Students Attend Two Assemblies

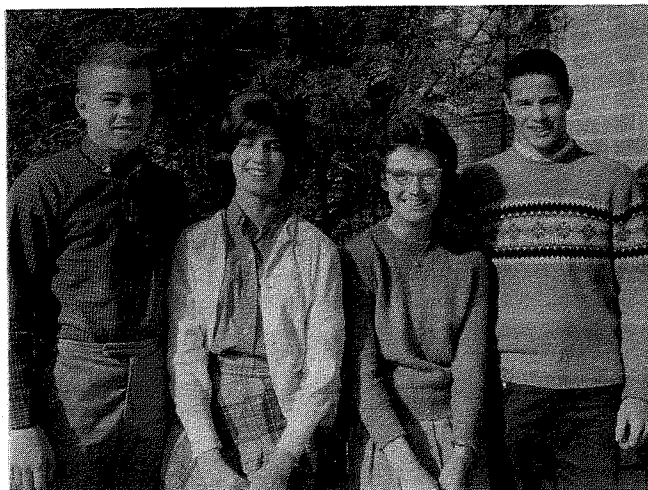

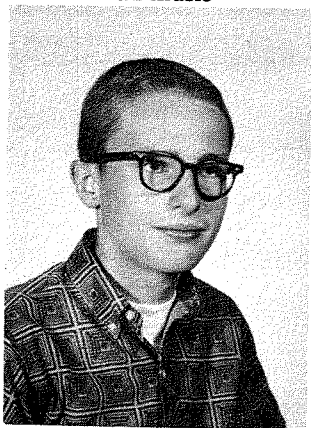

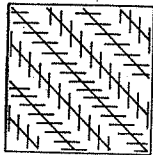
Room 114 Wins League
