

"NEW TEACHER AT WESTERN"



charcoal. Some made nursery rhymes and others scenes of out-of-doors. Then we used colored chalk rubbing it in at certain places making them more life like.




"FOLLOW SHADOW"





"THE MARCH OF DIMES"


