

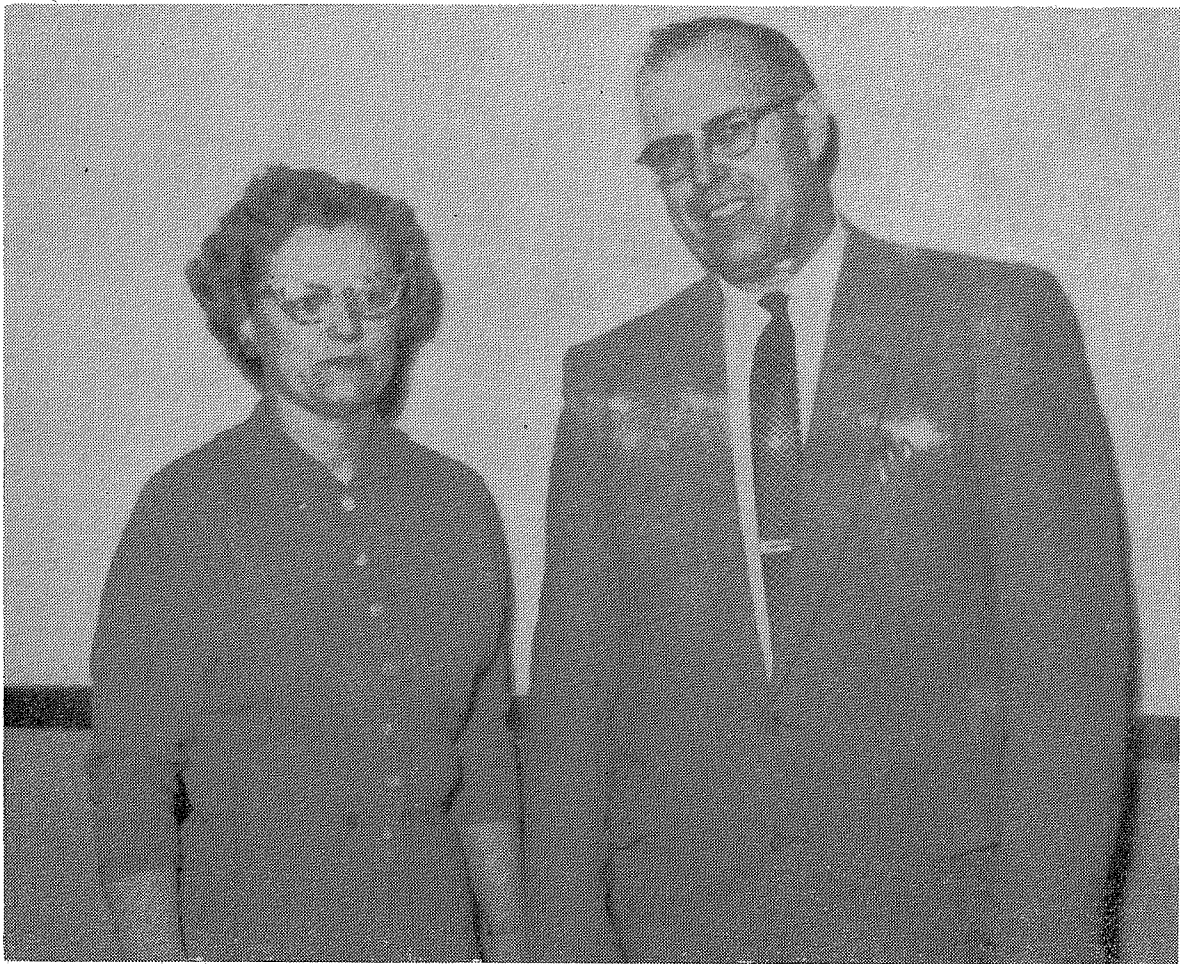

## Appleseed Celebrates 20th

On January 29, 1940, the junior high schools had their first glimpses of the inside of the then recently finished Johnny Appleseed Junior High School. They also witnessed the improvements made to John Simpson Junior High School on that date, 20 years ago.

At a meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce club rooms, February 15, 1940, the Johnny Appleseed Parent-Teacher Association was organized. Presiding over the assembly was Mrs. I. W. Basinger, who was then district director of P.T.A. councils. The officers were elected at this meeting and a committee to write the by-laws was appointed.

