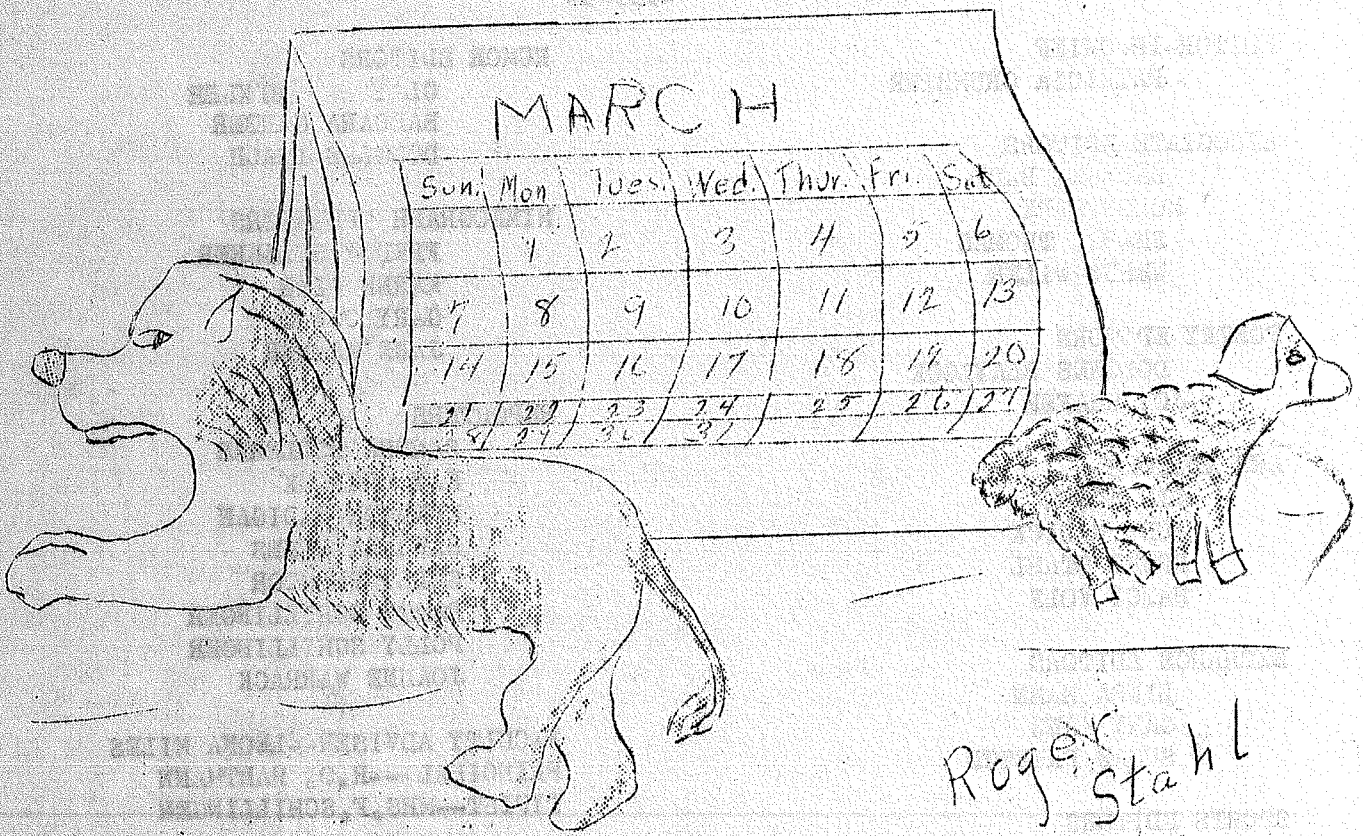


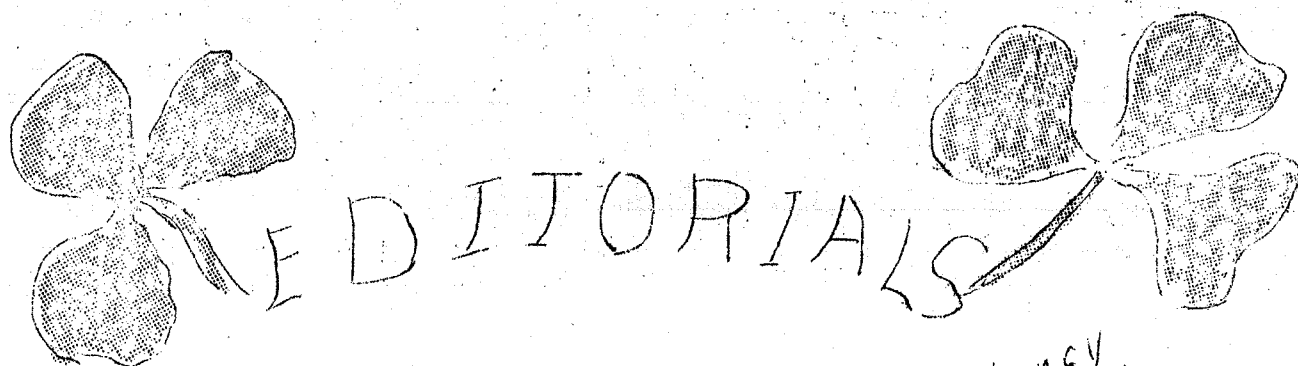

ARBOR DAY
AND CONSERVATION

Arbor Day is purely American in origin and grew out of conditions peculiar to the Great Plains of the West, a country practically treeless over much of its area but supporting a flourishing agriculture and with a soil and climate well able to nourish tree growth.

