Room Parties will be held from 12:30 to 2:20 P.M., using the time necessary.

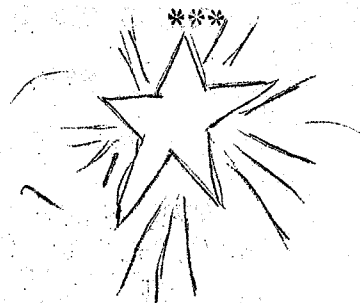
Santa Claus will come sometime after 1 P.M. All the graduates will go to the auditorium to sing at 2:20 P.M.

We saw many cacti in the desert. We saw many horses. I saw a real buffalo, too. We saw a two headed calf and some snakes.

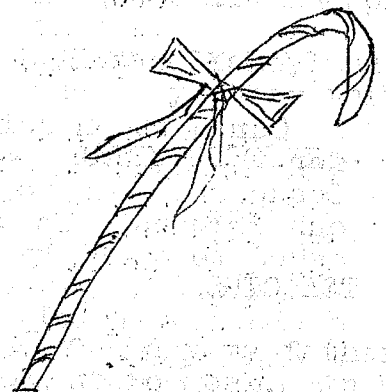
I saw Disneyland and many other things.

The storekeeper said, "When the Japanese go fishing they have these glass bubbles on the nets to weight them down. Some come off the nets and float to Hawaii. The Hawaiians pick them up and sell them for decorations!" "Last stop, Brazil, the coffee country!" shouted the leader. In a quaint shop was a plate with real butterflies concealed

in it. Also in the shop was a tablecloth with 30,000 French knots made by one person. The people had on sandals made from hemp.

SHALE TO BRICK

On a beautiful October day, our class visited the Richland Shale Brick Company.

Mr. Simmons, who conducted the tour, first showed us the site of the raw material, shale. Shale is a type of clay found in layers in the earth. To learn the story of manufacturing bricks you must go back thousands of years, since making bricks is one of the oldest industries ever devised by man.

Some of the earliest brick was made over 4,000 B.C. and contained clay and straw. The clay was made ready by stamping with feet. Now we have better methods using better material and machines.

Fourteen years ago, they said this plant had enough shale to last about 90 years, but mining of shale has since increased

about 3 times. In one day 160,000 bricks can be produced.

The shale is brought up from a deep gorge 70 feet deep by a conveyor. The conveyor is 720 feet long and is the largest in the U.S. After this it is taken to a machine that grinds it into smaller pieces. Then it is ready to be mixed with barium carbonate. Barium carbonate is used to keep lime out. Lime would make the bricks faulty.

Now it is mixed with water, then holes are made by a machine that looks like fingers. There are several reasons why the holes are made:

1 - It helps to hold the bricks in place while being cemented.

2 - The weight is less, therefore, it costs less to ship.

3 - It saves money for the plant.

Red brick has no chemicals added. That is the way it normally is. Other colors of brick must have chemicals added.

Later the bricks are stacked on cars that will go through the kiln. The kiln is like a huge oven. Its hottest point is 3,000 degrees, but it was only necessary once to have it 2,300 degrees. A kiln is operated by radio. The bricks stay in the kiln for 92 hours.

Inside, the bricks are gradually heated then gradually cooled. When they come out you could almost put your hand on them.

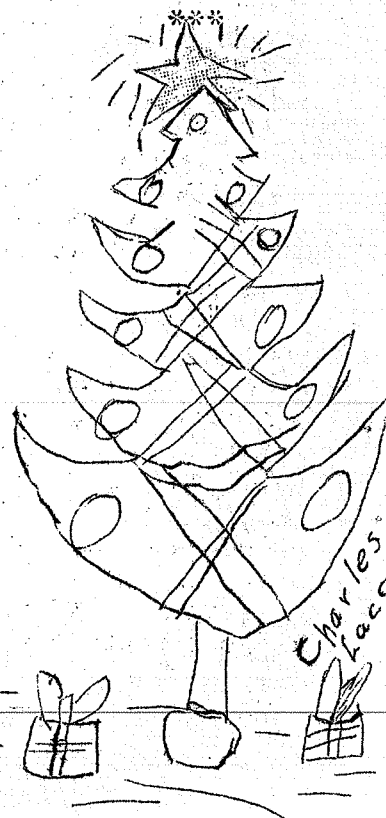
The standard size of a brick is: 7-7/8" in length - 3-3/4" in width and 2-1/2" in height.
