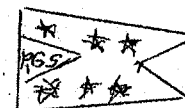
NEW TRAINS

SCIENCE EXPERIMENTS

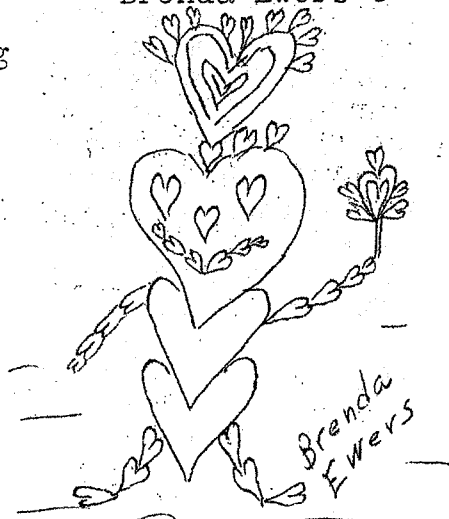

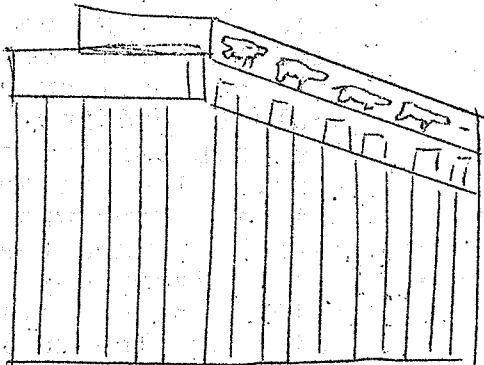

LINCOLN MEMORIAL

The monument built in Washington, D. C. to honor Abraham Lincoln is very different from nearby Washington. The Lincoln Memorial is patterned after an ancient Greek temple. From the steps of the Lincoln Memorial one looks down a long pool toward the Washington Monument. The pool is called the "Reflecting Basin". In its smooth water there are reflections of both these beautiful memorials to

great presidents. The Lincoln Memorial is built of limestone. Although it is not nearly as tall as the Washington Monument, it is not low. The columns alone are 40 feet high - as tall as a three-story building.

Inside the Lincoln Memorial there is a large statue of Lincoln. It was made by the American sculptor Daniel Chester French.

On the stone walls the memorial two of Lincoln's most famous speeches are carved. One is the Gettysburg Address; the other is the address he made when he was inaugurated president or sworn into office for the second time.

The cornerstone of the memorial was laid early in 1915. But it was not until the 30th of May, 1922, that the building was dedicated and opened to the public.

The Lincoln Memorial is not, as many people think, Lincoln's tomb. Lincoln's tomb is in Springfield, Illinois. A tall monument rises above.
