Wednesday March 26th, Miss Miles' room took a trip to Mansfield News Journal.

First Mr. Richard Collier, our guide took us down stairs. We saw the giant paper rolls. Mr. Collier said that some rolls weighed from one thousand to two thousand pounds.

There are twelve reporters and three sports reporters.

The news from different towns and states is sent in by teletype, wire, mail, and telephone.

The press prints forty thousand papers in one hour. It cuts and folds the paper. The press has four units. It is about 23 feet high and weighs about 50 tons.

Paper routes for the newsboys are from two to eight blocks.

Some employees at the News Journal are: Mail room employees, proofreaders, press crew, printers, maintenance, janitors, and teletype-setters.

TORNADO SAFETY RULES

What to do-General rules
Seek shelter away from brick walls, trees, chimneys, or small buildings. A structural steel building offers greatest protection. Open

north and east windows to equalize pressure although do not approach windows when the twister is in the immediate vicinity. Lie face down under table, desk or other protective cover. Shield face and head with pillow, clothing, blankets, etc. Lie flat in a ditch, ravine or other depression if unable to escape to more sheltering protection. If possible keep tuned to local radio station for latest advisory information.

AT HOME, the southwest basement corner offers greatest safety in a frame house. People living in brick or stone houses should seek shelter elsewhere. Follow general rules.

IN SCHOOLS, if structural steel building, the lower floors away from outside walls offer greatest protection. Lie flat on floor under desks. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums. If in wooden building or other small structure. (Cont'd page 18)

SUMMER SCHOOL

THE FIRST PHOSPHORUS MATCH

The first real matches were made by John Walker an Englishman. They were tipped with gum, antimony and potash, over a layer of sulphur. With every box a sheet of folded sandpaper was furnished. The match was placed in the fold which was tightly pressed together with one hand, and the match was jerked with the other. This match was called a lucifer.

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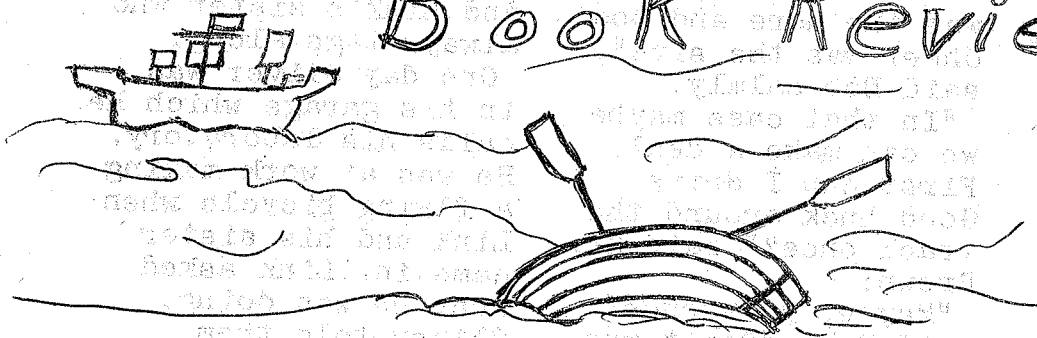
PNEUMATIC TIRES

The long life and efficiency of today's pneumatic tire are the result of careful scientific experiment and precise manufacturing processes. They are made of crude rubber mixed with carbon black chemicals, and reclaimed scrap rubber. Sulphur is the chief vulcanizing agent. Strands of cord, used as the basis for the tire fabric are individually covered with the compounded rubber. Gum-dipped fabric is cut into bias strips in the proper dimensions for the many different sizes.

The cord body is built up on a collapsible drum, ready for mounting the thread fabric. When fabric and cord have been combined the tire is roughly shaped by a huge hydraulic press. The crude tire is then placed in a mold where it is cured and given final shape. The finished tire is wrapped by machine.

is his best friend, and Link's sister who always tags along.

