

## "THANKSGIVING DAY"

Thanksgiving is a day of feasting, merriment, and giving thanks to God for his love and mercy during the year.

The first Thanksgiving was held by the Pilgrims in Plymouth in the autumn of 1621. Their first winter in the new country had been difficult but they had survived the cold After clearing, plowing, and phanting their fields in the spring they gratefully watched the growing of their crops. In the fall they gathered in an abundant harvest.

Govenor Bradford ordered that they hold a day of giving thanks to God. They decided to call this day, Thanksgiving. The Indians who taught them to fish, hunt, and how to plant their crops were invited to the feast which followed religious services at the church.

Thanksgiving became an annual event after 1630 in Massachusetts

and after 1647 in Connecticut. In "New Netherlands" the Dutch had occasional days of Thanksgiving from 1644 on.

During the Revolutionary War, days of thanksgiving and prayer were frequently set aside. Abraham Lincoln was the first president to name the last Thursday in November for Thanksgiving. This day has been observed since then as Thanksgiving Day.



#### "SIXTH GRADE"