Arbor Day originated and was first observed in Nebraska in 1872. The plan was conceived and the name "Arbor Day" proposed by J. Sterling Morton. At a meeting of the State Board of Agriculture of Nebraska held at Lincoln, January 4, 1872, he introduced a resolution "that Wednesday, the tenth day of April, 1872 be Arbor Day especially set apart and consecrated to tree planting

in the State of Nebraska and the State board of agriculture hereby named it Arbor Day.

The time of the observance of Arbor Day varies greatly in different States and countries, being determined somewhat by climate and conditions. In many States it is combined with Bird Day. In general the date is early in the year in the South and is set further along toward summer in the more northern States. In some States it is in the fall and in others two dates are set, one in the spring, and the other in the fall.

Last year our school observed Arbor Day by planting a tree and giving a dedication program in Middle Park,

SAINT PATRICK

He is well loved by Ireland. He was born in Scotland. Authorities give his birthplace as Bannawenta. Patrick is the anglicized form of his Roman name, Patricius. He had a life romantic and adventurous. When he was sixteen he was captured by pirates from Ireland and carried to an island. There he tended flocks of Ulster chieftain, for six years. Not long after six years he escaped to France. There he founded over 300 churches and he personally baptized over 120,000 people. A favorite story of his is charming the snakes of Ireland by playing music. They followed him to the seashore, where they were driven into the sea. March 17 is celebrated as St. Patrick's feast day.

THOMAS ALVA EDISON

Thomas Edison was born at Milan Ohio in 1847 and died in 1931. Was one of the greatest inventors in history because his inventions have had so great an effect on our lives.

His electric light bulb, phonograph, and motion picture became known in every inhabited part of the earth.

Edison bought equipment for experimenting and set up a laboratory in the cellar at home.

Edison accomplished so much that it is difficult to point to any one achievement as his greatest.

Edison's birthplace at Milan Ohio was restored as part of a nationwide centennial observance during the week of February 7, 1947.

GEORGE WASHINGTON

When still a young man, Washington had made a reputation for being trustworthy and capable. He was strong and vigorous, and his fighting ability had been tested in battles with the Indians and French. A friend of his described how Washington looked in his twenties. As straight as an Indian, measuring 6 feet two and weighing 175 pounds-- well developed muscles, wide shoulders, neat waisted, large straight nose and dark brown hair.

At 16 he became surveyor for Lord Fairfax. At 56 he was elected president.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN

Abraham was born on Feb. 12, 1809 in a rough cabin on a small farm in the backwoods of Kentucky.

At nineteen Lincoln stood six feet four inches in his bare feet. His strength was equal to that of three men, he could lift and carry a pair of logs and could outrun and outwrestle any man in the countryside.

In spring he made a trip to New Orleans on a flatboard that one of his neighbors had given him charge of. And on his way to New Orleans for his first time he saw negroes chained and put on a block and sold to the highest bidder. It is said that the sight made him sick at the heart and that he then and there pledged himself to fight slavery if ever the opportunity came.

The Republican Party was born at this with Lincoln as one of the founders. At the first Republican National Convention held in Philadelphia 1856, Lincoln was conspicuously mentioned as candidate for Vice President, but was not nominated.

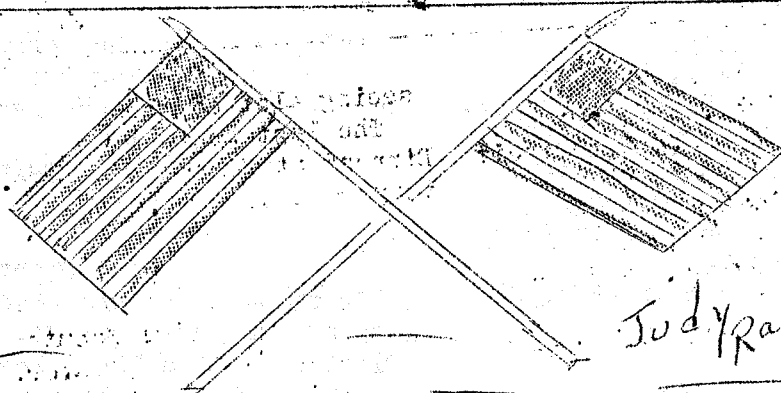
Douglas argued that people had the right to choose for themselves whether or not they would have slaves. Lincoln argued that no man had the right to be master of another, that slavery was wrong and that it must be abolished. Although Douglas won the election as Senator, Lincoln was soon to have a greater honor, that of becoming President of the United States.

