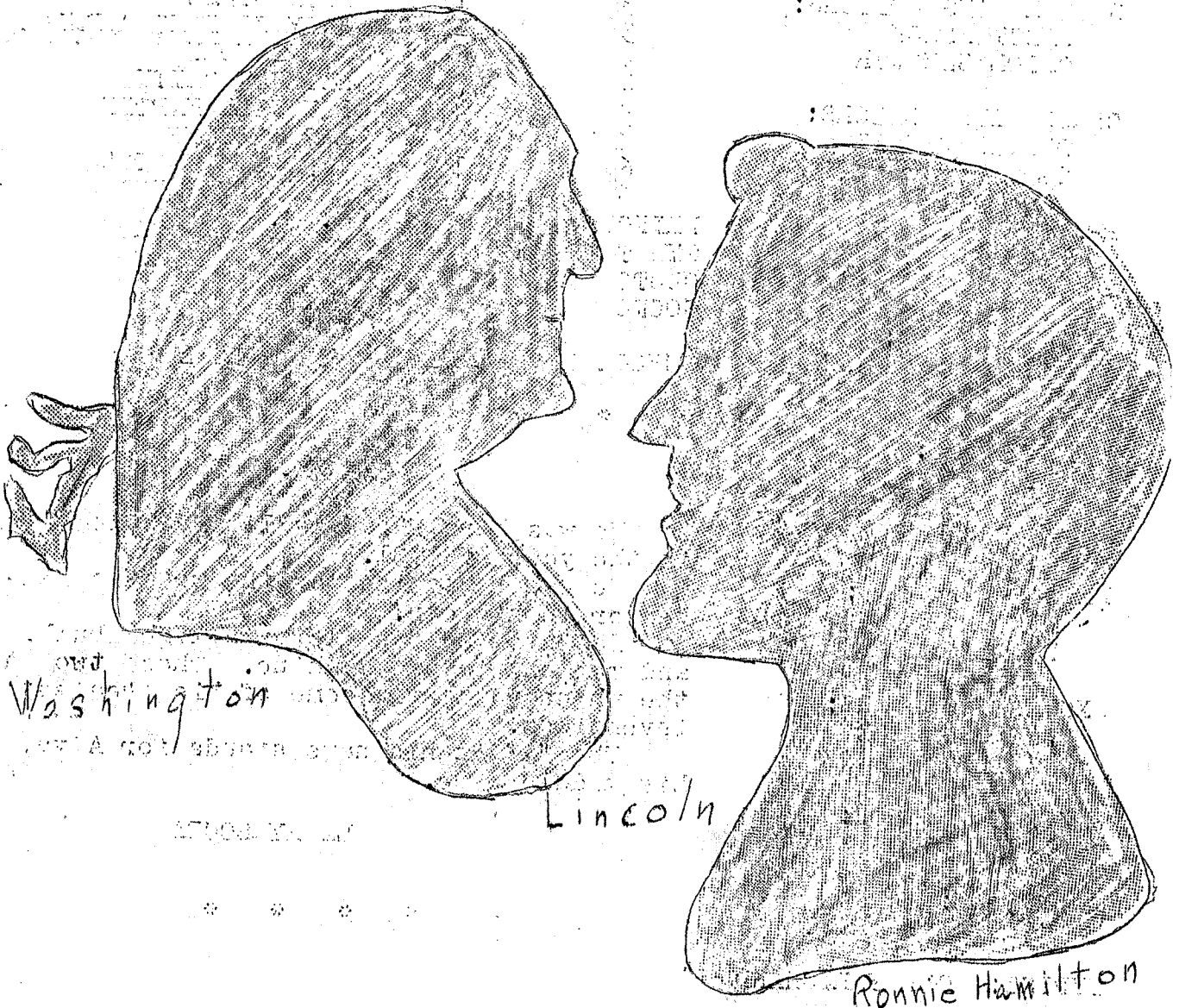

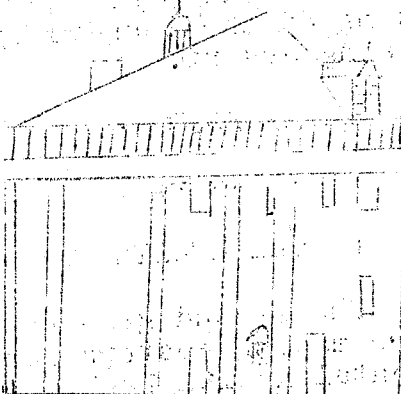

We draw the front cover and primary page on a stencil. Mrs. Richard types the articles on the stencils.

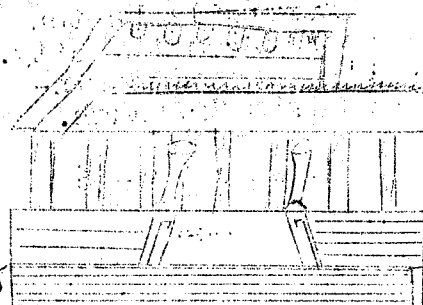
Then we take the stencils to the stock room and put one on the mimeograph machine. We add paper and ink runs through the stencil.

