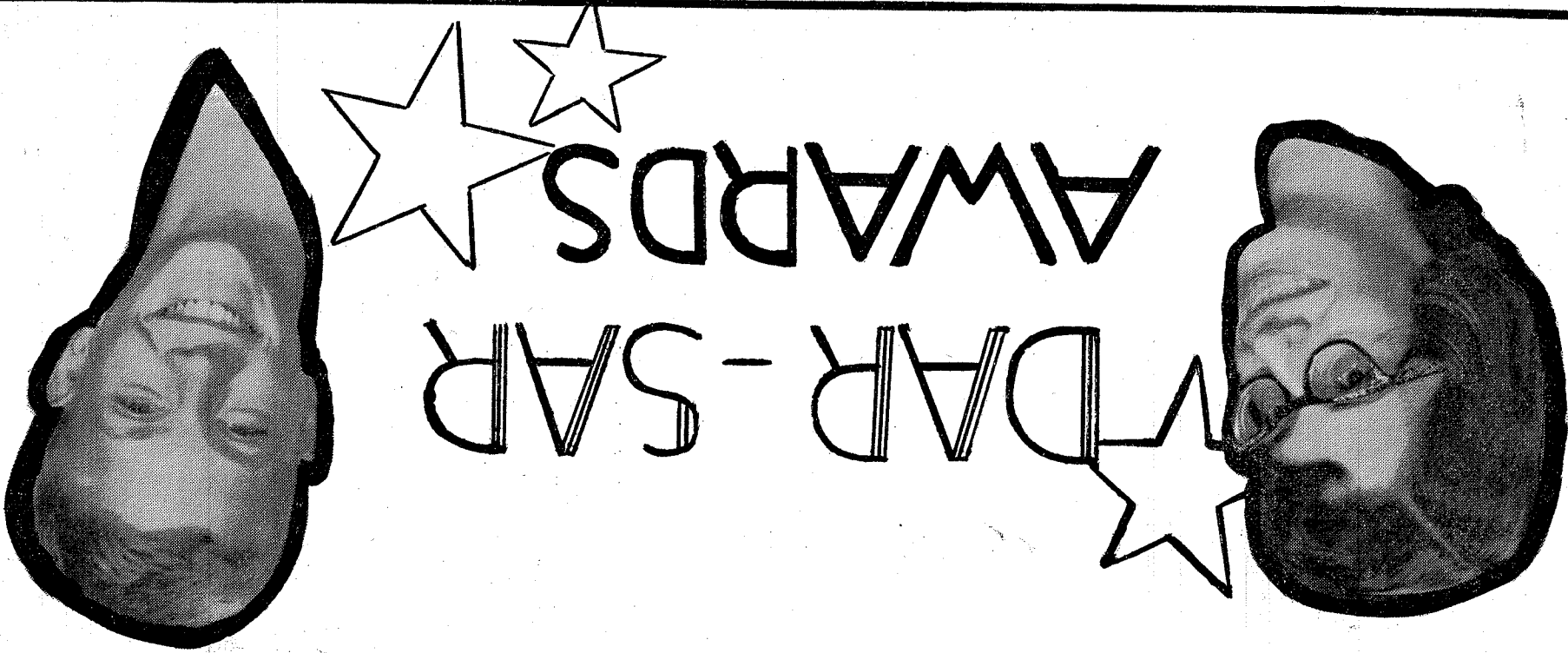


Linn And Squire Receive Top Honors

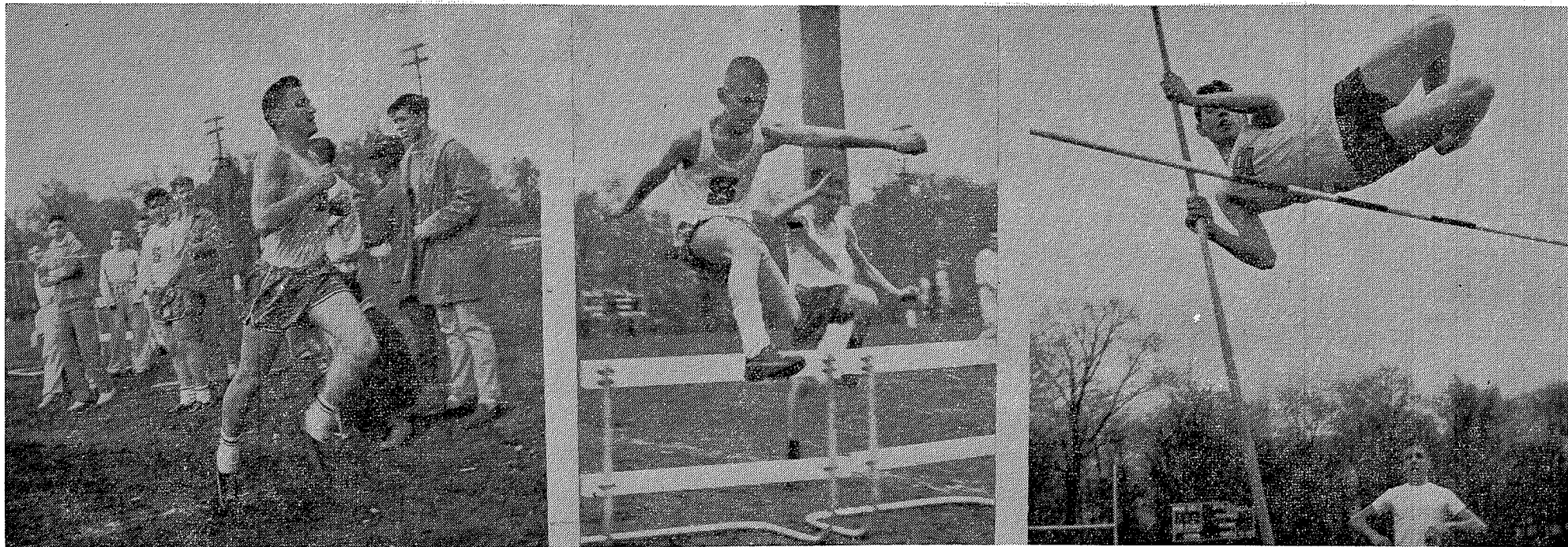
