First prize will be a surprise gift from Rogers & Co.- Jewelers. The next ten awards will be passes to the Ritz and Majestic Theaters.

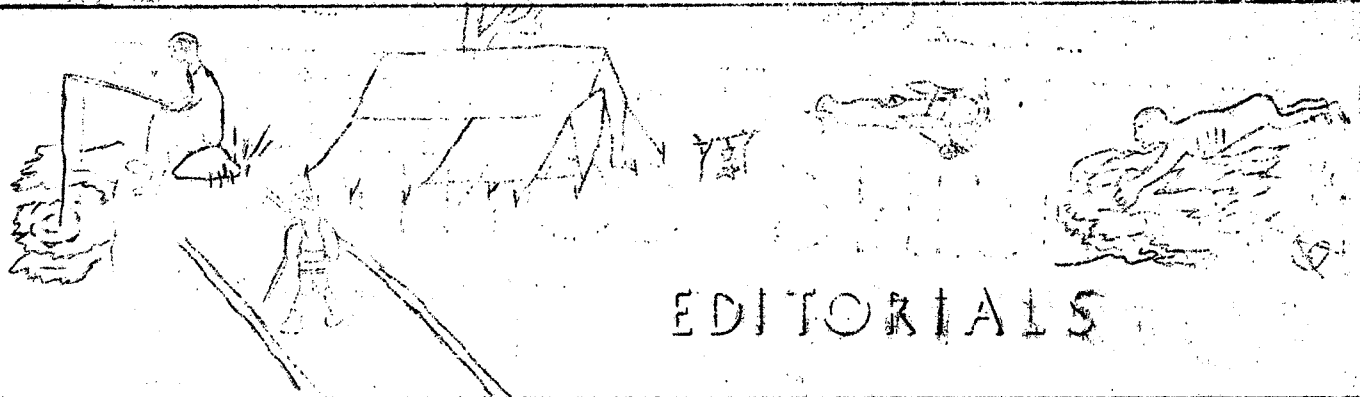

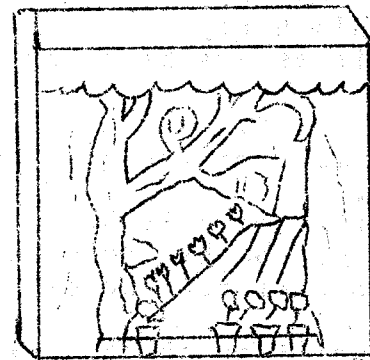
## "OUR VEGETABLE GARDEN"

The queen told her helpers that she had ventured out of fairy land and had hidden her wand in one of the tulips until she came back but she had forgotten all about it until then.

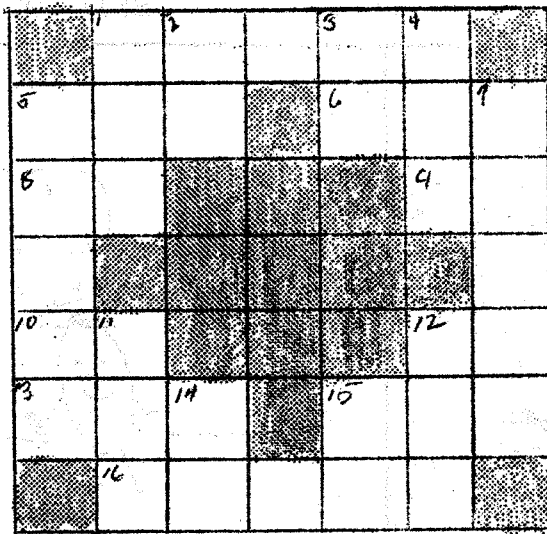