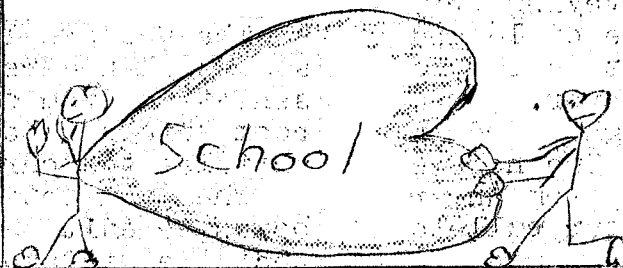
After we are finished with the printing we put all of the papers on the table arranged in order. Other pupils make sure that every paper is there. Then we staple them.

SCHOLASTIC TESTS

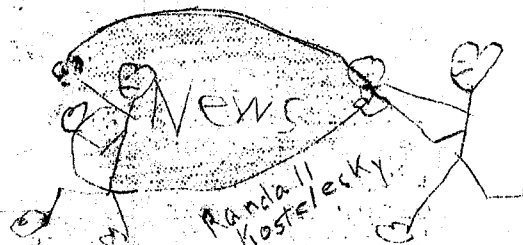
About two months from now the sixth grade students from all the schools in Mansfield will be taking Scholastic Tests.

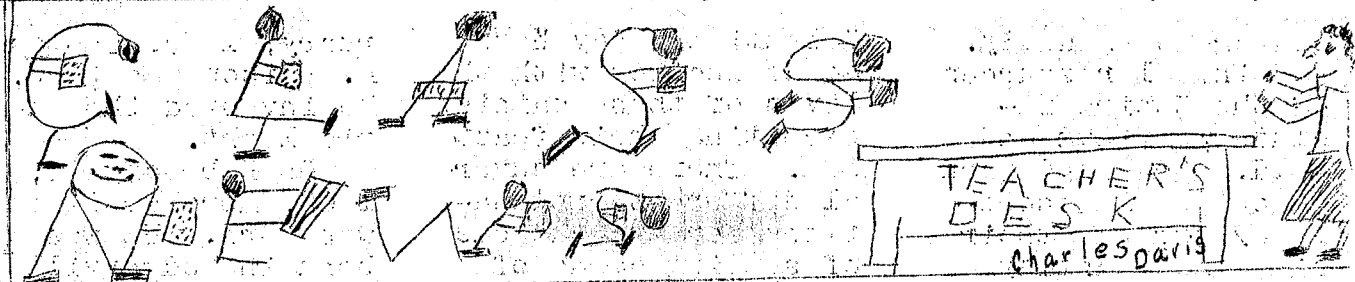

ALCOHOL

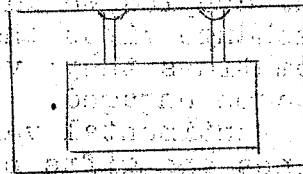

There are several different explanations for the customs of sending cards of greeting and love tokens on Saint Valentine's Day. All of them are probably inaccurate. The most plausible is that Saint Valentine's Day is a survival of a February 15th Roman festival.

It was once the custom to draw lots to decide which young man and woman should be each other "valentines" for the coming year. The couples would then exchange gifts and sometimes they even became engaged.

Sentimental valentines and gifts of flowers and candy are still commonly given by men to women in celebration of Saint Valentine's Day in the United States. The custom is not widely followed in Great Britain. American school children exchange valentines.

ELECTRICITY & MAGNETISM

Bring a magnetic compass close to your radiator at home or at school. Place the compass at the top end of the radiator and the north end of the needle will point to it. Place the compass at the lower end of the radiator and the needle will swing away from it. This shows that the radiator has two different poles and is therefore a magnet.

If you go through the house testing different iron objects you will become more and more excited at the number of weak magnets you have around you. You probably learned that iron objects become magnetized when they are near magnets. In this case, the earth is a magnet. You will find that in order for these iron objects to have different poles on the top and bottom they must have been in one position for some time.

In this way the iron in them is lined up in the earth's magnetic field. You can devise many experiments that may occur to you.

For example, a tin can of food from the pantry shows a north and south pole because it is about 98 per cent steel and has been in a vertical position for some time. Turn the can over and test it daily. How long before it loses or changes its poles? Does a larger can take longer to change than a shorter one? If a can shows no poles how long will it take for it to do so? Here are a few iron objects that may have north and south poles: radiators, floor lamps, stoves, electric switch plates, automobiles, vertical steel columns and TV cabinets.

Longfellow was born in Portland, Maine on February 27 1807.

