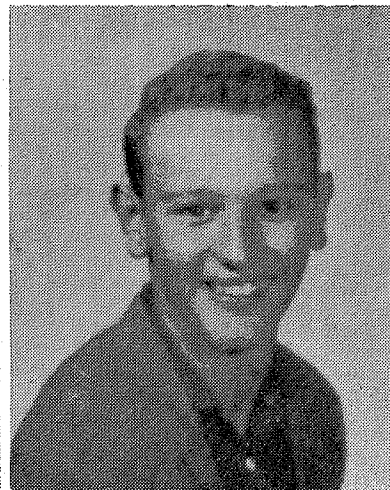
### Beal, Lohman Win DAR-SAR Award; Pins, Certificates Awarded Today

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### Berry, Maccioli Teachers of Year

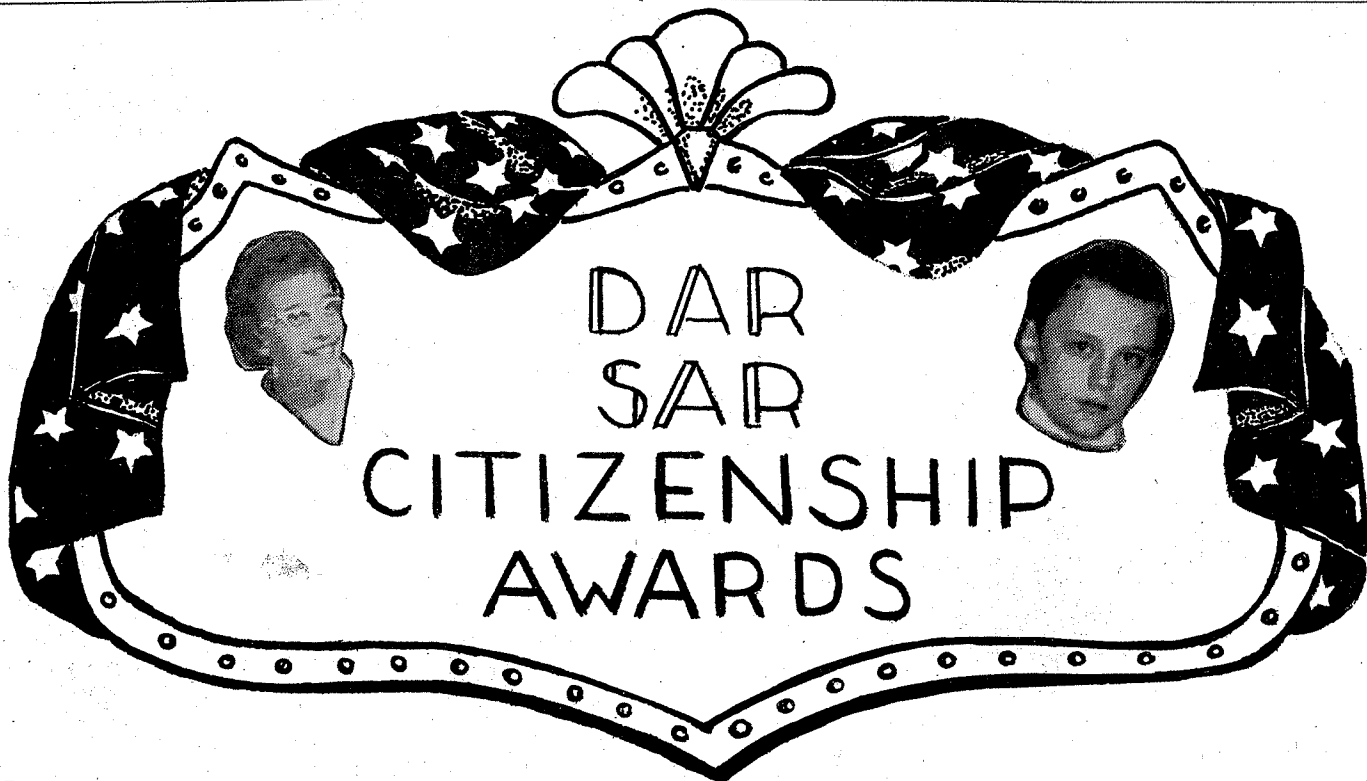

The week of May 5, the freshmen went for a tour of Mansfield Senior High. Their first impression was the size of the school: "It's so huge! How will I ever find my way around?"

