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HOW TO FIGURE THE DATE OF EASTER

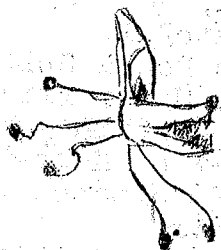
Most of our holidays come on a certain date every year. Easter, however, comes on a different date every year.

We wanted to know how to figure the date of Easter. We found the answer in the April 6th issue of Junior Scholastic.

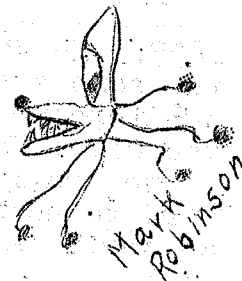

In all, the whole Music Festival was well received by the audience.

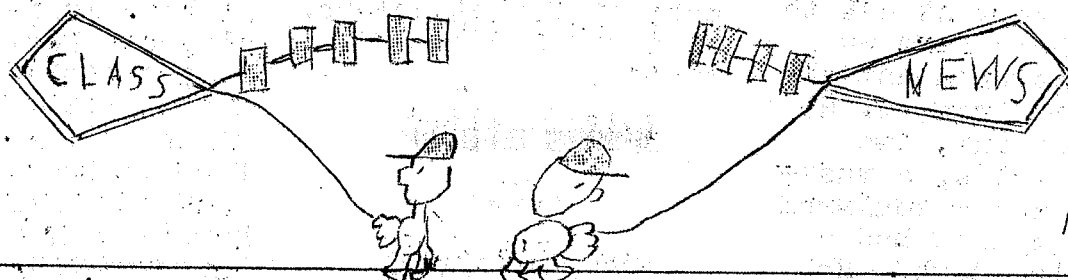

LEARNING ABOUT FLEECE

Saturday, Miss Smith's class went to Mr. McGrew's farm in Lucas, Ohio.

At the farm we saw Mr. Hall shear sheep.

While we were at the farm, Mr. Hall and Mr. McGrew told us different things about the sheep.

A fleece is the wool from a sheep. I learned that a small one weighs more than a big fleece.

Mr. Hall asked us to guess how much a small fleece weighs. Some of us said five pounds, eight pounds and six pounds, but it weighed fifteen pounds. The fleece weighed a lot because a thin sheep's fleece has more grease than a big sheep's wool. One of the larger sheep's fleece weighed seven pounds because it has less grease.

It is also used in the making of cosmetics.

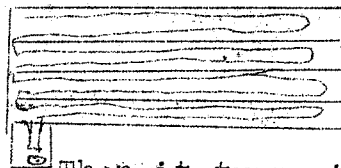
YUM - MAPLE SYRUP

How do we get maple syrup?

Well, I can tell you. First of all they find good maple trees. Second, they drill a hole in the tree. After that they stick a round circular thing in the hole called a spout. Then they pour the sap into a large tank called an evaporator. The evaporator turns the sap into creamy, rich syrup.

Sally Stadler's mother and father went to Hawaii recently. They brought back many things.

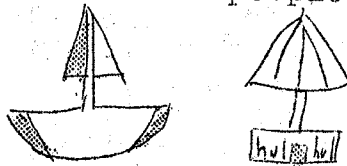
They brought a hula skirt, a little outrigger canoe, a doll and many other things. Sally showed us all these things.

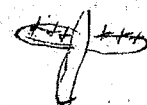

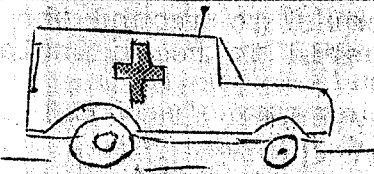

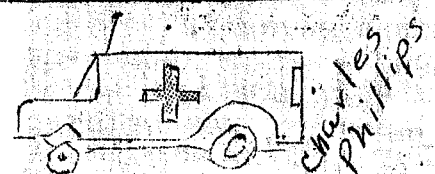

FIRST AID



FIRST AID RULES

1. Keep the injured person lying down with his head level with his body.
2. Look for stoppage of breathing, poisoning, wounds, burns, fractures and dislocations.
3. Keep the injured person warm.
4. Call a doctor or an ambulance.
5. KEEP CALM.
6. Never give water or other liquids to an unconscious person.
7. Keep clockers away from the injured person.
8. Make the victim comfortable and cheerful if possible.
9. Don't let the injured person see his own injuries.

DANNY STARNES-6

1. Keep the injured person lying down with his head level with his body.
2. Look for stoppage of breathing, poisoning, wounds, burns, fractures and dislocations.

BURNS & SCALDS are a major problem in first aid because they are so frequent. The first aid for burns is to relieve pain, prevent infection and overcome shock. Never give water to a burn victim. Injuries which break the skin are likely to become infected. Even slight

cuts and scratches may lead to serious infections. Place a sterile dressing over the wound and have it treated by a doctor as soon as possible.

POISONING - In case of internal poisoning, the chief remedy is to dilute, then wash out the poison. Have the victim drink water in large quantities, with suds, salt water, soda or mustard in water, tepid water, egg white or milk. Vomiting usually results and the poison is washed out. This should be repeated until all the poison is removed. Treat for shock. A doctor should be called at once.

7. Don't carry another rider.

12. If you must ride at night, be sure to have a headlight on the front of your bike and a red glass reflector on the rear.
