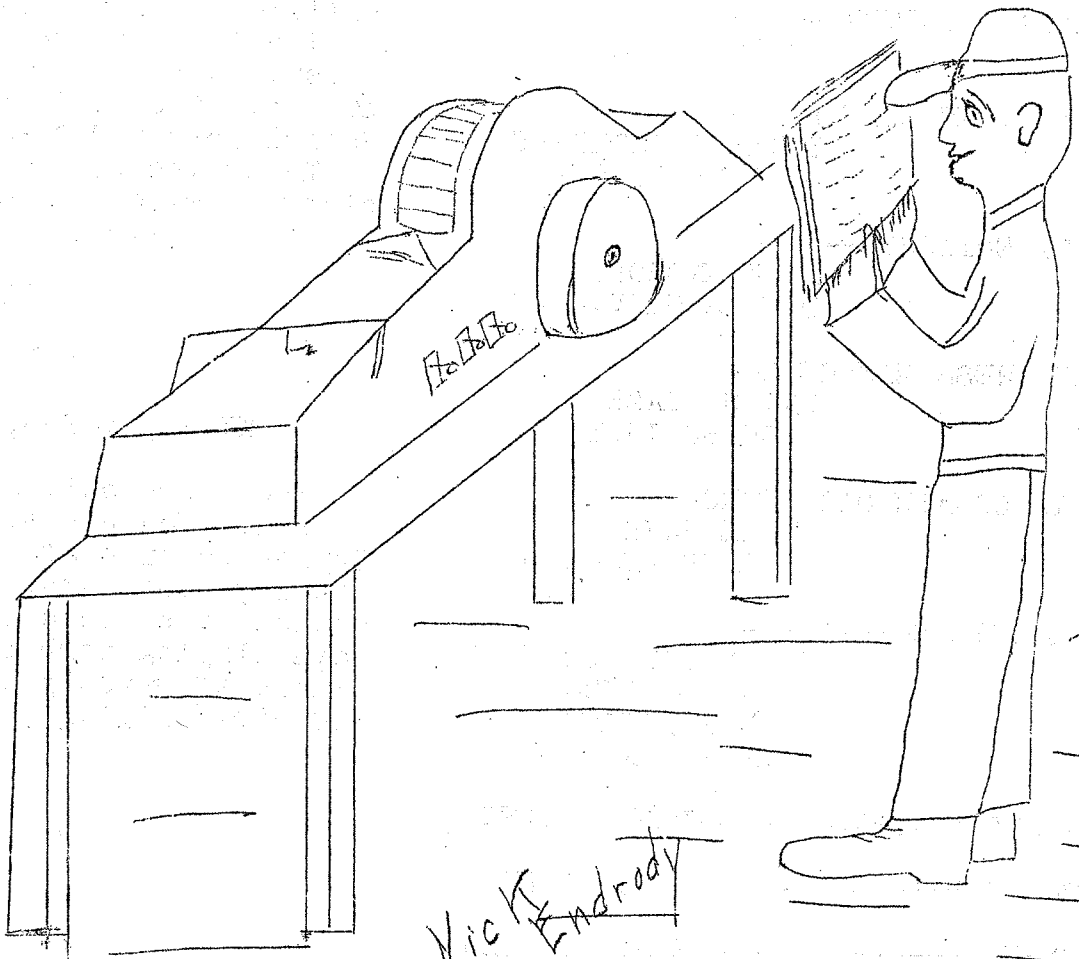

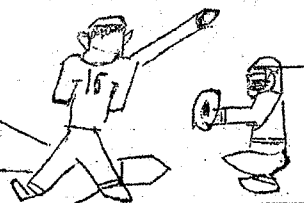

ANDREW JACKSON

Andrew Jackson was born in 1767 at Meckenburg County, N. Carolina. He joined the Army at the age of 13 years, and remained until the war was over.

In 1784 he began the study of law and in 1788 was appointed solicitor for the Western district of N. Carolina, now the state of Tennessee.

Jackson was elected President of the United States by the Democrat party, 1828 and was re-elected by a still larger majority in 1832.

Jackson died in 1845. He was elected to the American Hall of Fame in 1910. His birthday was on March 15, 1952.

They also bought spiral note books for all the boys and girls in our school. The cost was about \$64.00

