

BOND ISSUE PASSES

The proposed \$6,000,000 school bond issue was passed on November 4, when 11,187 citizens turned out at the polls to vote. The issue was passed by 64.8%; 7239 voting for, and 3948 voting against.

Dr. John Rinehart, superintendent of schools, expresses his gratitude to the citizens of Mansfield by saying, "No matter how hard I would try, I would never be able to express my heart felt thanks or the deep gratitude I feel to the city of Mansfield."

The existing pay-as-you-go levy, voted last year for school construction, will be replaced by the bond issue at the beginning of the

A senior high school, two junior highs, and two elementary schools will be built. The first revenue will be collected January, 1960.

The school board President, Dr. Max Garber states, "It now remains for the school board to proceed as quickly as possible to bring the proposed facilities to reality and this we shall do at the most rapid pace, concomitant with good planning."

Bellman, Gillet, and Richards from Toledo, have been chosen as the architects for the two junior high schools, and the one senior high. Mr. Thomas Zaugg of Mansfield is planning the two elementary schools.

Even before talk about the bond issue started, architects were being interviewed for the job of designing the schools. As soon as the architects knew that they had been chosen to do the schools they began work on them.