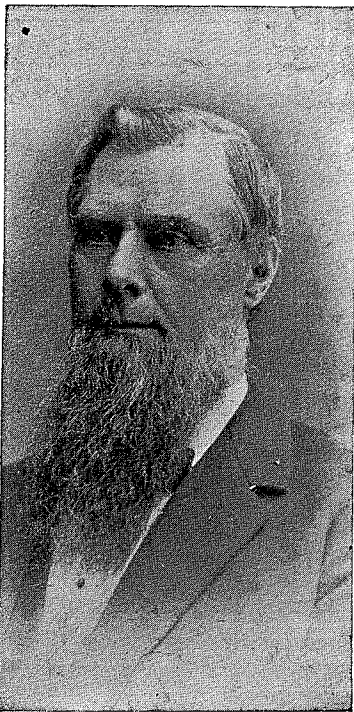
This is probably how the future seventh graders felt when they came to view Simpson the week of May 14: "It's so different from grade school." "Will the teachers help us if we happen to get lost?"

## SCHOOL NAMED FOR EDUCATOR



Have you ever noticed the picture of the bearded man above the mantel in the library? If so, have you ever wondered who he might be? This man is John Simpson, for whom our school was named, was Superintendent of Schools in Mansfield from September, 1873-1893. He was born in 1829 in Richland County and lived on his father's farm.

### Education Limited

His early education was limited and when, quite young, he attended the Vermillion Institute at Hayesville, Ohio. He continued for only one term, but displayed special aptitude in his school work and showed a strong desire to improve his scholastic opportunities. After leaving the Institute, he taught in district schools in order to make enough money to return to school where he continued his studies, and at the same time served as a tutor.

### Taught in Alabama

Fearing that he had a lung con-

dition, he moved to Alabama, where he taught school for three years. Not content with the privileges he had already enjoyed, he earned Jefferson College in Pennsylvania as a member of the Senior Class and was graduated in 1858. He then became a member of the Vermillion Institute's faculty and received his Master's Degree from Jefferson College in 1861. In a short time, he was made Professor of the institution, a position of Mathematics and Astronomy at the college, and subsequently became President of the institution, a position which he held until 1871, when he accepted the position of principal of the ungraded schools in Mansfield.

He was chosen superintendent in 1873, a position he held until 1893.

The Degree of Doctor of Philosophy was conferred upon him by the University of Wooster, for his honorable and responsible position. He was affiliated with all the Masonic bodies, Odd Fellows Lodge and an Elder in the Presbyterian Church. He took a deep and active interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of Mansfield and withheld his support from no movement or measure which he believed would contribute to the public good. He had faith in its future and pride in its growth and attainments.

### Outstanding in Science

Dr. Simpson was recognized as outstanding in science, in mathematics and astronomy and his knowledge of higher sciences was comprehensive and exact. His success as an educator gained him prominence among the leading instructors of the state, and the proficiency of the Mansfield Schools became widely known.

"A scholarly, thoughtful and progressive school man, a wise and energetic administrator, a man of irreproachable character. I am well acquainted with Dr. John Simpson's reputation as an educator," stated H. M. James, Tacoma, Washington, shortly before the death of Dr. Simpson on March 5, 1899.

This is the man whose picture hangs in the place of prominence in the library, and the man for whom our school, John Simpson Junior High was named.

