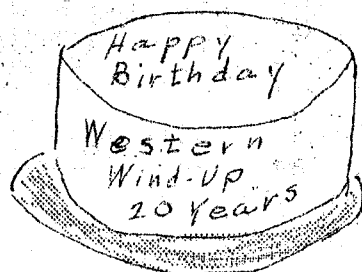


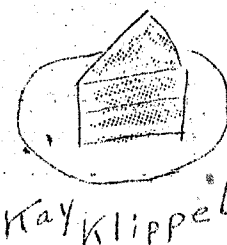

20TH ANNIVERSARY

Twenty years ago when our classes were departmentalized, the pupils of the sixth grade english class decided they would like to publish a school paper.

The staff was made up of sixth grade pupils, the other three english classes served as reporters. With the help of the Mansfield Typewriter & Office Supply Co. in getting them started on the first issue, three more issues were published that year.

The staff got "Ads" for their paper @ \$.50 and \$1.00. The boys and girls of the school paid \$.02 a copy for the paper. In this way they completely financed their paper. The first year they paid for the mimeoscope and equipment, stencils, paper and stamps for our exchange with other schools.

It has been interesting to guide and to watch the growth through the years a project in which so many children have taken an active part.

OUR TRIP TO THE NEWS JOURNAL

On April 18, 1956 Miss Miles' room went to the Mansfield News Journal to see how a newspaper is published.

We first saw how the paper is planned. A man has a paper with eight columns on it. He blocks off some of it for an advertisement, some more for a news article and so on until the whole paper is laid out or planned.

Then our guide showed us the room where mats are made with lead. The lead can be melted down and used again. They use mats or plastic with pictures on them.

In the composing room we saw some men working linotype machines that write one whole line across a column, and other men setting types.

There are different kinds of advertisements. One is classified ads and the other is pictured ads. Our guide showed us a book of mats that are used in the pictured kinds of ads.

In another room was the editorial department where people write the articles.

In a smaller room we were shown the Fairchild machine that burns pictures on plastic. The Fairchild machine takes the place of photo engraving and it can only be rented.

In the telegraph room we saw some machines that spelled out news stories and made pictures automatically.

In the press room we saw the modern presses and the little cars that carry the one-ton rolls of paper from the storage room to the press. The cars run on special tracks and are about two feet wide.

All the one half pages of one day's publication take 13 tons of paper and costs \$139. One ton of paper is 360 miles long. In the storage room the

the paper is kept at a constant temperature and the oldest rolls are used first to keep them from turning yellow.

In the first edition there are 17,000 papers, in the second 15,000.

The comics are bought in mats one week in advance. The Sunday comics are bought already printed from Buffalo, New York and inserted.

When the printed papers come out of the press already folded they go down a conveyor belt and are sorted into bundles for the 300 paper boys who deliver them. 32,000 papers come out on week days. 33,500 papers come out on Sundays.

We would like to thank Mr. O. D. Bennett and Mr. Bob Schraedly for taking us through the building.

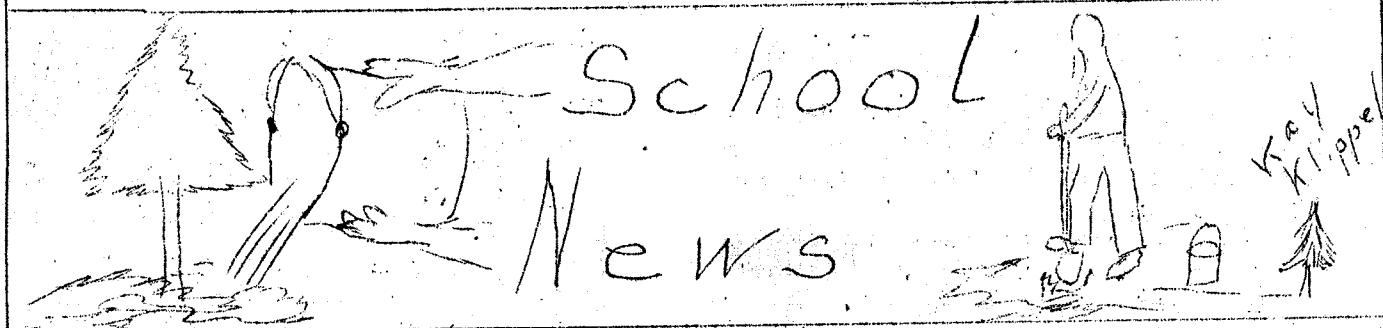

"Johnny Appleseed" was the name given to John Chapman. Johnny was born in 1774 and died in 1847 at the age of 73 years.

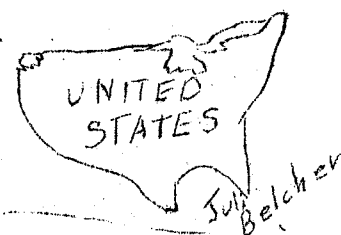
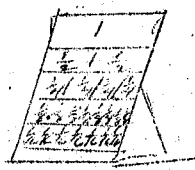

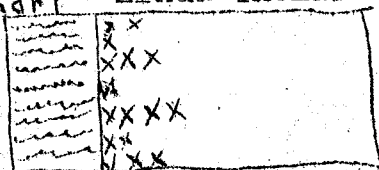

Mrs. Sherman's sixth grade has been studying about the Caribbean Islands which include Cuba, Hispaniola, Jamaica, and Puerto Rico.

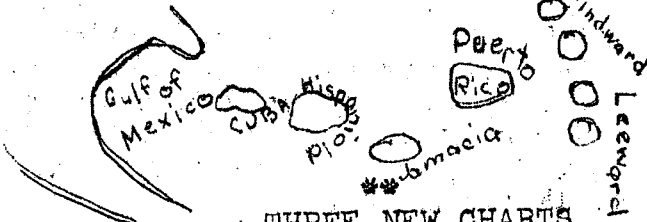

We had to put fifteen or more products on the maps.

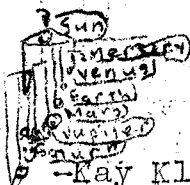

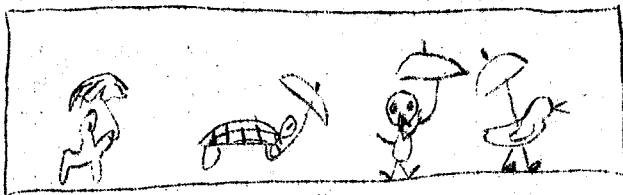
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LUNCHROOM FRIEZE

CARLSBAD CAVERNS

There are three levels to Carlsbad Caverns.

The first level which is 700 feet underground contains seven miles of caverns open to visitors. The other two levels of cavern are at 900 feet and 1,370 feet below the surface. Tourists are not permitted to enter these caverns but they may look down to the cavern floor at the 900 foot level.

One part of the caverns contains three to five million bats which fly out at dusk except during the winter season.

Only about 30 miles of the area of Carlsbad Caverns has been fully explored.

The limestone in the caverns is believed to have been formed in a shallow inland extension of the ocean about 200,000,000 years ago. When the Rocky Mountains were formed about 60,000,000 years ago, the cavern area was raised above sea level and water began to hollow out the limestone to form caves. The caverns became a national park in 1930.
