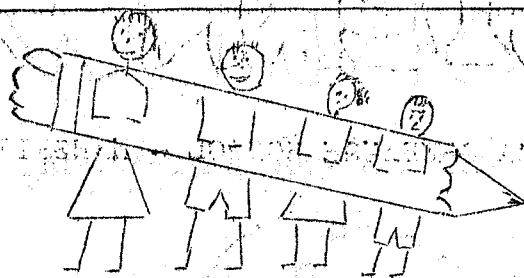

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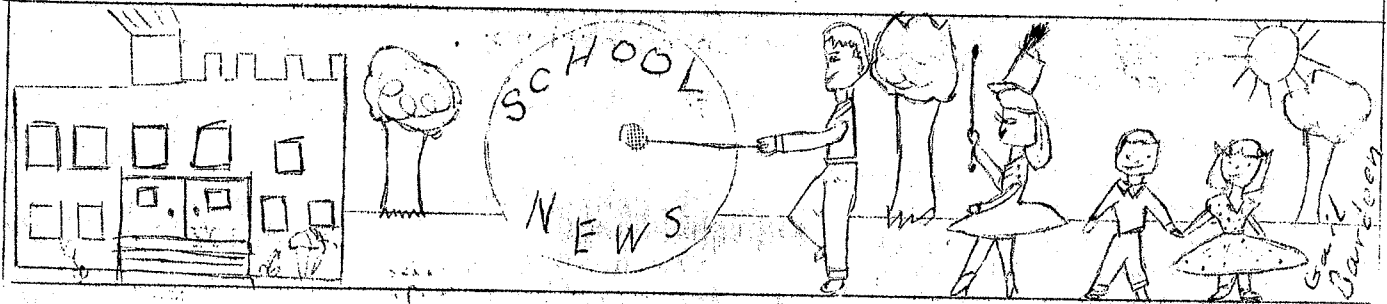

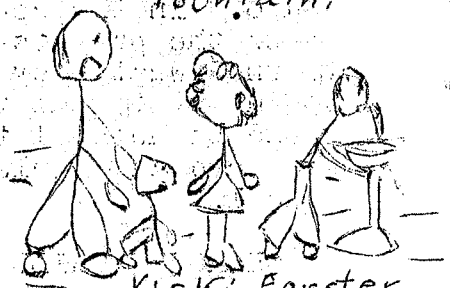

They played some records. Then we had some pop and potatoe chips.

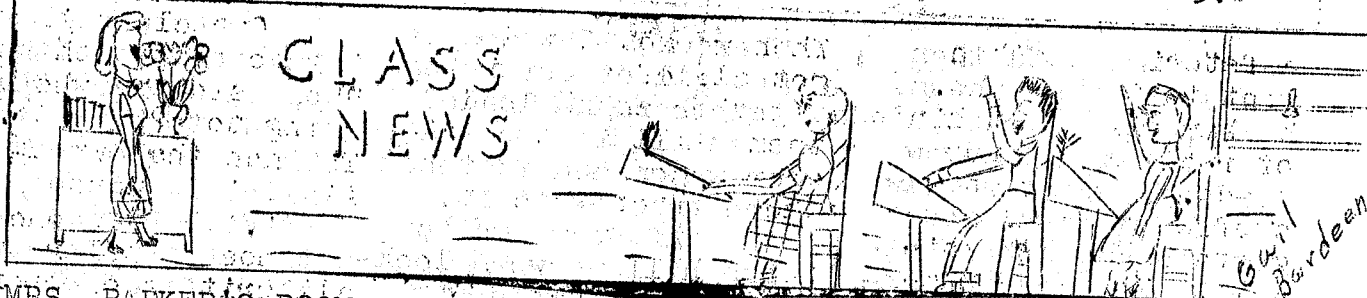

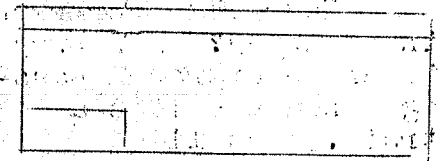

MAKING ROCK SALT
Fill a glass tumb-

ler $1\frac{1}{4}$ full of common salt. Then add warm water until the glass is $3\frac{3}{4}$ full. Stir the solution until the salt is dissolved, or add a little more water if necessary. Cut a piece of cardboard to fit as a cover for the glass. Hang a piece of string through a hole in the center of the cardboard so that it reaches nearly to the bottom. It may be necessary to tie a small weight on the string so it will sink. Now cover the glass and set it aside in a quiet place with the string in the solution. Observe the glass from day to day, and after a time you notice crystals of salt forming on the string. After several days these crystals will grow quite large. Then take the string out. You will have rock salt.

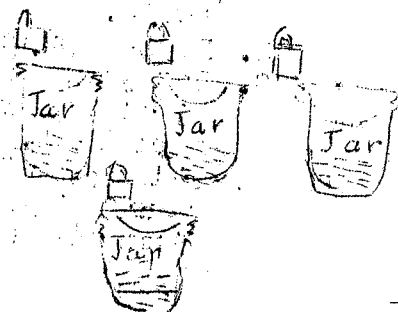

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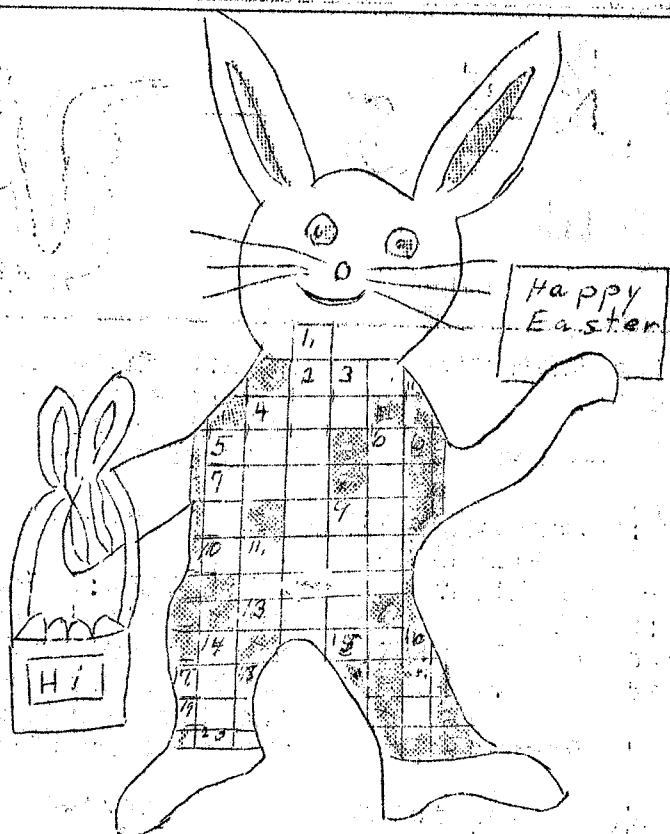

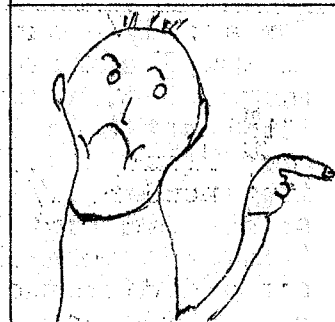
