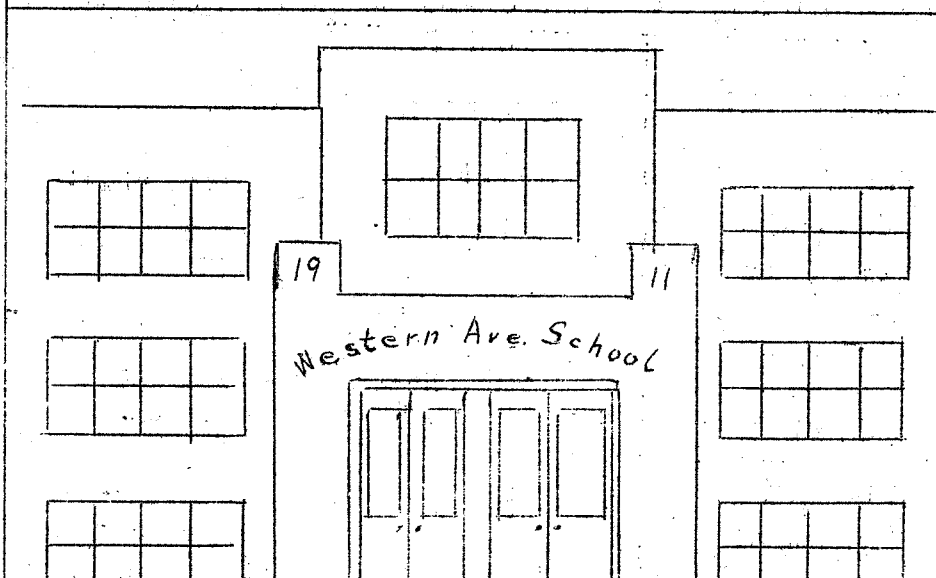

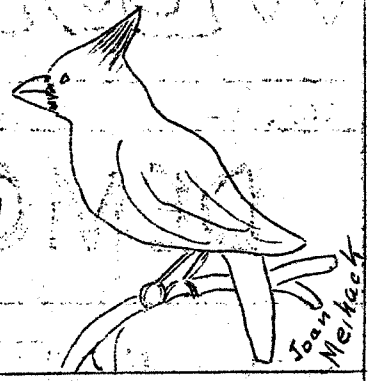

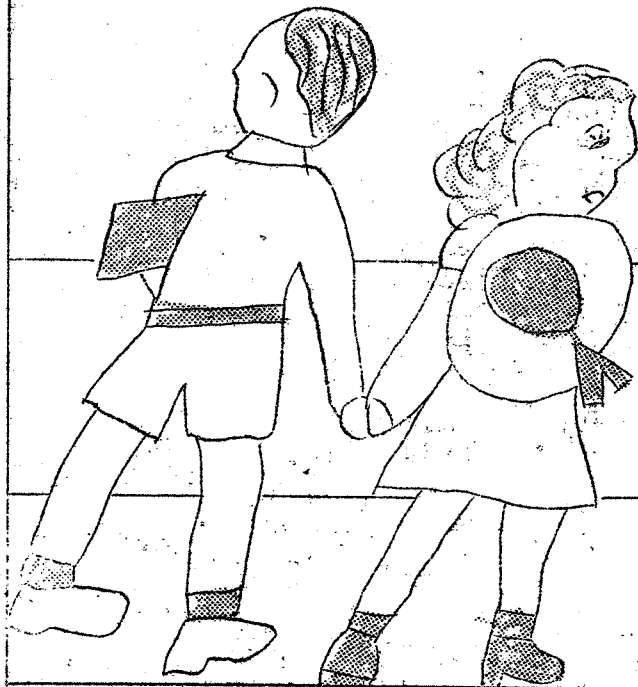
Western War Stamps Sales