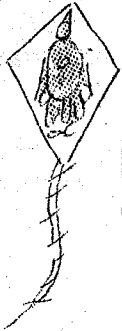
Planting Our School Lawn

REPORTS, SPEECHES, and DEBATES

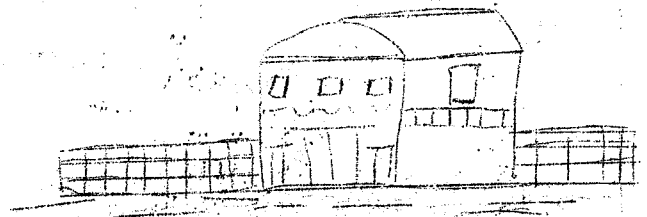

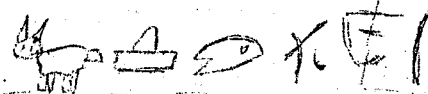
CLAY MODELS

Some of the animals are dogs, cats, fish, ant eater, ducks and an antelope.

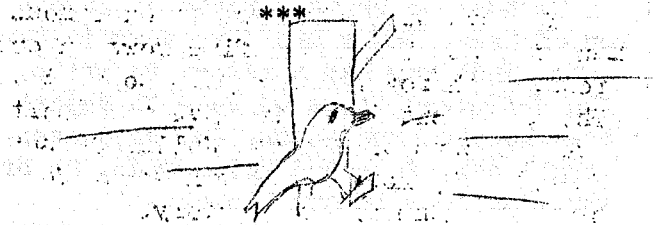

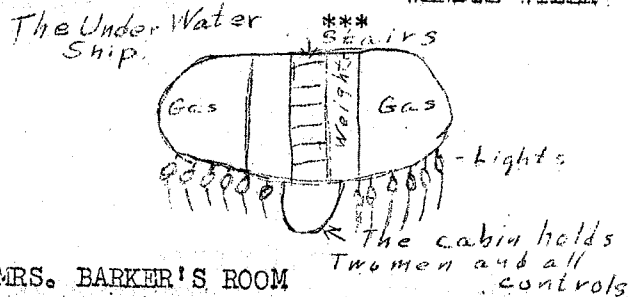
DEEP SEA DIVING

The names of the Baseball Spelling Down teams are the "Black Hawks" and the "Golden Hawks".

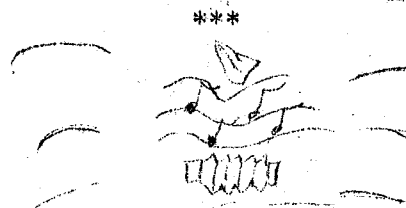

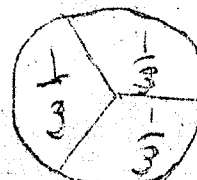
chickens, flavors and apples. They get copper out of the ground. They have dairies and forests. We made products and industries of each of our states.

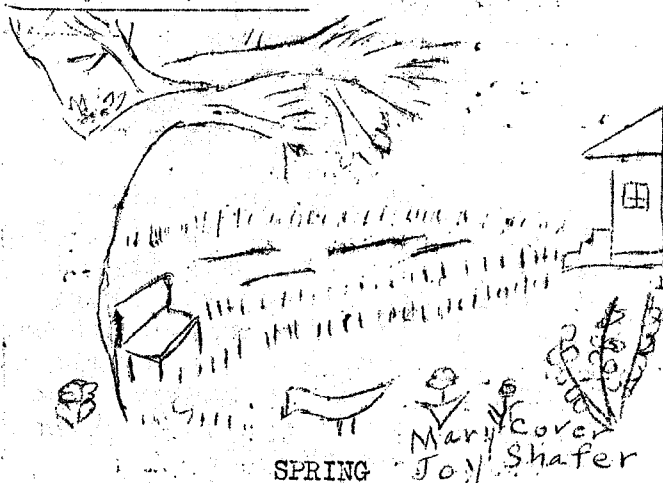
SILHOUETTES

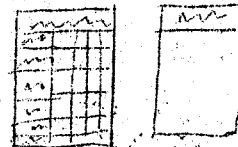
MESS WOLF 'S ROOMOUR CHARTS

the wall we had built. That was the end of the snow fort.

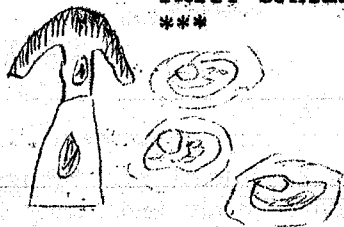

The Midnight Colt

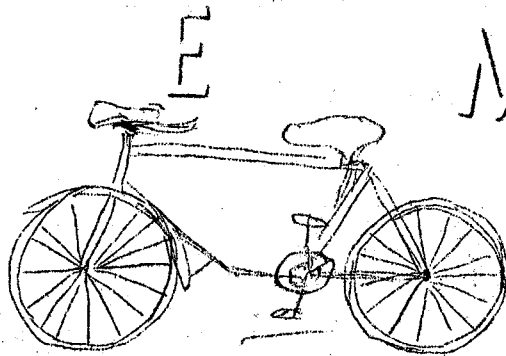
I read an interesting book called The Midnight Colt. I think anybody who is interested in horse books will like this one.