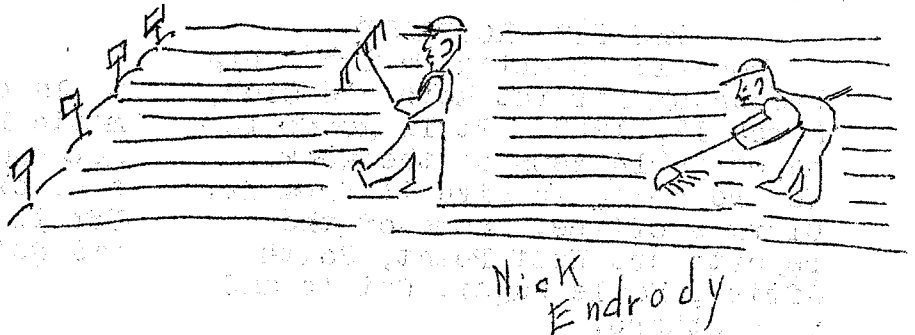

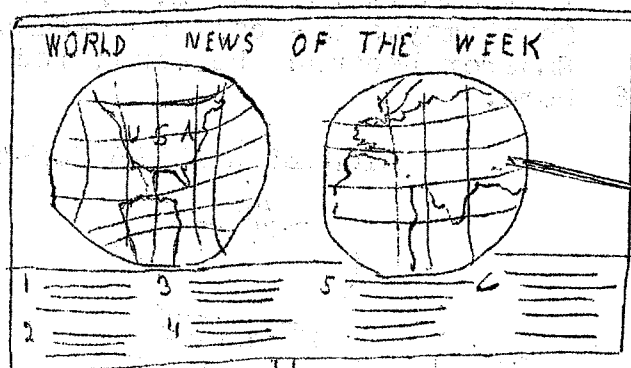

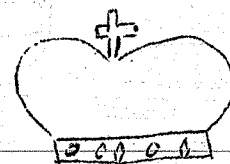


CHARLEMAYNE

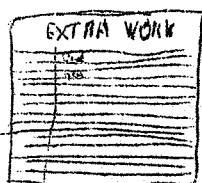

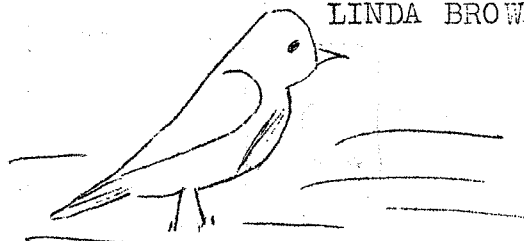

This is the pin we wear as Jr. Audubon members.

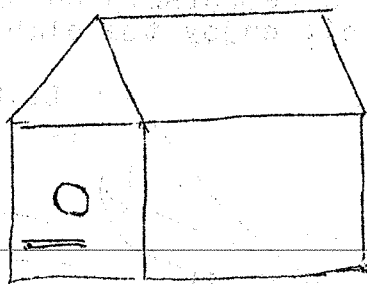

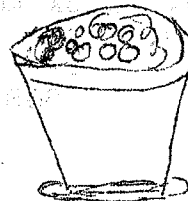

BIRD POSTERS

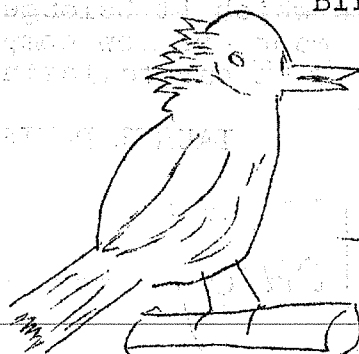

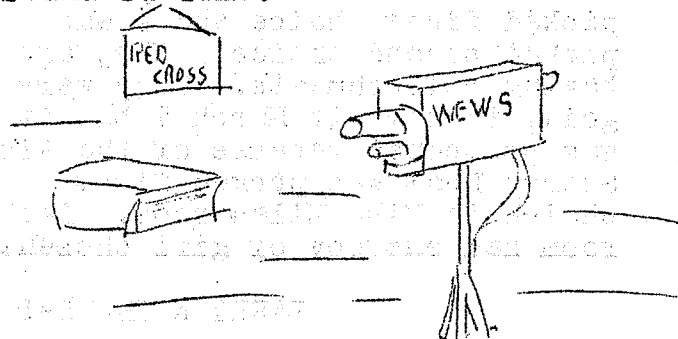
GOOD CITIZENSHIP RULES

In Yuzoslavia there is not very much to eat. When Richard came over here he got alot to eat.

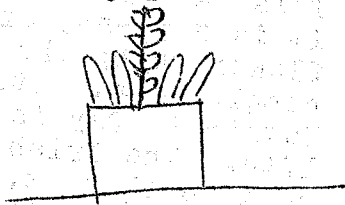

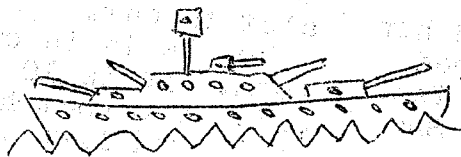

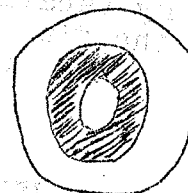
MRS. ROBERT'S ROOM

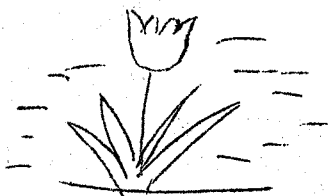

Beat yolk, add sugar, salt, milk. Strain. Add stiffly beaten white and nutmeg.

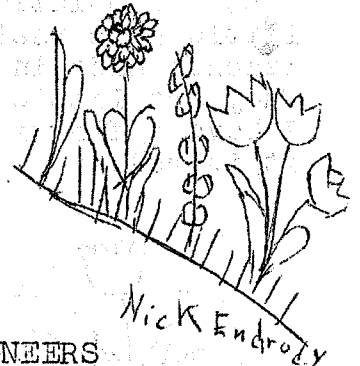
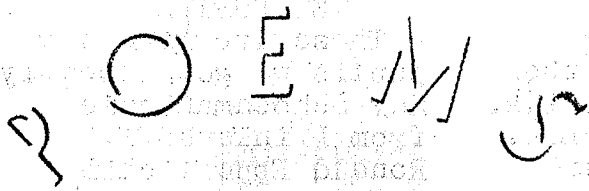
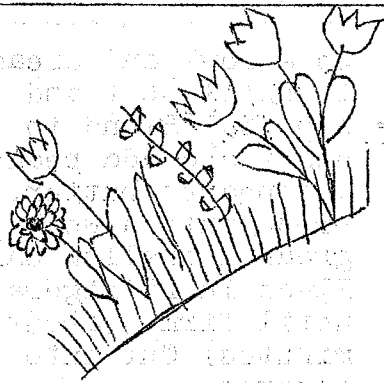
