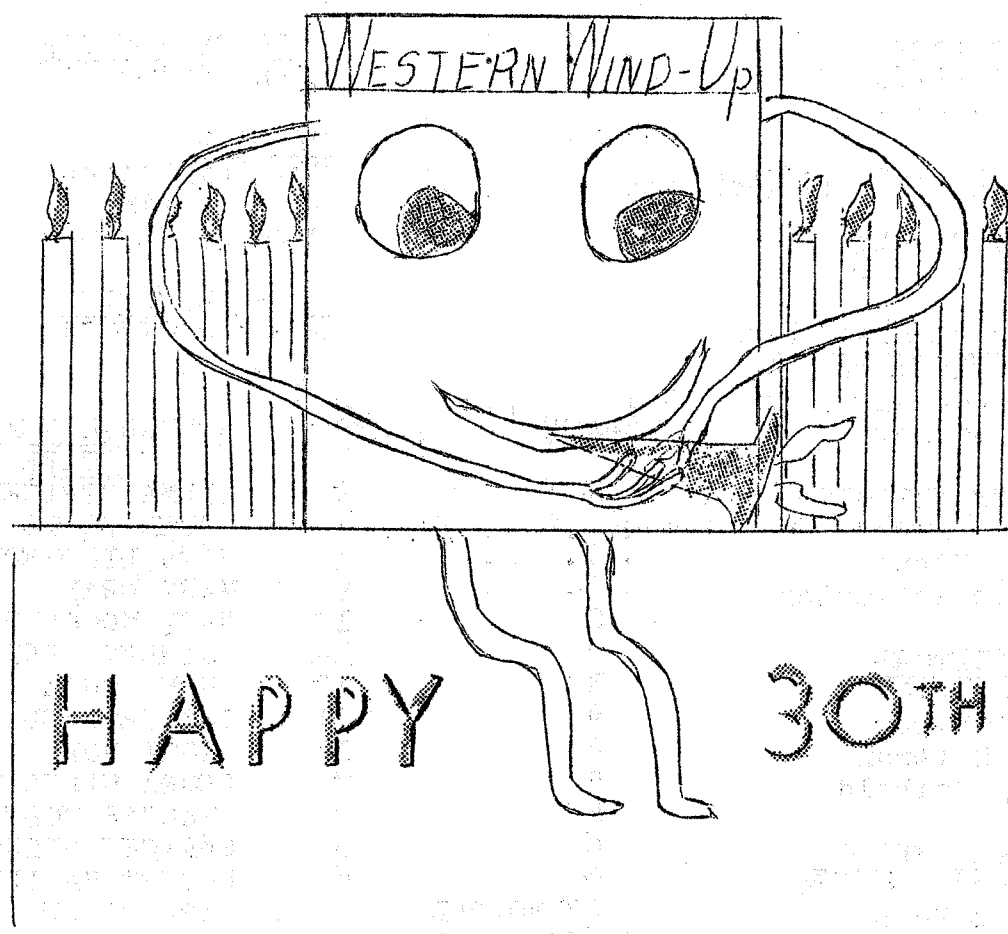


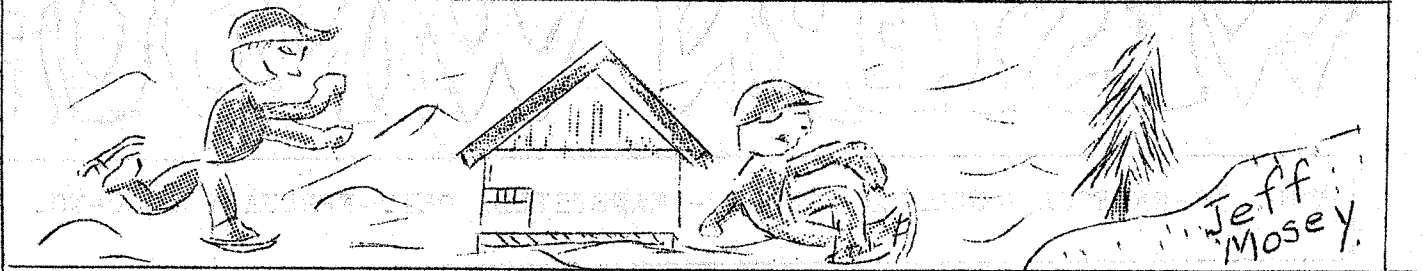

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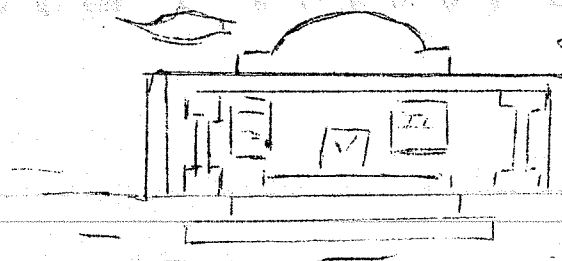

Abraham Lincoln was born in Hardin County Kentucky, February 12, 1809.

