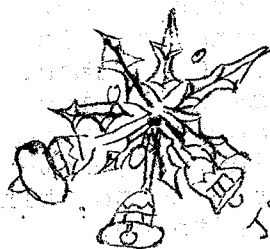
## DECEMBER

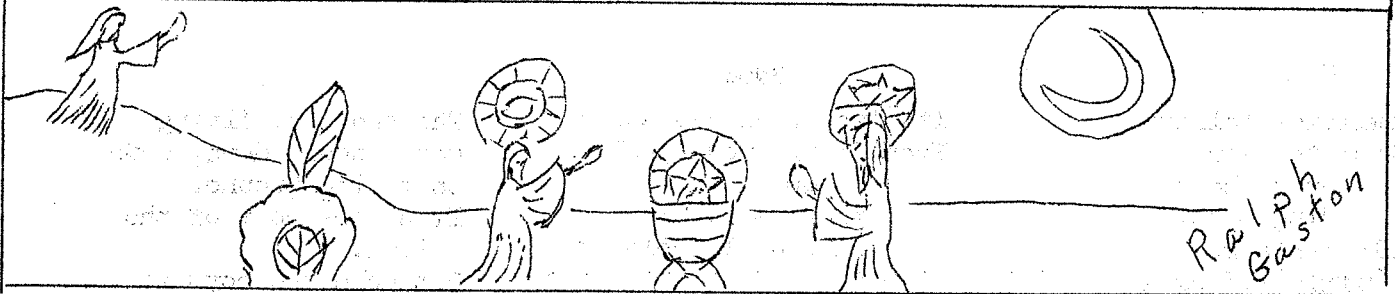
Every year we write our name on a piece of paper. After that we each draw a piece of paper out of a hat. And who's name you get you buy a present for.

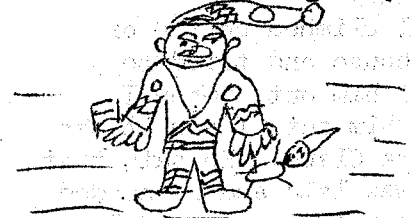


## SANTA'S TOYS

On special occasions, they rode in a coach with springs.

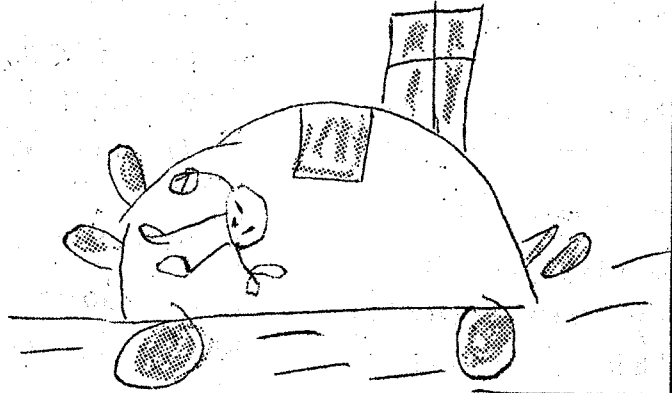

## COOK'S CORNER



Bake at 375° for 8 minutes. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.  
Sift together: 1 3/4 cups flour.  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Cream together: 1/2 cup shortening-1/2 cup peanut butter. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, cream well. Add 1 unbeaten egg 2 tbs. milk and 1 teas. vanilla. Beat well. Blend in shape the dry ingredients gradually; mix thoroughly by rounded teaspoonfuls into balls. Roll in sugar place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake at 375° for 8 minutes. Remove from oven and place a solid milk chocolate candy kiss on top of each cookie, pressing down so that cookies crack around edge. Return to oven; bake 2 to 5 minutes longer. Have a nice Christmas.

## COOKIE POPS

1 cup butter  
(softened)  
1/2 cup confectioners sugar  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon cream of tartar.  
1/2 cup anise, peppermint,

rootbeer, or favorite flavor hard candy, crushed.  
Food coloring (optional)  
Light Corn syrup  
Colored sugar or candy

Heat oven to 375°

In large bowl, mix butter, sugar, egg and vanilla. Blend in flour, soda and cream of tartar on low speed to soft dough, scraping bowl constantly. Work candy into dough; mix in food coloring.

If desired, chill dough 1 to 2 hours for easier handling.

Roll dough 1/4 inch thick on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Cut with 2 round or 3 shaped cookie cutters. Place on ungreased baking sheet carefully. Insert 6" skewer through each cookie.

Bake 6 to 8 minutes or lightly browned. Cool slightly before removing from baking sheet. Cool thoroughly; brush corn syrup in pattern. Sprinkle with colored sugar. Makes about 40 cookie pops.

