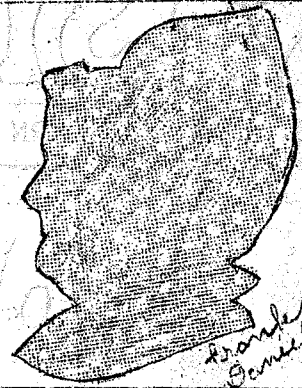

TWO GREAT MEN OF OUR COUNTRY

GEORGE WASHINGTON

George Washington was born at Westmoreland county, Virginia, on February 22, 1732. George Washington became the first president of the United States in the year 1789. The speaker will be Mrs. Paul Stahl, president of the PTA council. This meeting will be based on Founders' Day of the association.

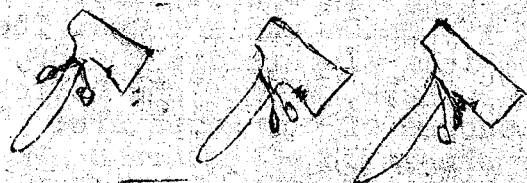

ure Books and others. We showed and talked about these pictures to the members of the class.

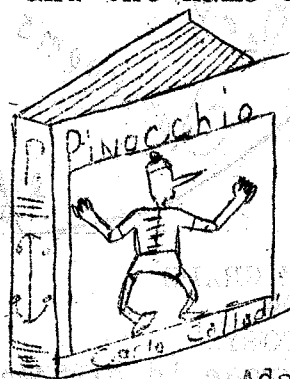
