



Then in 1900, a place called Diamond Match Company chased a French patent for making non-poisonous matches. Although it didn't work in the United States because of the climate. About 11 years later, a man names William Fairburn ended the threat of

necrosis by making the same kind of match only with sequisulfide. He also changed it so it fit our climate.

(1847-1931)

Thomas Edison was probably the greatest inventor in history.

Edison was born on February 11, 1847 at Milan, Ohio. He was the seventh and youngest child of Samuel and Nancy Elliott Edison.

Edison was married to Mary Stilwell in 1871. She died in 1884 leaving three children; Marion Estell, Thomas Alva, Jr., and William.

In 1886 he married Mina Miller. The children of his second marriage were Charles, Madeline, and Theodore. Charles became Secretary of the Navy in 1939, and was elected Governor of New Jersey 1941.

CASH REGISTER

James Ritty invented the cash register. He was born in 1836 in Dayton, Ohio. In 1878, he saw a device for counting the revolutions of the ship's propellers. Then in 1879, he and his brother John, built and patented a gear-operated adding machine. Later they built a simpler paper-punch register. The Ritty's sold the business

in 1881.



POLAR LANDS



One player tries to draw something or someone, without telling the other players. See who can guess first what the player is drawing.



STUDYING THE UNITED STATES



ST. PATRICK'S DAY



Then a vision led him to go back to Ireland and become a missionary bishop. His labors were so successful that he became known for the one who "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian."


St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17th each year.

CHERRY COBBLER


1 $\frac{1}{4}$ Cup Sugar
