

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



BENJAHIN FRANKLIN Benjamin Franklin was often called America's patron in 1790. Franklin was often called America's Patron Saint of Common Sense. He was the first to prove that lightning and electricity are the same. Few men have been as successful in so many fields, for he achieved fame as an author, editor, printer, inventor, philosopher, diplomat and humorist. He did many things well. He was one of the makers of America and a great friend to have. He remarked once to his wife "Debby I wish the good Lord had seen fit to make each day just twice as long as it is. Perhaps then I could

really accomplish something." As he grew old he regretted that he could not return to earth a hundred years later to see what progress mankind had made.

Franklin was the fifteenth child in a family of seventeen children. He was born in Boston, Mass., on January 17, 1706. His father, a candlemaker, wished Benjamin to become a minister and sent him to school when he was eight year: old. The boy had taught himself to read, and learned quickly. But the Franklin's were poor, and the cost of schooling proved too high for him to continue


THE WOMAN IN THE MIRROR
