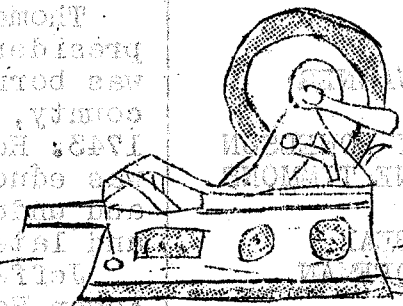

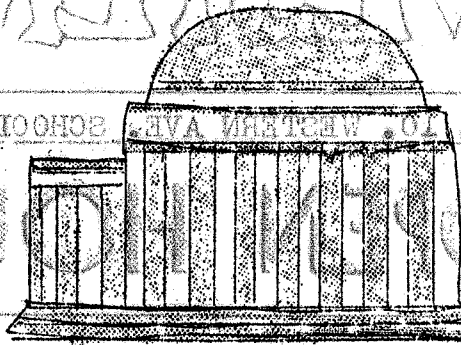
V-E PROGRAM

THOMAS JEFFERSON

Thomas Jefferson was the third president of United States. He was born in Shadwell, Albemarle county, Virginia on April 13, 1743. He died July 4, 1826. He was educated in common schools and under private instructors, and later studied law. Jefferson was elected to the Lower House of the Virginia Legislature in 1769 and took a prominent part in radical measures of resistance to Great Britain. In 1775 he was appointed a delegate to the Continental Congress; he was chairman on June 10, 1776, of that famous committee which was largely the work of Jefferson, was debated in Congress from July 1 to July 3, and was finally adopted on July 4, which day became the birthday of a new nation.

The campaign of 1800 was extremely bitter, and Jefferson and Burr, the two candidates of the Democratic-Republicans, received the same number of votes. Jefferson was chosen president by the House of Representatives. In 1804 Jefferson was re-elected by a large majority. France and England were at war throughout Jefferson's second term. Thomas Jefferson was a great president.

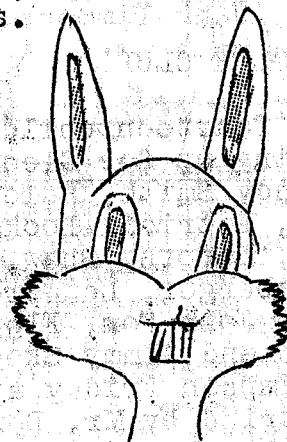
EASTER ART WORK

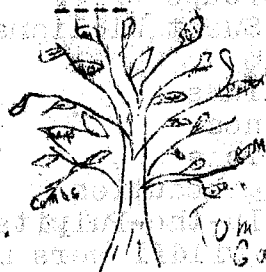
VOLLEY BALL
