

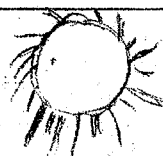
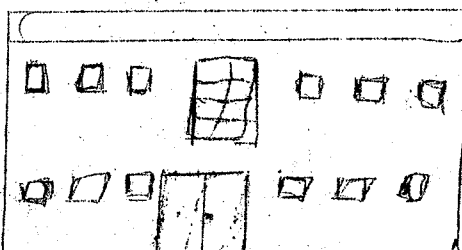

I think I will like making a church bell.

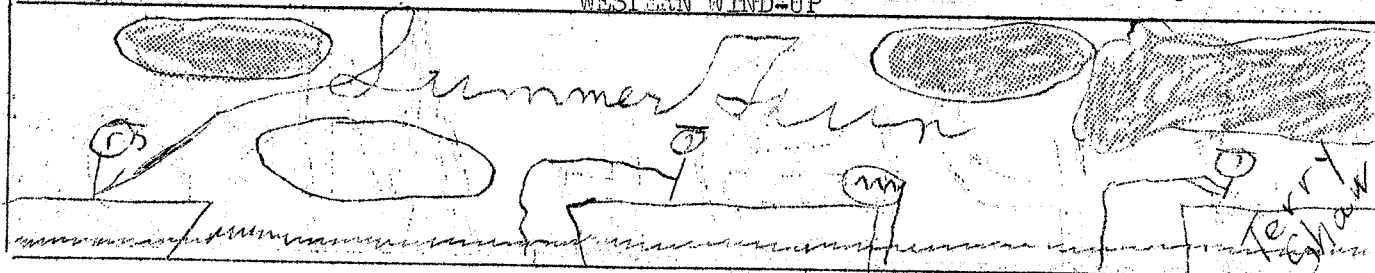

## OUR TRIP TO THE MANSFIELD NEWS-JOURNAL

On Tuesday, May 11, Miss Miles' class took a tour through the Mansfield News-Journal, conducted by Mr. Christman.

Not too many weeks ago, for the first time in 28 years, the papers weren't delivered until ten o'clock at night. Almost all of you know what happened then.

Photo engravings are made of plastic, zinc and papier mache. Hot metal is poured into the engravings. The metal is so hot that it could burn a person's hand off. A machine called Fairchild only takes about 20 minutes to turn out a picture.

In the press room, the newspapers are folded and cut. Sometimes it takes 2½ hours to make the total run of the newspapers, and at other times it takes an hour and 15 minutes. The time depends on the size of the paper. Sunday has the largest newspaper of the week. Wednesday and Thursday have the largest weekday papers. One hundred fifty people are needed to make the newspaper. The paper used in the newspapers comes from Canada and Alabama. It weighs between 1300 and 1400 pounds per roll.

In the editorial section there are files that keep very old newspapers. In a 1931 paper, peanut butter costs 10¢, and eggs 21¢ a dozen.

Today's papers are kept on microfilm. A month's issues are put on one film.

In another room, there was a teletype machine that had many pictures and stories from all over the world.

At five till eleven one night, Mr. Christman was watching the Miss America Contest on T.V. Later, they announced the winner of the contest. The next morning when he went to get a newspaper, her picture was on the front page. From Atlanta City the picture had taken only 1½ hours to get to Mansfield. The workers of the News-Journal had stayed up the very night to put the picture of the winner on the front page.

Mr. Christman works in the Ad Department. A 16 word ad would cost \$1.00 or 1.40.

The tour through the News-Journal was very worthwhile and educational.