Our school was dedicated on March 5, 1940, and the first *Press*, dedicated to Johnathan Chapman, was issued on the same day.

Johnny Appleseed's first principal was Mr. Glenn G. Rohleder who still resides in Mansfield.

Only two of the original faculty are still teaching here. They are Mr. J. J. Thoms and Miss Elena Percy. Mr. Thoms and Miss Percy agree that the years at Appleseed have been happy ones with many pleasant memories. It's

rewarding to watch the youngsters develop from the rather awkward seventh grade stage to a more or less self reliant young individuals at the end of the junior high school years. Mr. Thoms says he has especially enjoyed working with the *Press* Staff for the past eighteen years. "We both wish the entire school, students and faculty alike, much happiness and success in the years to come," say these teachers.

## SCIENCE AND MATH FAIR

Appleseed's first Math and Science Fair was held in the Appleseed cafeteria on March the tenth. The display of projects was open to the public from 7:30 to 9:00 in the evening.

This year is the first year Mansfield junior high schools have attempted to hold a science fair separately from Senior High.

"The primary purpose of the science fair is to give students an opportunity to become well acquainted with some problems in science, and to give them an opportunity to use the scientific method of reasoning," explained Mr. Glen Myers, the chairman of the science fair here at Appleseed and a member of the committee which is in charge of the science fairs in other Mansfield schools.

Spaces for 140 entries in the math and science fields are provided. An interesting study on blood types, electromagnets, and charts accompanied by reports, are a few ideas being attempted by students who competed in the science department. Displays on geometric figures, quiz boards, and a model school building complete with plans are included in some of the ideas for the math section.

All of the entries were judged and rated either superior, excellent, good, or satisfactory. The judges were, for the most part, math and science teachers from Simpson along with some engineers and other qualified individuals from the Mansfield area. The projects that receive superior ratings are shown at the senior high school Science Fair.

Nine of the superior projects will be eligible for display at the Senior High Fair. Some of those projects may qualify for entry in the district science fair at Tiffin, Ohio.

## The Man Behind The Day

St. Patrick was born at Bannarm which may have been in England near the Severn estuary, or in Scotland near the modern city of Dumbarton. His father was a Roman Catholic of high rank.

Saint Patrick had a romantic life, full of adventures. At the age of sixteen he was captured by Irish marauders and sold as a slave. He was set to tending the flocks of a chieftain in Ulster and the six years of slavery make him a devoted Christian. He escaped to France and became a monk. There he devoted himself to religious work and to study at the Monastery of St. Martins at Tours.

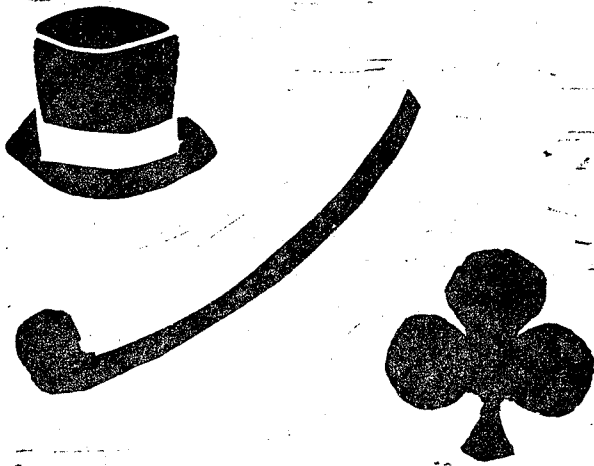
His labors were so successful that he came to be known as one who "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian." Over 300 churches were founded by St. Patrick, and more than 120,000 people were baptised. Along with his companions he was taken captive twelve times by the Druids. He lived until March 17, 1493, and was buried in a shrine in the place on which later years the Cathedral of Downs was built.

Many traditions have grown up about the life of St. Patrick. One which is said to be true is that, in an effort to explain to the Irish people the mystery of the Trinity, he used a shamrock as an illustration. St. Patrick said that the three leaves represented the three persons of the Trinity and the stem on which they grew represented the Godhead, thus the unity of the three in one.