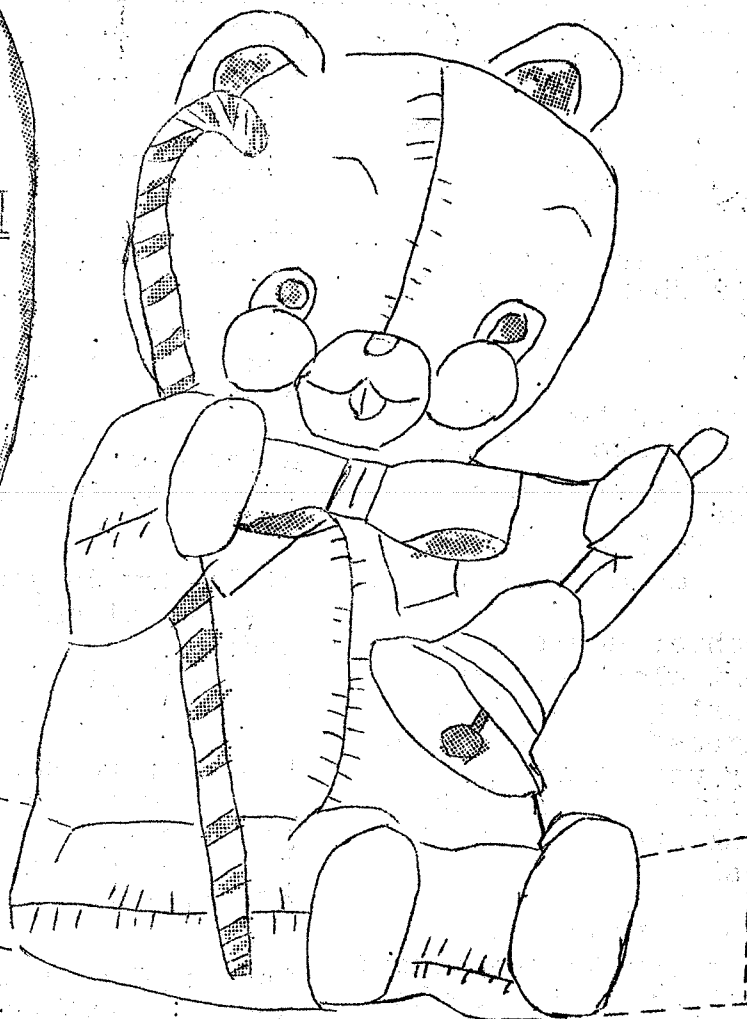
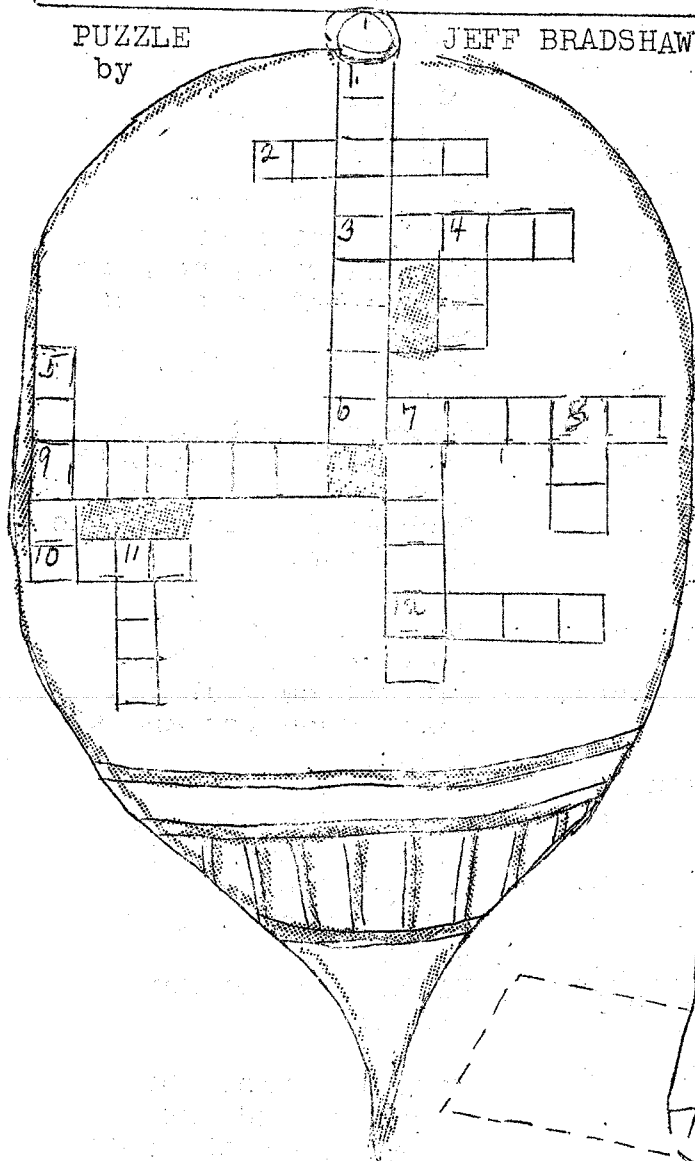

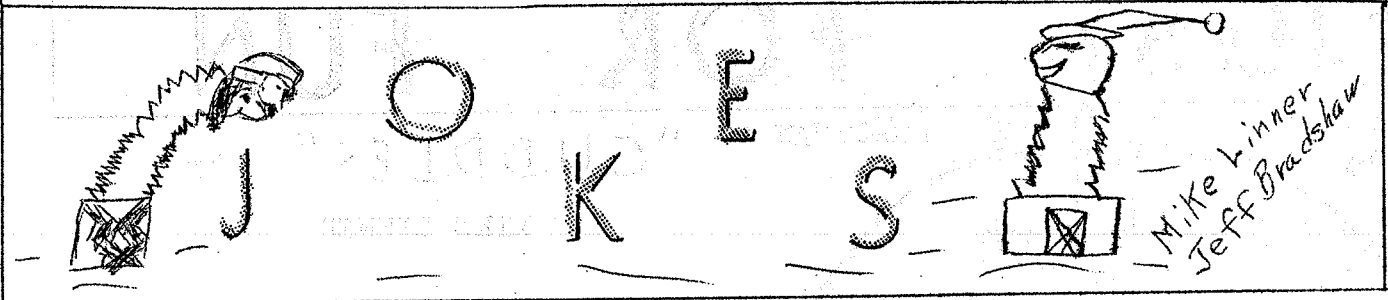