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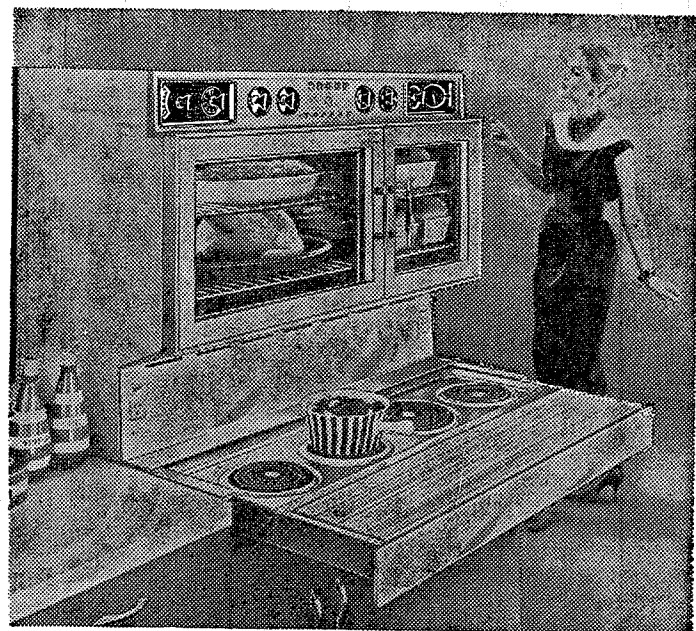
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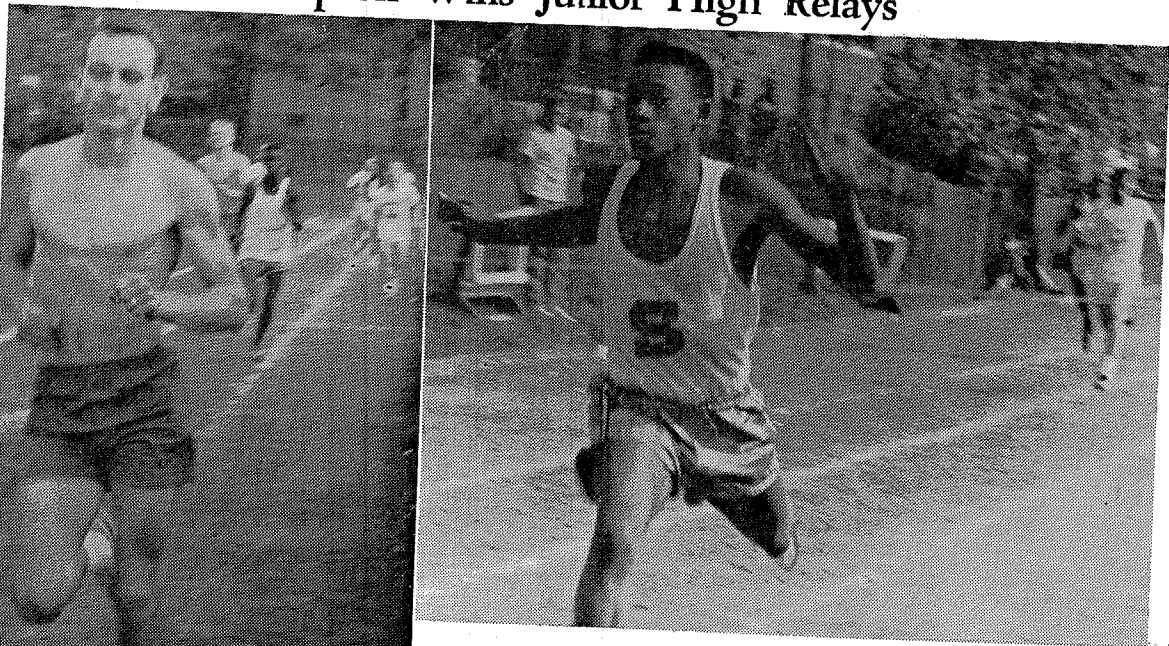
