Appleseed Celebrates 20th

On January 29, 1940, the junior rewarding to watch the youngsters high schools had their first glimpses of the inside of the then recently finished Johnny Appleseed Junior High School. They also witnessed the improvements made to John Simpson Junior High School on that date, 20 years ago.

At a meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce club rooms, February 15, 1940, the Johnny Appleseed Parent-Teacher Association was organized. Presiding over the assembly was Mrs. I. W. Basinger, who was then district director of P.T.A. councils. The officers were elected at this meeting and a committee to write the by-laws was appointed.

Our school was dedicated on March 5, 1940, and the first Press, dedicated to Johnathan Chapman, was issued on the same day.

Johnny Appleseed's first principal was Mr. Glenn G. Rohleder who still resides in Mansfield.

Only two of the original faculty are still teaching here. They are Mr. J. J. Thoms and Miss Ellena Percy. Mr. Thoms and Miss Percy agree that the years at Appleseed have been happy ones with many pleasant memories. It's purchased at Appleseed.

Some of the activities of the club will include: talks, reports, films, and slides. There will be three meetings.


The first meeting will be on April 4, 1960, at 3:30 P.M., after school, in room 214.

SCIENCE AND MATH FAIR

Appleseed's first Math and Science Fair was held in the Appleseed cafeteria on March the tenth. The display of projects was open to the public from 7:30 to 9:00 in the evening.

This year is the first year Mansfield junior high schools have attempted to hold a science fair separately from Senior High.

"The primary purpose of the science fair is to give students an opportunity to become well acquainted with some problems in science, and to give them an opportunity to use the scientific method of reasoning," explained Mr. Glen Myers, the chairman of the science fair here at Applseed and a member of the committee which is in charge of the science fairs in other Mansfield schools.

Spaces for 140 entries in the math and science fields are provided. An interesting study on blood types, electromagnets, and charts accompanied by reports, are a few ideas being attempted by students who competed in the science department. Displays on geometric figures, quiz boards, and a model school building complete with plans are included in some of the ideas for the math section.

All of the entries were judged and rated either superior, excellent, good, or satisfactory. The judges were, for the most part, math and science teachers from Simpson along with some engineers and other qualified individuals from the Mansfield area. The projects that receive superior ratings are shown at the senior high school

Nine of the superior projects will be eligble for display at the Senior High Fair. Some of those projects may qualify for entry in the district science fair at Tiffin, Ohio.




