They hope to have a large crowd. Come and bring your friends.

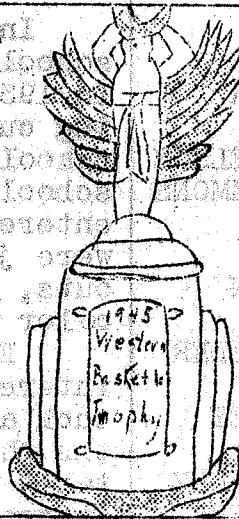

Our team includes: George, Fox, Daily, Erich and McCally on the first team. Western is out to win two trophies this year.

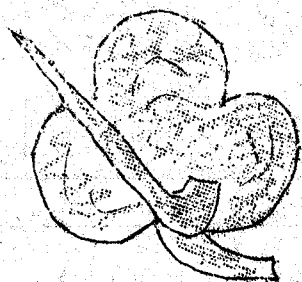

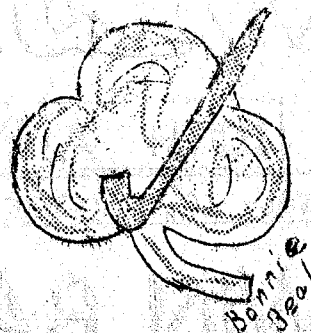
One game was lost to Bushnell 21 to 20.

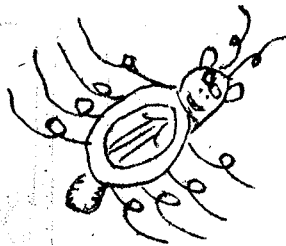
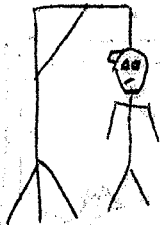
STAMPS

For our maps we are to find the most interesting historical event as well as the outstanding industries and products for each state.

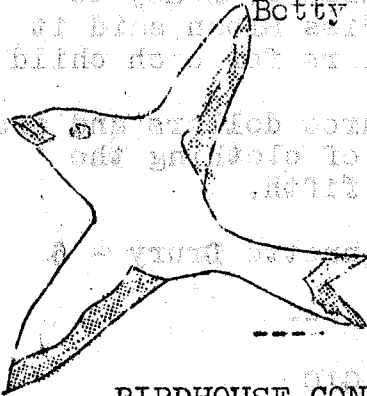

BIRDHOUSE CONTEST

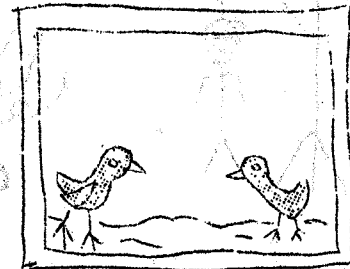

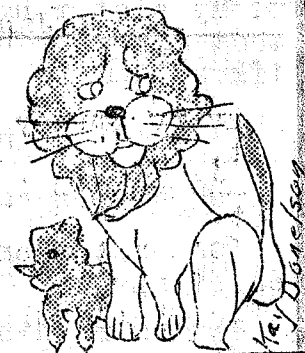
SOAP CARVINGS

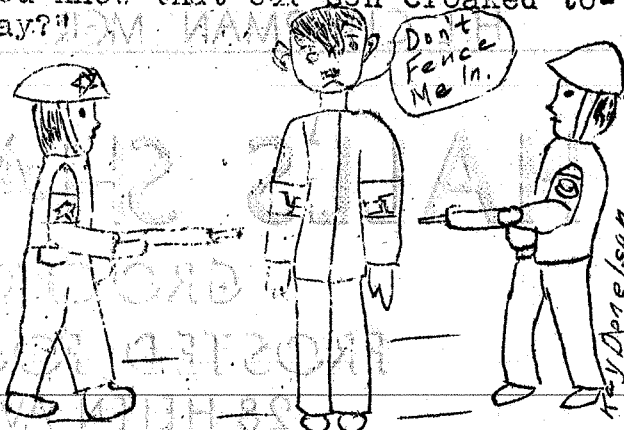

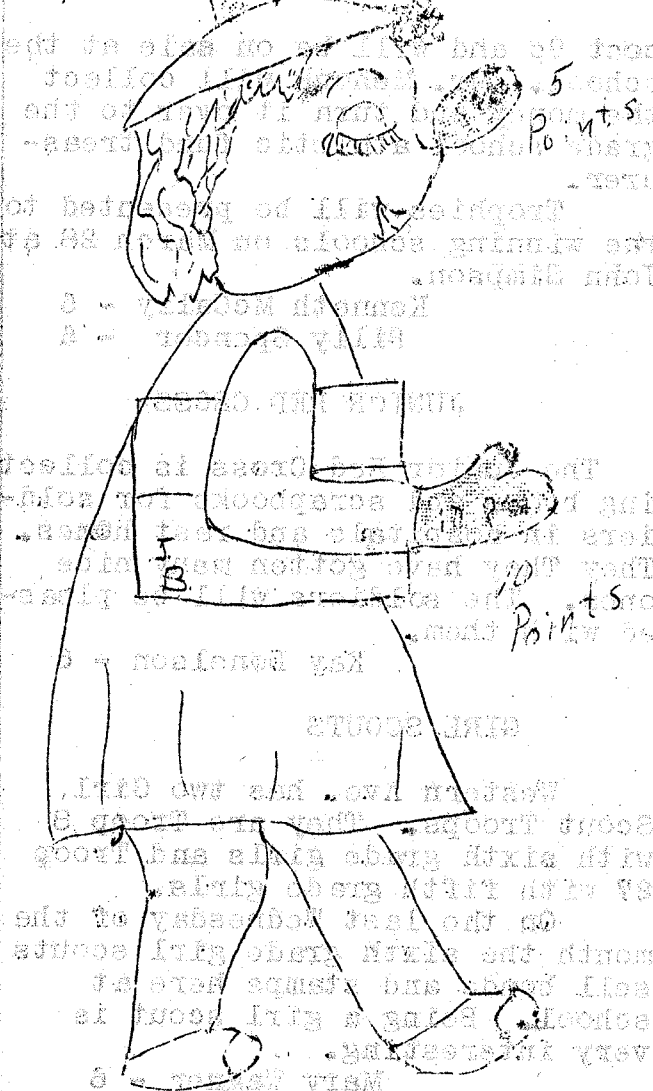
