

During Book Week this year we would like the children of Western Ave. School to read more books to get acquainted with more book characters.




THANKSGIVING VACATION

Last year we received \$44.34 from sales tax stamps. Save them this year. Give them to your Junior Red Cross representatives.


Western Juniors made 200 hospital favors for last New Year's Day.




