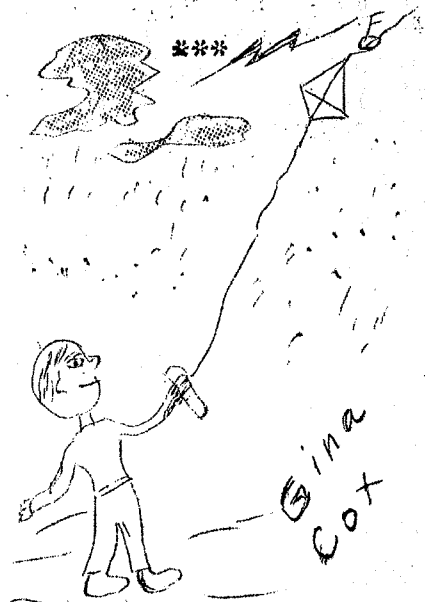
### EXPERIMENTS WITH ELECTRICITY

Franklin was one of the first men in the world

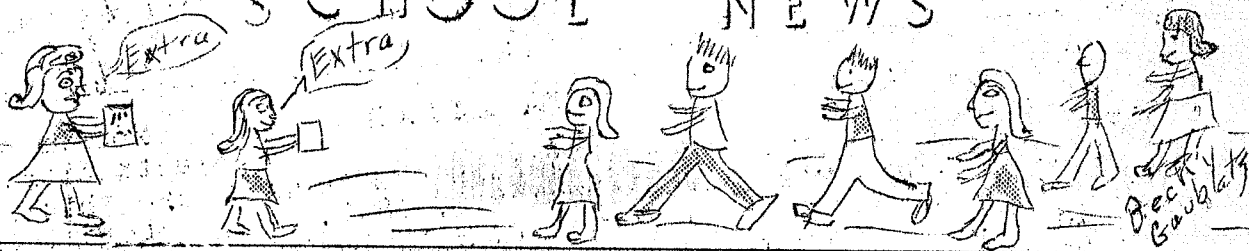

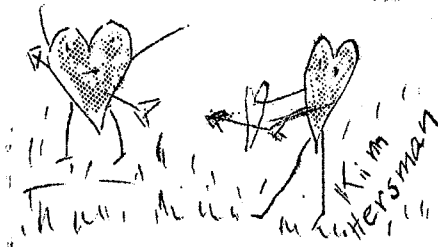

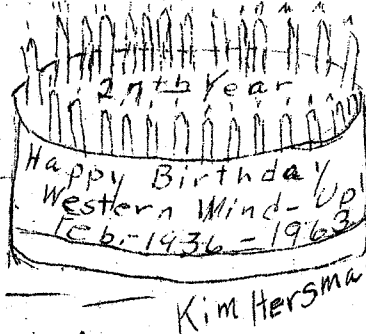


MOTHER'S CLUB

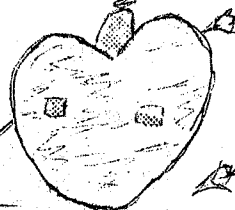
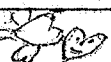
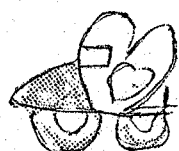
POP BOTTLE DRIVE

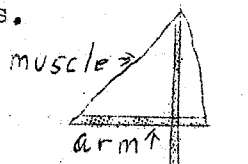

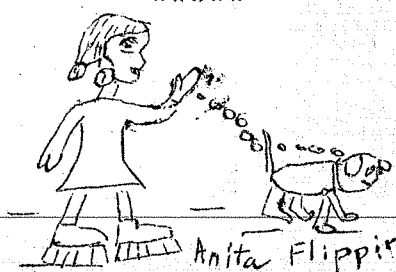

Larry Bailey and Staci Holloway are newcomers to the great team of Carbetta T.V.

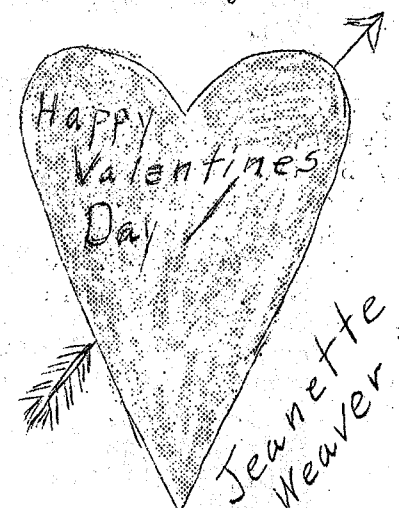
We have won one game and lost four games. St. Peters beat us 32-3. We beat Yankees 21-9. St Marys beat us 18-16. Altogether we have played five games.
