The name of the operetta is "The Princess Chooses a Kitty".


The story opens when the Town Crier has just announced the arrival of a most remarkable family of kittens. All the village children are listening when a run-away Princess comes in.



This proves that in this United States either the wealthy or the lowly may become president.


