A silver cup will be awarded to the school that has won the most points in track work this year.

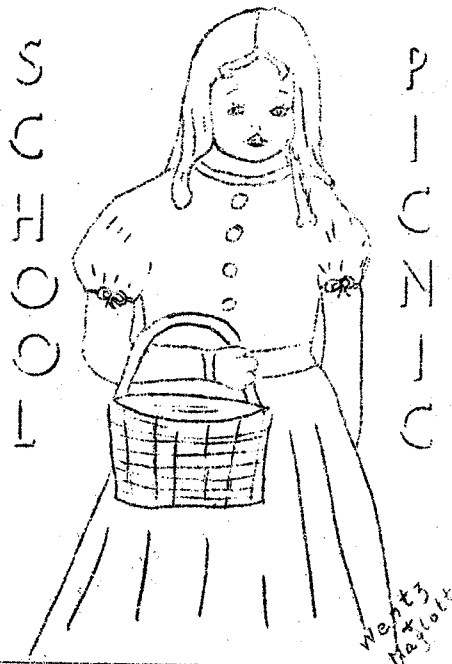

Three prizes will be given to the children selling the most tickets.

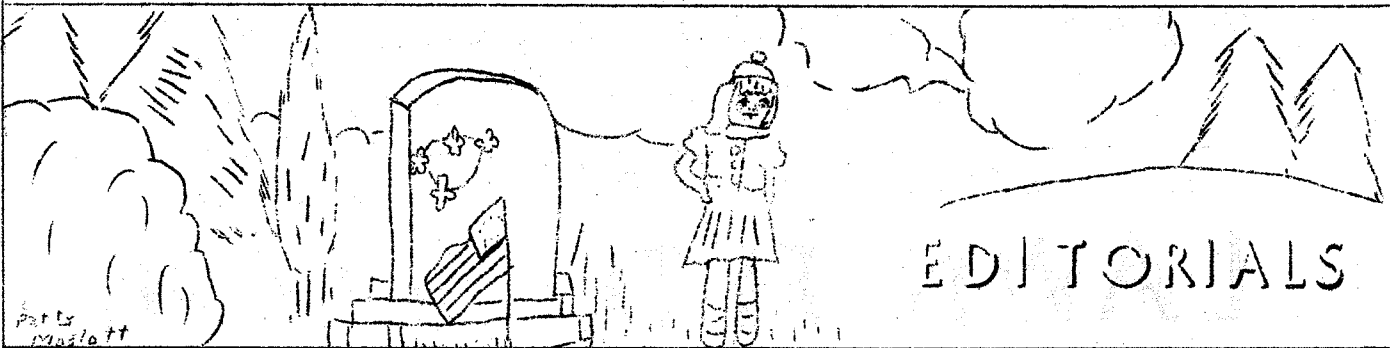
First Prize - \$3.00

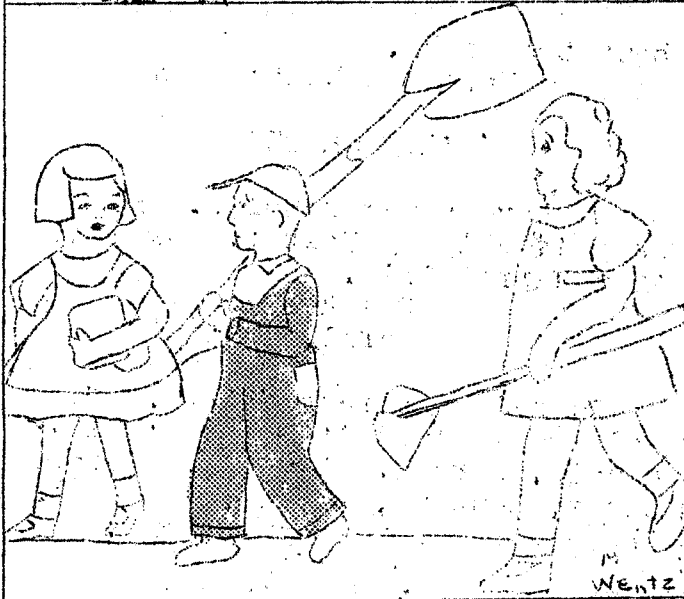
"FINANCIAL REPORT OF WESTERN WIND-UP"

"SIGN UP NOW FOR GARDEN CONTEST"

Every year the Mansfield Garden Club sponsors a garden contest for the school children. The schools are divided into districts. Western and Brinkerhoff are in one district. There are four prizes for each district.

First prize - \$5.00

Second prize - \$3.50

Third prize - \$2.50

Fourth prize - \$1.50

A silver cup will be given to the school who has the greatest percentage of its enrollment completing the garden project.

