
A contest is being offered in which prizes will be awarded to the best entry of the primary, intermediate and junior high grades

"STAFF GOES TO NEWS-JOURNAL OFFICE"

The members of the Western Wind-Up staff were fortunate on March 4, when they got to go down to the Mansfield News-Journal office and go through the plant.

The first thing we saw was the ditorial department. In this department were the Managing Editor, City Editor, Assistant City Editor, Telegraph Editor, and several reporters.

The next place was a little room just off the sditorial department where automatic typewriters got news "hot" off the wires.

In the next room the first thing that attracted our attention was the comic sheet made out of lead. We asked Mr. Lindsay about it. He said that it was made in this form so it could be used for the many copies of the paper. He told us that most of the comics come from New York. In this room were several men who set the type for the different pages of the paper.

Another room was full of linotype machines. Mr. Lindsay asked
a man there if he would type our
names on one of the machines.
First, he types the name on keys
something like a typewriter. Second, he presses a little pedal
with his foot and there's something that goes on inside of the
machine that we cannot explain to
you. Finally a little piece of
hot lead comes out of a small
shaft with the letters on it.

"STAFF TRIP CONTINUED"

We then saw where they pressed a mat made of wood-fiber on a page set up with lead letters. The man who operated the machine said there were several tons of press sure applied to it.

The last room was the press room. There we saw the very large printing press. Mr. Lindsay took us around to the other side of the press where we saw a shaft through which the wood-fiber pages came down from upstairs. A man placed one of these pages on a big semicircle and made a cast of the page. When that was done they put the casts on the big rollers of the press. Mr. Lindsay said that the press cost \$50,000 and would print one hundred and fifty copies a minute.

We are grateful to Mr. Lindsay for the time he took to show us the plant and we hope you may see the same thing some time.

We also want to thank Miss Miles for arranging this trip for us as well as Mrs. Stambaugh and and Mr. Bierly for taking us in their cars.

On May 4, we will give the operetta, "The Magic Beanstalk" by Hubrich. It is written in three acts. Here is a brief story of it