The story of the snake is an interesting one. St. Patrick had banished all the snakes from Ireland except one old serpent, which refused to leave. St. Patrick, according to the story, made a box and invited the serpent to enter it. The serpent objected saying that the box was not large enough to hold him. After a long discussion, the serpent finally agreed to enter the box to prove that it was too small. As soon as the serpent was safely inside, the saint shut the lid, fastened it, and threw the box into the sea.

So, you see, when we celebrate March 17th as St. Patrick's Day, we actually commemorate the death of this truly great man.

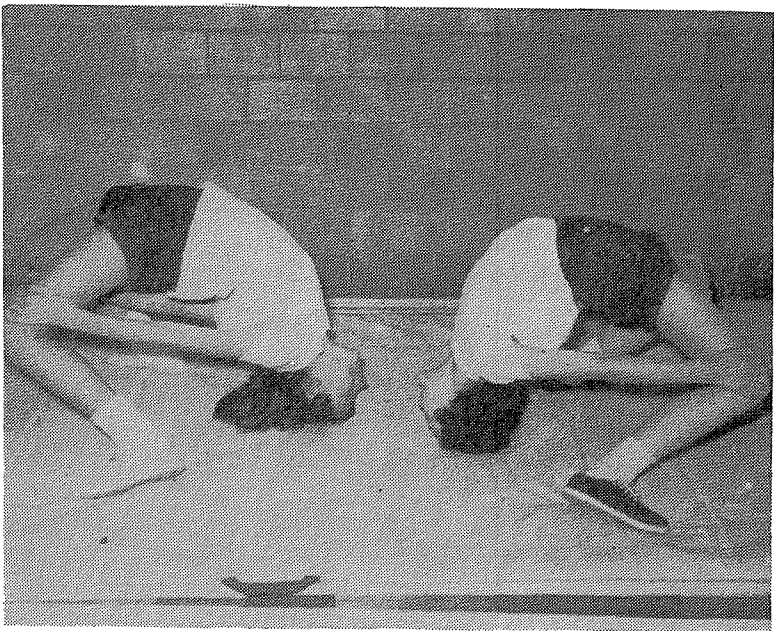
The Juniors from Appleseed are: Dave Beard, Marc Wolfe, Jeff Smalley, Howard Forrest, and Warren Knorr.

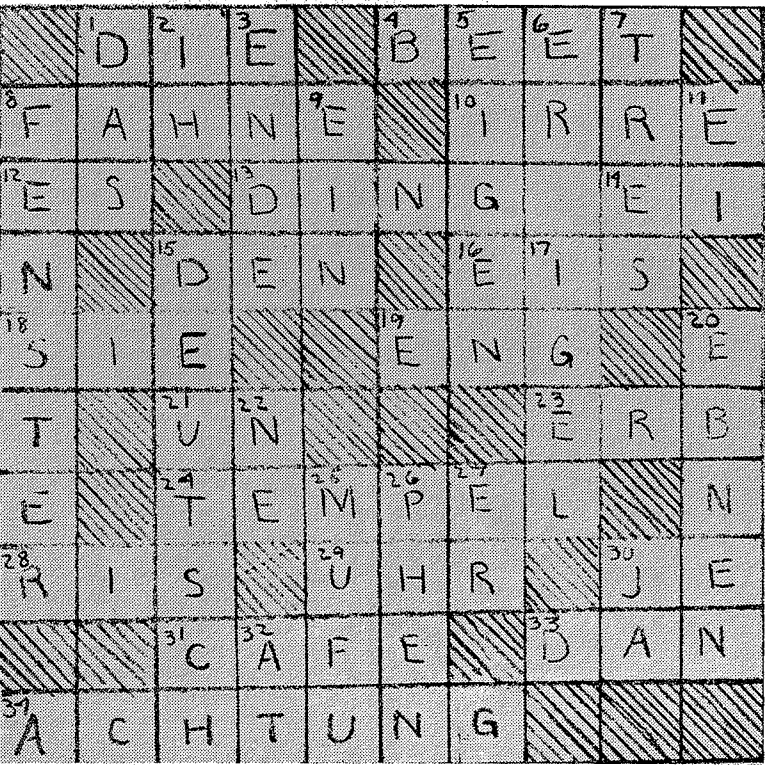