The flowers chosen for the gardens must be selected from the following list: Gladiolus, Phlox, Zinnias, Calendulas, Nasturtiums, Ageratum, Sweet Alyssum, Snapdragons, Cosmos, Marigolds, Asters, California Poppy, Gaillardia, Dahlias, and Bachelor-buttons.

The gardens will be judged for design, color scheme, neatness and condition of the garden also for the quality of plants.

The garden requirements are:

1. The flower bed shall not be more than 10 feet by 25 feet or less than 5 feet by 7 feet.
2. The contestant must grow three

or more annuals.

3. The flower bed must be a separate unit apart from the garden of the child's parents, but must be in the yard in which the child resides.

4. The child must collect flower seeds from his garden at the end of the year.

5. All work on the garden must be done by the child.

After the exhibit they had a P.T.A. meeting. They elected officers for the year 1937-38. These included:

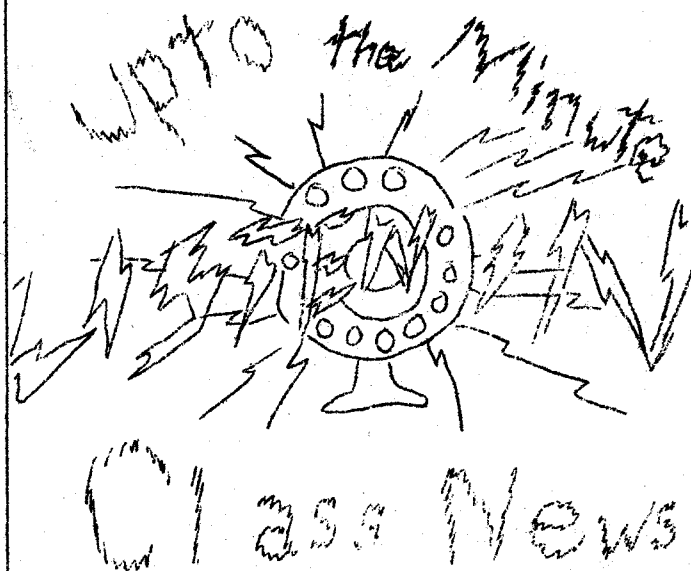

We have invited Mrs. Olive Frey who has made a study of birds in this vicinity to talk to us about them next Tuesday afternoon at 1:15 P.M.

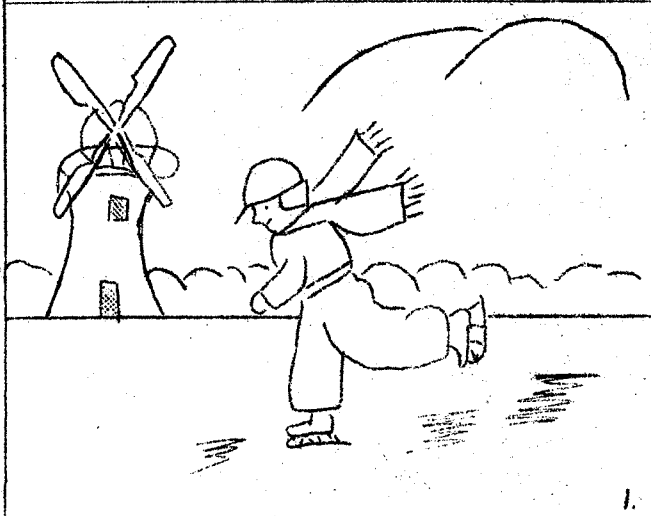
"PICNIC FOR PATROLMEN"

On May 26, there will be a picnic for all the school boy patrolmen in Mansfield.

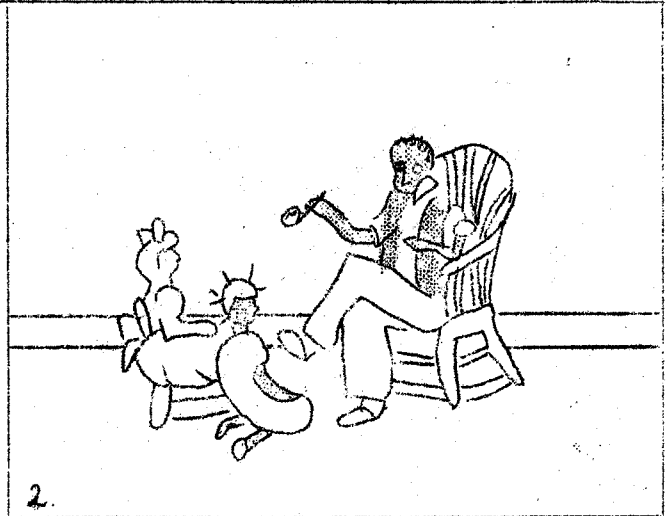
At that time merit medals will be awarded to the best patrolman of each school. The children of each school vote for the best patrolman in their school.
