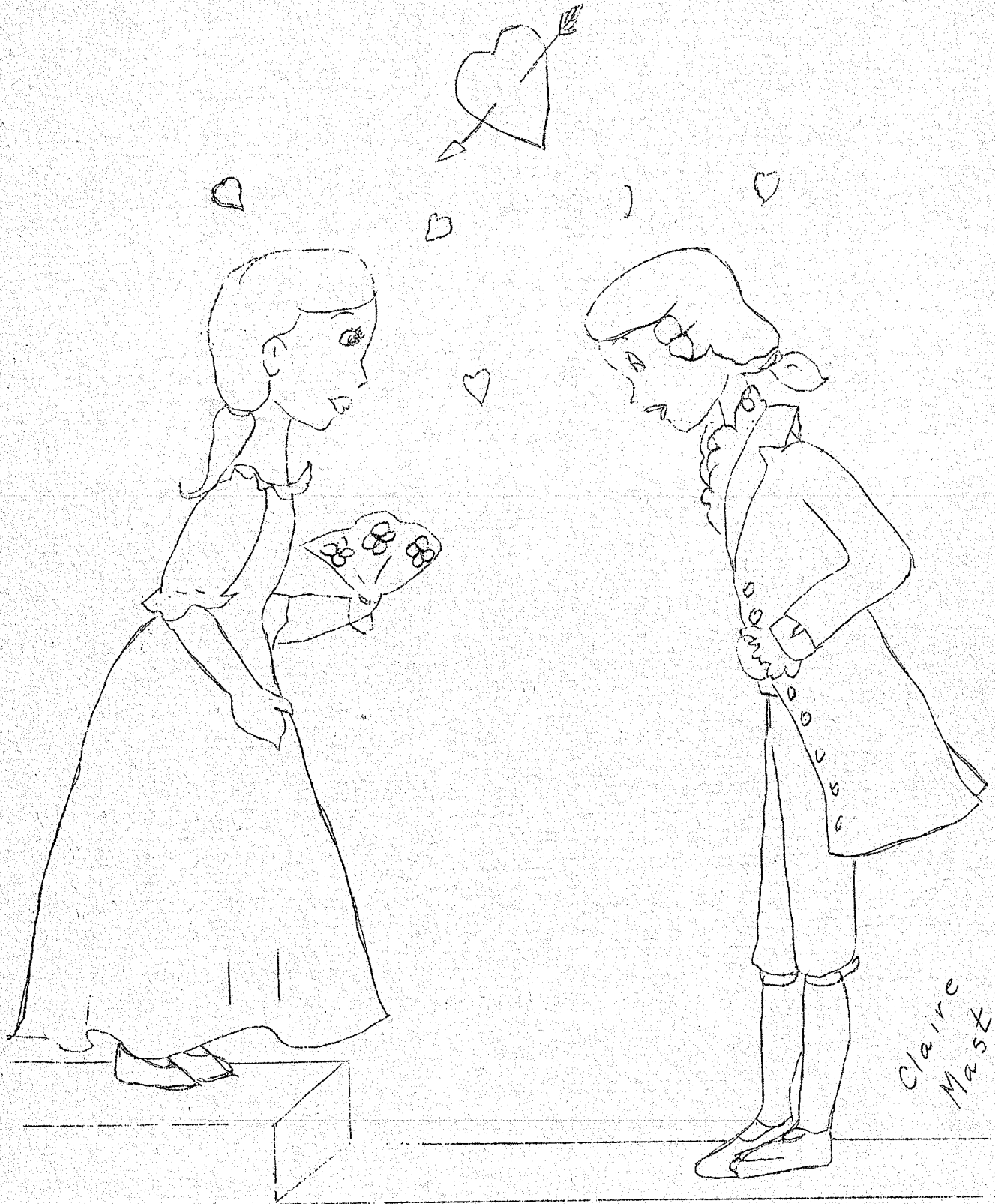
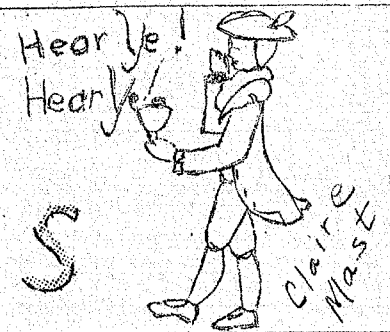
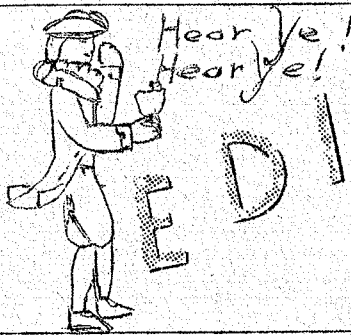

A TRIP THROUGH THE NEWS-JOURNAL

Friday the Western Wind-Up staff went through the News-Journal building. Here we saw a real newspaper plant in operation.