The Lincolns were English Quakers. He lived in a one room log cabin house with his family. The house had only one window with no grass and a doorway with no door. In winter they hung deer skin over the window and bear skin across the doorway. Blocks of wood were their chairs and a log was their table. He married Miss Mary Todd. In 1860 he was elected President. On Friday, April 14, 1865 at Ford's Theater, in Washington, John Booth shot the president in

the head. Lincoln passed away the next day. In 1909 a memorial building was erected at the place of his birth. The Lincoln Memorial, Washington D. C., and Lincoln park and the Lincoln statue, Chicago are tributes.

When he was about 3 years old his family moved to Hunting Creek about 50 miles from the Potomac River. The plantation there was called Mount Vernon. George had very little schooling. He learned simple arithmetic and farming methods at home. George's lack of schooling left him to be a slow reader and a poor speller. He found tutors and private teachers and learned all he could.

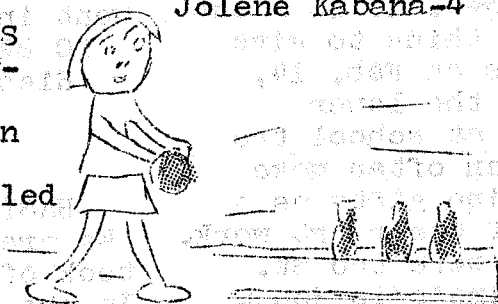

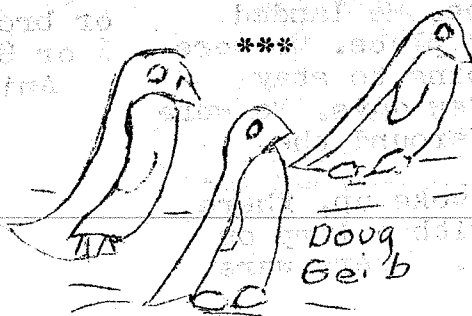

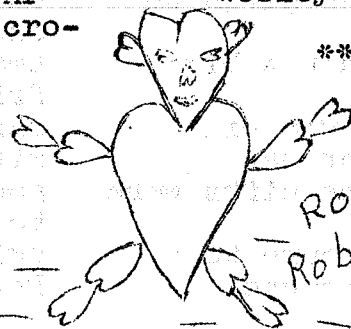
SLOT CAR RACING

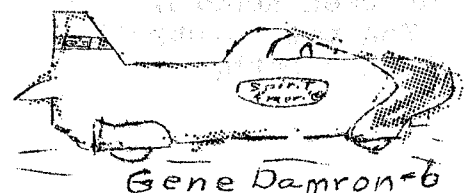
THE WOMAN IN THE MIRROR

MY CHEMISTRY EXPERIMENT

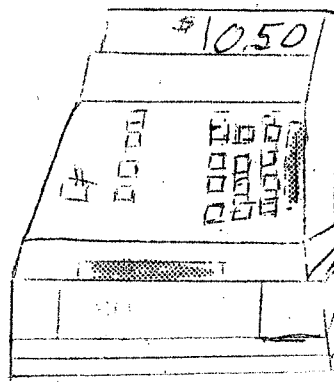
My Dad and I made several experiments.

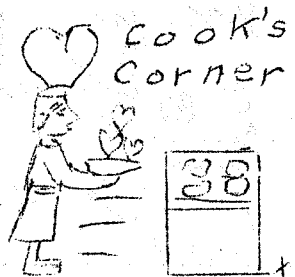

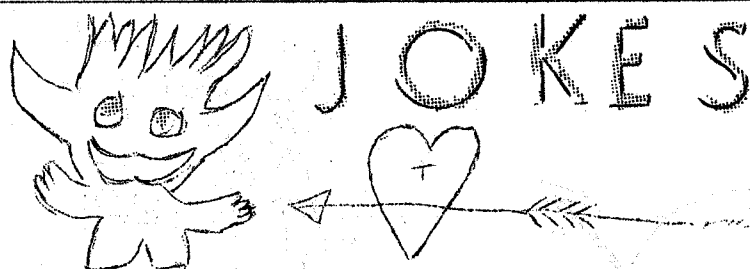