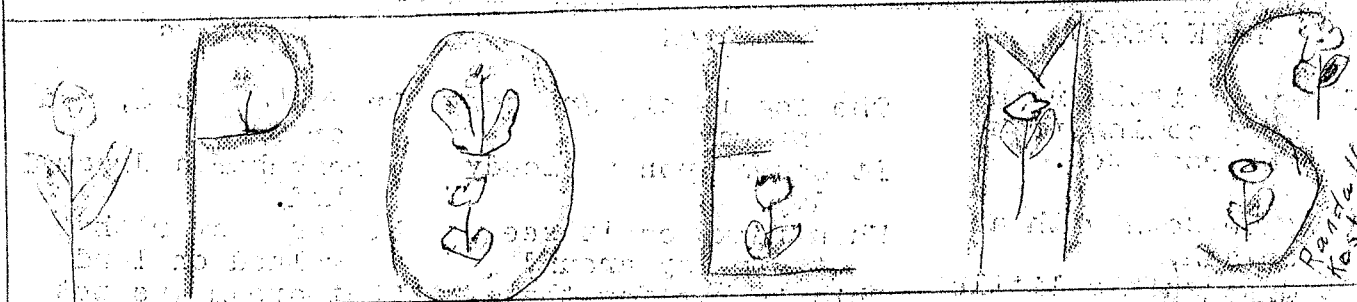

3-1/2 cups white sugar
1 cup white Karo
1 cup water
1 teaspoon coloring
1 dram flavoring

Bring to a boil sugar, Karo and water on medium heat, stirring all the time. Then cover with a lid for a few minutes to dissolve granules. Remove lid and put candy thermometer in pan and cook until it reaches 300 degrees. Stir occasionally.

After it reaches 300 degrees, remove from fire and pour in coloring and flavoring. Stir quickly and pour into buttered flat pan with edges. Take 2 knives and work around edges of candy and as soon as you can pick up a small quantity with the knives, drop it into a dish of powdered sugar and cover it lightly with sugar. Stretch the candy out slightly and snip it with scissors.

After cutting it into pieces drop them in another dish or pan.

Stir pieces around occasionally as they cool to keep them from sticking. (This candy hardens quickly so at least 2 or 3 people should help.)

2 1/2 c. cake flour
2 1/2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt
1/2 c. shortening
1 c. sugar
2 eggs
1 t. vanilla
1 cup mashed bananas
1/4 c. sour milk or
buttermilk

Grease 18 to 20 cup cake pans for use. Preheat oven to 375 F. Sift flour, measure it, sift again with baking powder, salt. Cream shortening and add sugar, creaming it in. Add eggs one at a time, beating each in thoroughly. Blend in vanilla. Add flour mixture alternately with bananas and milk. Stir after each addition until batter is smooth. Turn into baking cups or prepared pans. Fill them 2/3 full. Bake about 25 minutes or until cakes shrink from the sides of the pans or cups.

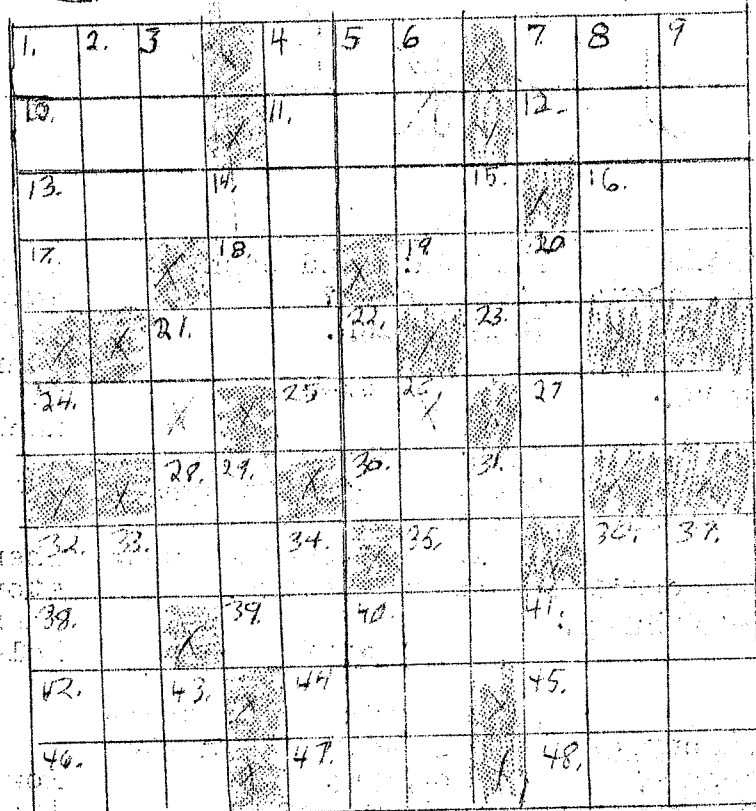

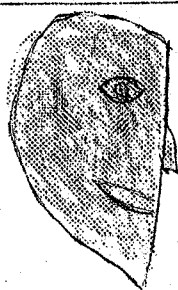

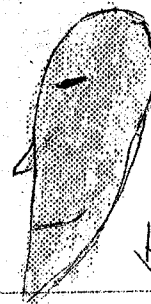
