FAREWELL TO GRUBAUGH SCHOOL

The closing of our school is a sentimental milestone in my life, too, as I began my elementary education here and continued for nine years - kindergarten through the eighth grade. Later it was my pleasure to start my teaching career at this school and to have enjoyed working in this community through the years.

From 1911-1978 hundreds of children have had our school as the cornerstone of their developing years and it will always remain with them in their book of memories.

As we turn the pages we see a section marked, "Western Wind-Up". Our first issue was published in 1936. This was a project of our english classes - departmentalized grades 4 through 6 - with the 6th grade as the staff.

In the beginning we used a hand cranked mimeograph to run off the copies. Each page had to be counted as it went through the machine. The staff got "Ads" from our area merchants, had paper drives, and each child paid three cents a copy for his paper. In these ways they were able to buy equipment and materials for their project.

It has been my reward to see the children's ability develop into creative writing. I have been gratified to learn from time to time of our former students' interest that lead them into the field of journalism. One was Norma McCally Kipp who became a staff writer on the Omaha World-Herald. This year I received a copy of a church newsletter from Kay Klippel Michener of Oak Park, Michigan with a note, "Thanks to my fine Western Wind-Up training I was able to take over this newsletter for our church."

When observing our Twenty-fifth Anniversary, Dr. Rinehart wrote, "Not many elementary schools have a newspaper of their own. To have a newspaper for twenty-five years is surely a record which few, if any, elementary schools in the country can duplicate." (Dr. John Rinehart, Superintendent, Mansfield Schools, 1961).

With 43 years of uninterrupted publications, it has been a means of recording our school events forming a rather unique history of our school. A copy of each issue has been kept on file.

Our Western Wind-Up has been an elementary school paper with articles for the children and by the children.

Mr. Clark was the principal in 1941.

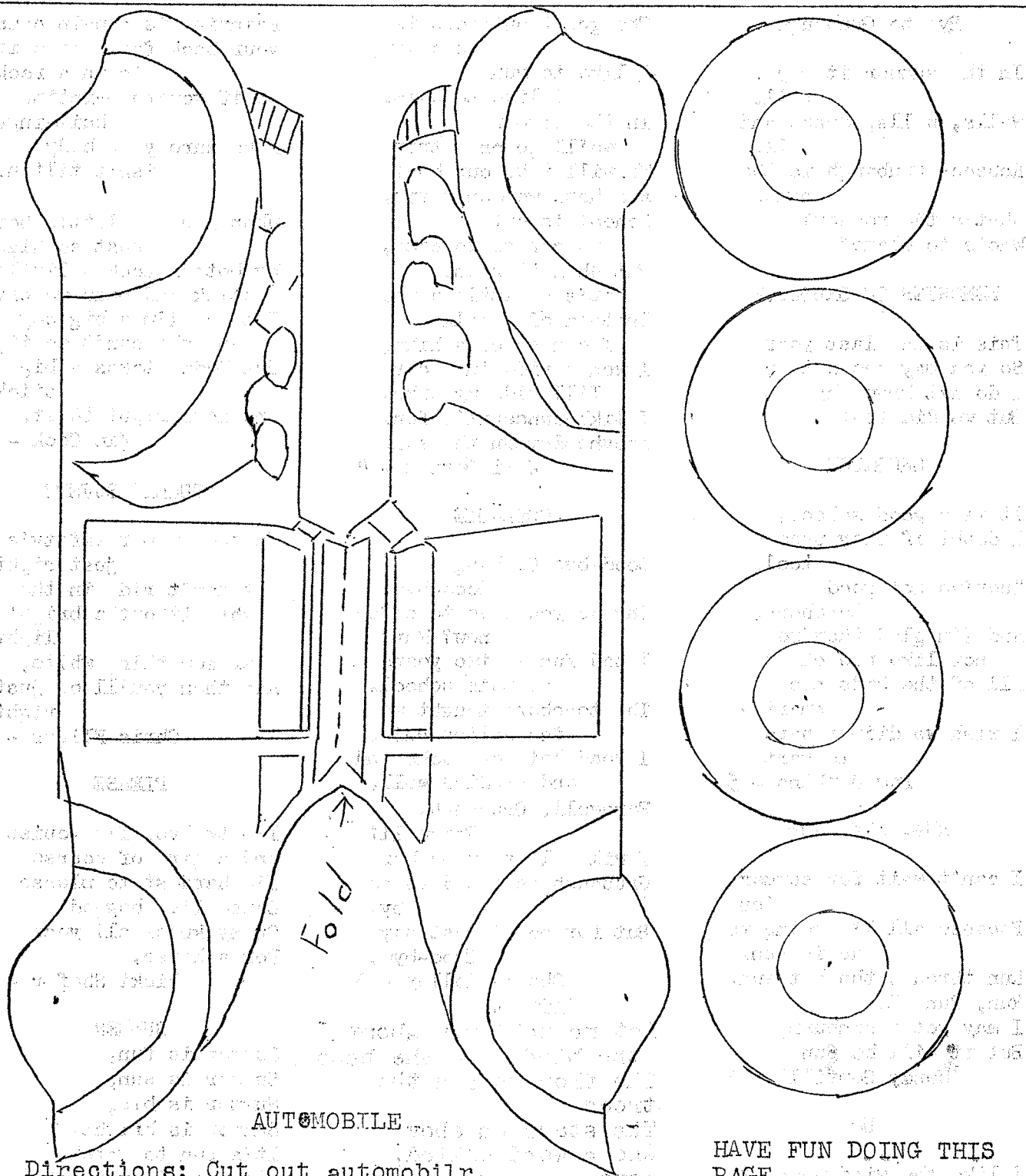
"He was one of our helpers," says a first grader.

AUTOMOBILE

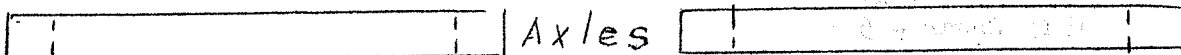

There was also a turkey barn. The turkeys made loud gobbling sounds.

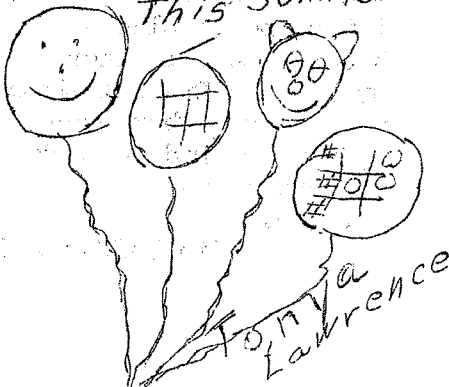
There was a group of Green Spiral Silver Fir trees. They will not make saw timber but are odd the way they spiral.
