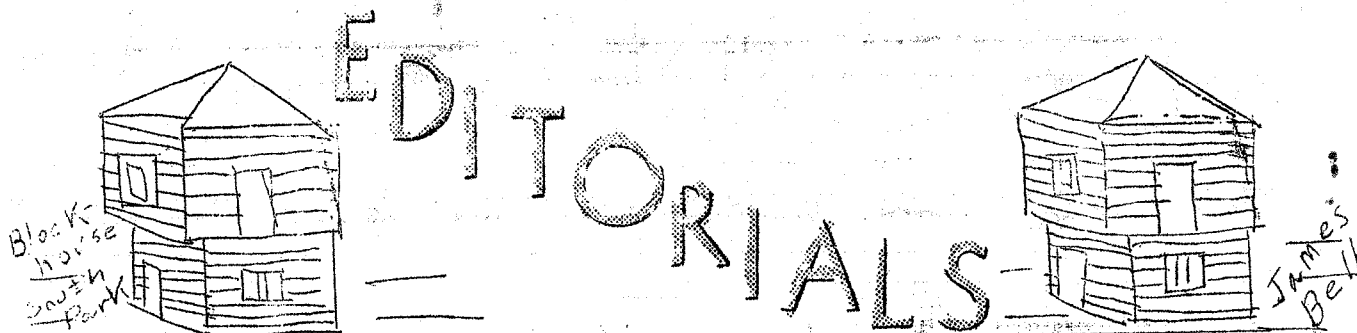

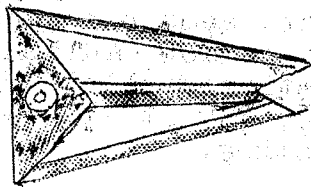
OHIO

Ohio takes its popular name, the Buckeye State, from the trees which once dotted its hills and plains. The term came into common use during the "hard-cider and log cabin" presidential campaign of 1840, when the successful candidate Gen. William Henry Harrison, a Virginia-born Ohioan, used a cabin made of buckeye logs as his emblem, and his supporters carried buckeye canes. The name Ohio, which was first given to the historic river bordering the state is an Indian word meaning great.

OHIO'S FLAG

In 1902 the state legislature adopted this flag, the official flag of Ohio. The stars are to mark the fact that Ohio was the 17th. state to enter the Union. Other features of the flag are symbolic such as the white circle to indicate the name of the state and the red circle to represent the buckeye. Ohio has a pennant shaped flag, which no other state has. The outer part of the field is swallow tailed, the field itself has 5 stripes - 3 red and 2 white - red at the bottom and top.

As of Sept. 1, 1953 our new plan will include - Blanket Medical up to \$1500 (up to \$50 will still be paid for injuries to sound natural teeth.). -Accidental Death \$1000. -Dismemberment Benefit up to \$1500 -Policy Term One Full Year -(from the date on which the application is recieved). - Teachers Included In The Plan. - Bills will be paid for as long as 26 Weeks Following The Accident -(as against the usual 13 week limitation).

The rate is still \$1.00.

in May. It will be for the Ohio Sesquicentennial. It will be historical and original. All the grades will take part in it.

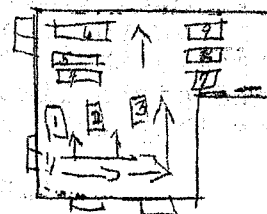

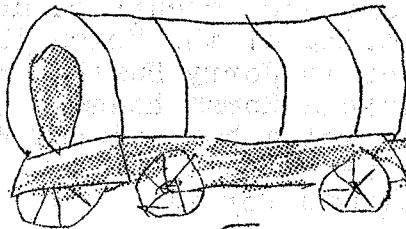

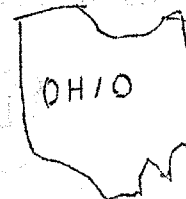
These ladies served from 1869 to 1929. The statues of these ladies stand in the corridors of our National Capital. They are dressed in the original costume

HISTORY OF OHIO

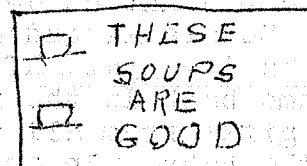

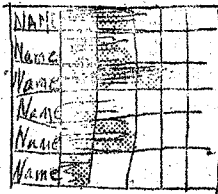

the children problems and for every five right we get a square. Sometimes she gives us one and if we get it right we get a square.

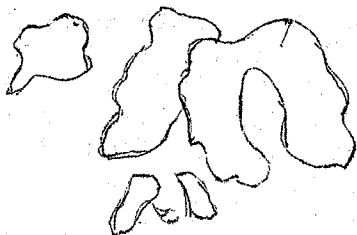

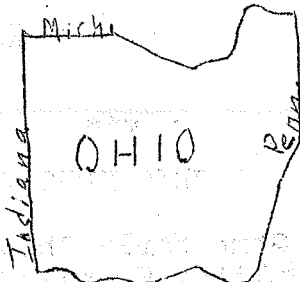

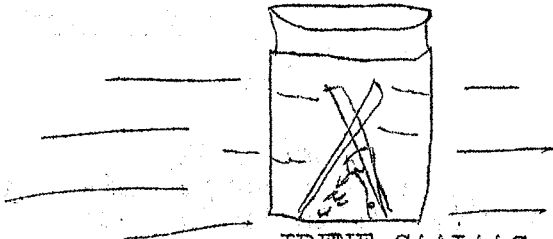
MANSFIELD INDUSTRIES

A lobster lives in
the ocean. Many
lobsters are found in
the Atlantic Ocean.

shell. The lobsters
are usually green.
After they are cooked
they turn red. As the
lobster grows it sheds
its shell. It has two
pairs of feelers or
antennae. It has five
pairs of legs. The
first legs have big
claws. One of them
has flat blunt teeth
to catch and crush
little sea animals.
The other claw is used
to tear their food
apart to eat. Some
are left-hander and
some are right-handed.
The one we had was
left-handed. It used
its fan-shaped tail
to swim backwards.

A baby lobster is
about a third of an
inch long when it
hatches. Before the
babies hatch the
mother lobster carries
the eggs for eleven
months. The mother
lobster carries her
young in her swim-
merettes. The little
ones rise to the sur-
face of the water,
they go down in the
fall. After they go
down they can be
attacked by their own
mothers. The mother
lobster lays from
5,000 to 160,000 eggs
at one time. The

grown lobster is one
to two feet long.
They weigh from two to
fifteen pounds. The
trap which is used to
catch lobsters is
made of wooden slats.
There are two parts
to the trap. One part
is a bait box. There
is a trap made of wood
slats. When more than
one lobster is caught,
wooden pegs are put in
their claws to keep
them from fighting.

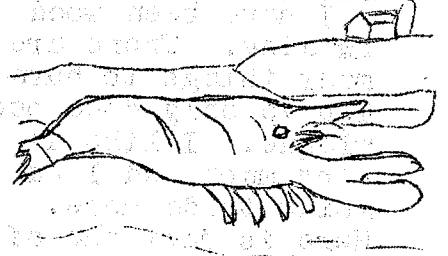