The first part we visited was the Advertising Department. Here a man showed us how ads were put in the paper. The salesmen go to companies with artist's sketches and ideas about the company's product. He talks over what size ad the company wants. They decide on one and a metal copy of it is made. Then it is run in the paper.

Our next stop on the tour was a room where flat casts were stored. A flat cast is a flat piece of metal with a word or two engraved on it. For example "BIG SALE", or other ads. These flat casts are made at the newspaper office. They are made by making a paper cast of the picture or letters wanted. The paper used is chemically treated so it won't burn. Molten metal is then poured on it and out comes a metal cast of what you want.

Then we saw the Editorial and News room. That is the room where the reporters check in. Patty Laux and Miss Miles were interviewed by Mrs. Mattox, who is a reporter on the paper.

Then we went to the "morgue". It is so called because it is a file containing information about important people. As an example our guide said that if a report came over the teletype that General Eisenhower had been killed, the paper could write a big story about it by writing a paragraph or two about how he died and then using the information they already had about him (different things he had done, etc.)

Also they had old papers dated back about twenty years. Older ones are kept in another room.

After that we went to the teletype room. Teletype machines are machines that type out messages from other cities. We saw a report of a murder come in over one. It had taken place in Portsmouth, Ohio.

We then went to the teletype setter room. There they make the print that is put into a teletype machine. One of the operators typed "Western Wind-Up Staff". A tape came out and the guide said that it read "Western Wind-Up Staff". It looked like a mass of dots. We took this to the linotype room and the tape was run through the machine. A few seconds later a flat piece of metal came and on one end was the backwards print "Western Wind-Up Staff". It was given to Mike Olsheski.

Then came the press room. Here was the big Press! It was very interesting to watch. Huge rolls of paper were unrolling and the paper was running around and around over many rollers. A conveyor belt was bringing out the finished papers. Every fiftieth paper was sticking out. The press had its own foundation, which was lined with cork so the vibrations of the press wouldn't shake the whole building. The press weighs 250,000 lbs. and cost about \$325,000.00. It could turn out 42,000 papers in one hour, and 760 a minute.

Then we went to the paper room, where the paper is stored. At the time we were in the room there was 640,000 lbs. of paper stored there. They bring in and use 300,000 lbs. of paper a month. The paper that is used contains clay. Each paper manufacturer uses a different way of making his

 paper and that method is kept secret. Of course, the paper is insured. The fire insurance amounts to less than the flood insurance for; rolled up, the paper does not burn easily, but water makes the paper swell and become worthless. One full roll of paper weighs about a ton.

It was a wonderful trip and we all enjoyed it.

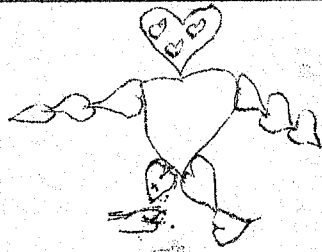

VACATIONS

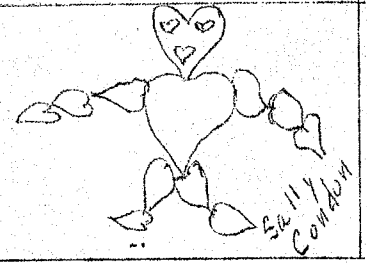
Schools will be dismissed Thursday, Feb. 22 for observance of Washington's birthday.

THOMAS A. EDISON

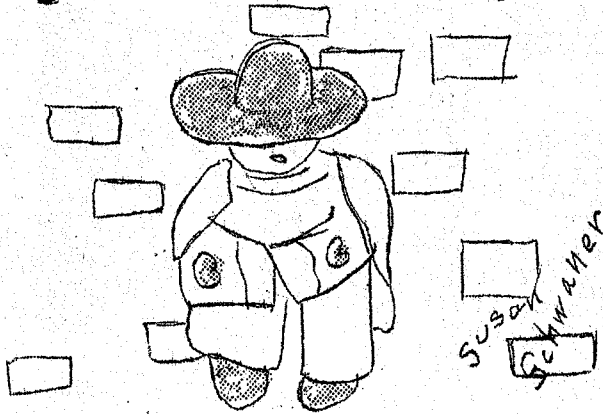
Thomas Edison is considered one of the world's greatest inventors.

 with when we play army.

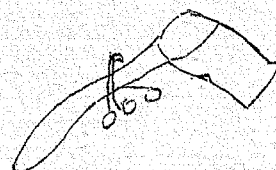
