8. Try to get along with others.

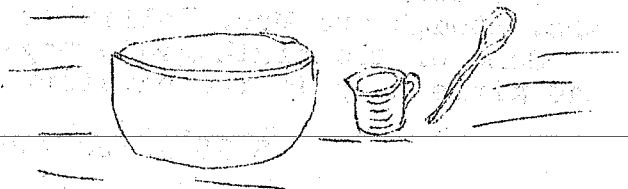

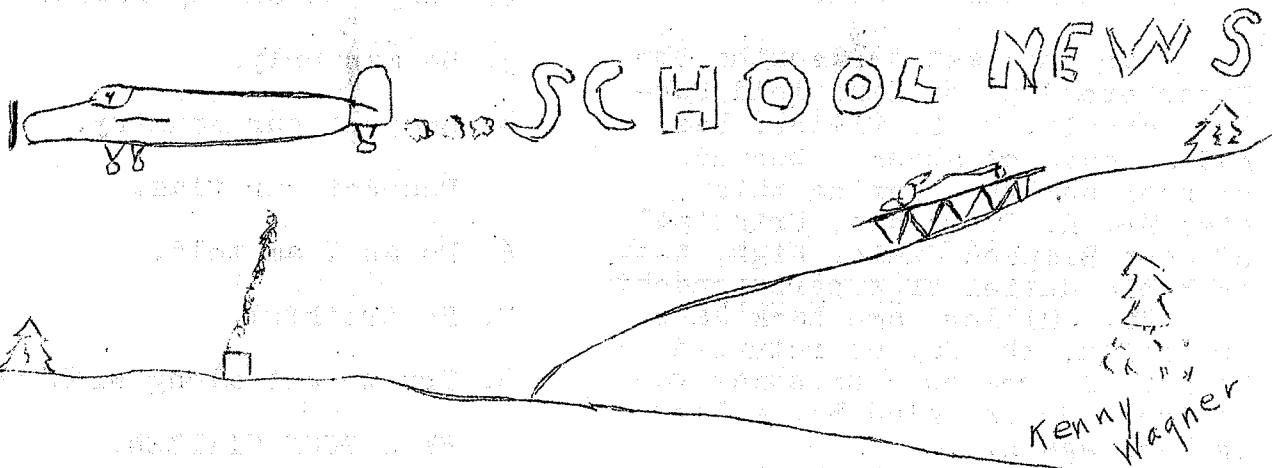


PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

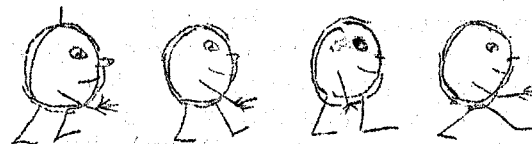

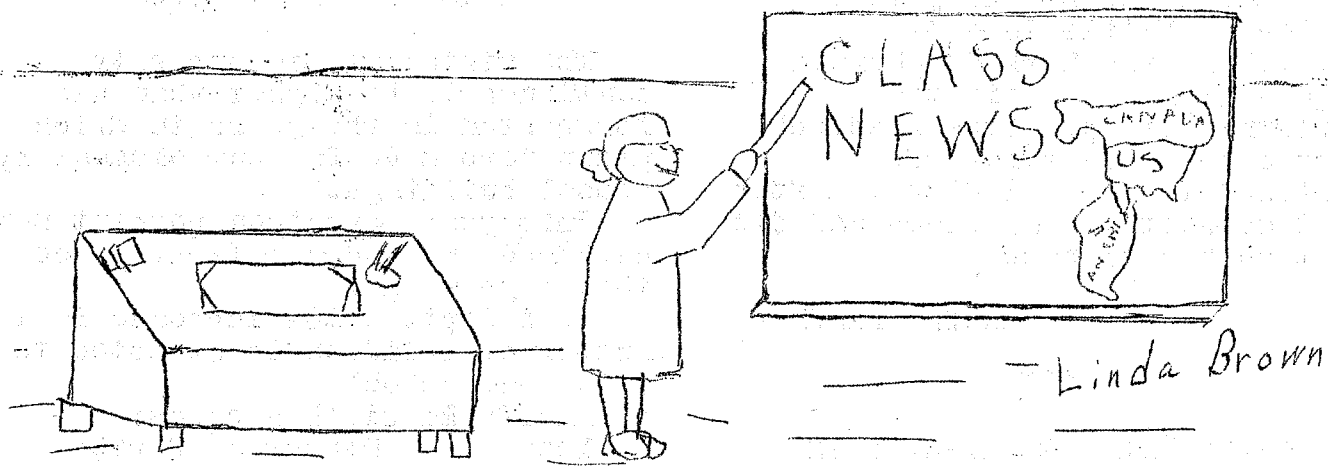

JUNIOR SCHOLASTIC TEST

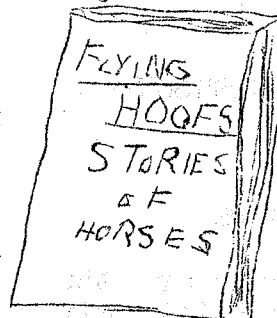
In our room we are having a Junior Scholastic test. In the test we have pictures of people in the news and flags. We have to find the last name of the people in the test and name the flag.

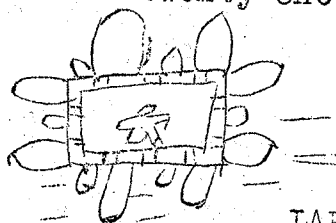
THE TWENTY-ONE BALLONS

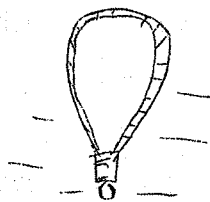
The oath was given by Fred M. Vinson on the front steps of the Capitol building.

SILHOUETTES

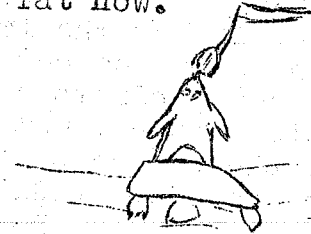
