Virginia Webber and James Voyik with 13 points apiece and David Weaver scoring 12 points were outstanding for Western.

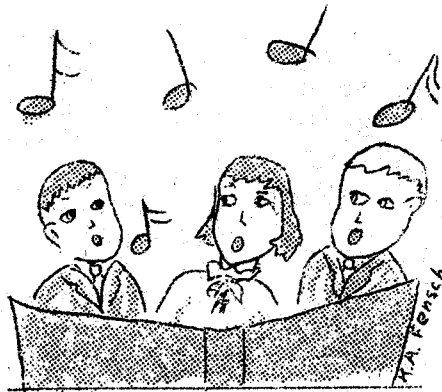

The children of Miss Miles' and Miss Wolf's rooms will have Songs of the American Spirit.

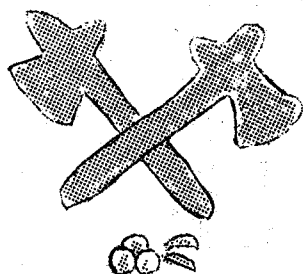
The classes of Miss Conn and Mr. Freeman will give a visit to Scotland and Ireland in song and dance.

We hope that you will plan to be there.

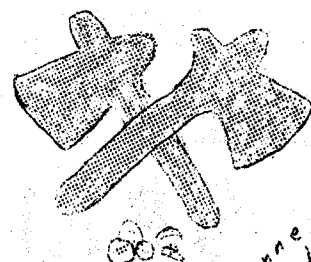

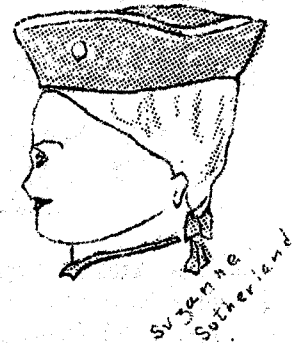

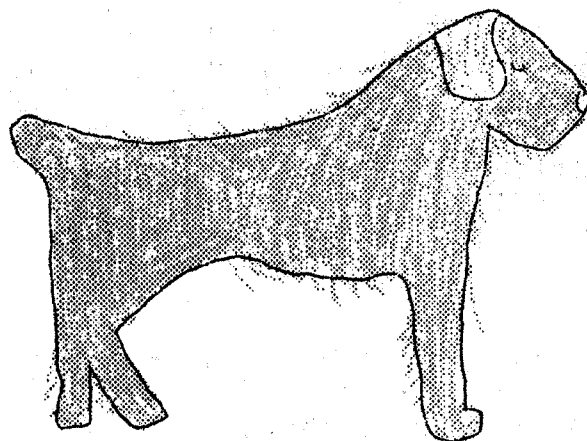
### "FIRST GRADE"