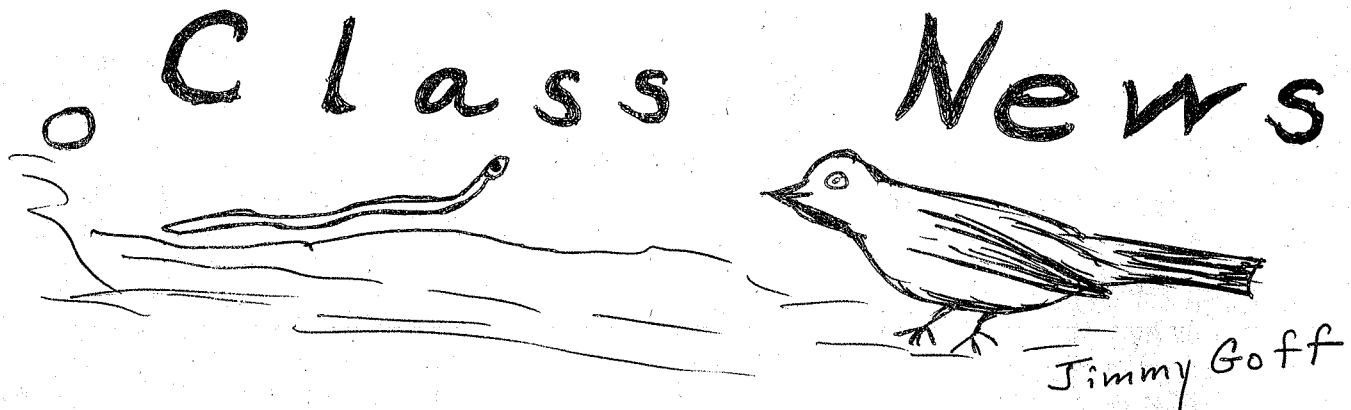

SUGAR CANE

Sugar cane is a tall grassy plant which grows in tropical countries. The stalk grows from 10 to 15 feet tall. The cane grows from a thick, solid, rootstock. The stalks have no branches, but have two rows of narrow leaves. The stalk is divided into sections, like bamboo. These sections are called intermodes. Each node has a bud that looks like a potato eye.

Sugar cane grew first in India. It was brought to the Americas in the 1500's. Cuba grows the most.

The best soil to grow

sugar cane is fertile soil that can hold a large amount of moisture. The plant needs much water. A heavy subsoil of clay helps keep the plant food from escaping.

The cane is grown from stem cuttings. Its pollen is not very fertile and the seeds are not often formed.

Great furrows from 5 to 7 feet apart are dug. The cuttings are laid in, then the soil is thrown over the cane. In a short time the buds borne on the nodes swell and burst, the young stalk emerges. The field must be kept free from weeds and grass. In favorable conditions the stalks grow rapidly.

Hand cutting is still used more than machine cutting. Each cutter is given a knife which has a blade 5 inches wide and 18 inches long, with a hook on the back. The cutters cut the cane close to the ground, strip off the leaves, and cut off the top and the last joint. The cut stalk are thrown in to piles to train where they are taken to refineries.

PUERTO RICO

Puerto Rico is located southeast from Florida. It's northeast from South America and east from Cuba.

Puerto Rico's area in square miles is 3,435 square miles. It is the smallest of the West Indies. Puerto Rico equals 3 Rhode Islands. It equals 1½ Delawares.

The population of Puerto Rico is 2,240,000. Puerto Rico's population equals the population of Oregon about twice. Most of the people are Negroes and they are very poor.

Most of Puerto Rico's people are poor. They can't pay much for clothing or food. They don't even own the land they work on. Most people speak Spanish. Two million people are crowded on this small island.

Puerto Rico's rainfall is 10 to 20 inches of rain. Because of the differences in rainfall, there are great differences in vegetation. Most of the vegetation is tropical forests. Some of the vegetation is grassland.

Tobacco and sugar are Puerto Rico's number one crops. Coffee, oranges, grapefruit, and pineapples, are important, too. Grapefruit is grown in

a warm climate. Oranges are harvested in the fall, when there is a scarcity of such fruit in the United States. Tobacco plantations are small.

Puerto Rico's surface is mountainous. There are lowlands along the coast of Puerto Rico.

San Juan is the capital of Puerto Rico. San Juan is the largest city in Puerto Rico. San Juan has broken down shacks and unhealthy living conditions. The population of San Juan is 368,756.

There are 23 radio and television stations there are 15 airlines.

There are 9,312 public schools and one university.

Puerto Rico is controlled by the United States.

The exports are sugar tobacco products, and rum.

The religion is Catholic.

Remove children and teachers to ravine or ditch which will offer greater protection than the building.

Follow the rules for open country. If unable to leave the building, follow the rules for in the home.

IN THE OFFICE, if structural steel building. The lower floors away from outside walls offer greater protection. If no desks or other protective cover, stand upright against the inside walls. If wooden building or other small structure. Follow rules outlined under, in the home.

ON THE STREET, see rules outlined above for particular type of building construction. IN OPEN COUNTRY, Move at right angles to the approaching twister preferable toward the right as you face the tornado. An auto can often outrun a tornado. If there is no time to escape, lie flat, face down, in the nearest ditch, ravine or other depression. Cover face with clothing blankets or even an auto seat cover for protection from flying objects.

When disaster occurs notify: Red Cross, Police Sheriff, Fire Dept. State Patrol.
