

St. Patrick was born at Bannaven, England. Patrick is the English name for Patricius, St. Patrick had a life full of adventures. At the age of 16, he was





These are only a few facts about New York City. Now you know why it is called the greatest city in the world.




CHICAGO :

My illustration shows the tall skyscrapers of Chicago.

The beginning of Chicago dates back to 1777, when a San Domingo negro settled there as an Indian trader. In 1803, he sold his house to John Kinzie. In 1804, a stock-ade was built there and named Fort Dearborn. During the war of 1812, the fort was captured and men, women, and children, were massacred. The fort was reconstructed in 1816 and about it rose a small village which has grown into the present Chicago.

Today, Chicago, is the second largest city in the United States and fifth largest in the world. The population is 3,620,962. The area is 211.3 square miles. Chicago is the greatest livestock and meat-packing center on the globe and the Chicago Union Stockyard is the world's largest. Chicago is also the largest railroad center and the most important grain market in the world.



THE SEQUOIA REDWOOD TREES

the oldest living things on earth. There are two different kinds. One is the redwood sequoia and the other is the giant sequoia. Both are very large trees and live to be thousands of years old.

The redwood grows only in the mountains near the Pacific Ocean in southern Oregon, and more than one-half of the northern part of California.

GRAND CANYON

The Grand Canyon is in Arizona. It is the largest canyon in the world.


The gigantic canyon is hidden. so that you come on it suddenly. You are in high country, but on a flat plain covered with nice smelling pine woods. You walk a few hundred feet farther and right at your feet is a drop a mile deep, four to eighteen miles across, and two hundred seventeen miles long. The best way to see the canyon is to walk to the rim and look.

The noisy Colorado River rushes at the bottom of the canyon. What you see is a cross-section of the earth crust. The sides of the canyon are made of rocks, cliffs, ridges, hills, and valleys of every Many of the ridges have form. weather-carved lines which resemble Chinese temples. Both rims of the canyon are covered with thick forests. The highest points of the rim are about 9,000 feet above sea level.

The most surprising beauty of this canyon comes from the colors of its rocks. These rocks were formed millions of years ago. They were gradually pushed down as each layer of new rock was formed. you look down into the deepest part of the canyon where the Colorado River is, you would see the rock is dark and quite different in texture s from all the other layers. That's the original land that went under the sea. Geologists call it the "basement." There are many layers of different colored rocks. All the rock layers except the dark ones have fossils of early animal and plant life.

MAMMOTH CAVE

I am writing about Mammoth Cave for this issue of Western Wind-up. Mammoth Cave is the largest cave in the world.

Mammoth Cave is 100 miles south of Louisville in Kentucky. It covers more than 79 square miles of hill country. The lowest level of the five different levels in the cave is 350 feet below the surface. The cave is filled with beautiful rock formations called stalactites and stalagmites. The formations have the shapes of flowers, fruits, trees, and waterfalls. They are colored red, white, yellow, and purple.

It contains 8 waterfalls, 3 rivers, and 2 lakes. The largest stream is Echo River, which is from 20 to 60 feet wide.

One of the many wonders of the cave are the fish without any eyes. There are also blind crickets and beetles, in the cave. There is a mummy of an Indian in a glass case, there.

Mammoth Cave was supposed to have been found while a hunter was tracking down a wounded bear. The hunter's name was Robert Houchins and the date was 1799. MR. MITCHELL AND THE BELLS


Mr. Mitchell came to our room and brought bells with him. The bells were numbered all the way up to 10.

A DAY TO REMEMBER IN OHIO

I have lived in the Philippines, in Japan and in many
states in the United States but
last week I spent a day on a
farm in Ohio that I will never
forget.

My family and I went to a farm 25 miles from Mansfield. First of all we went to a large red barn. There were about thirty cows outside. Inside we were allowed to get right in the pens with the baby calves and pet them.

Then our friend who was showing us his 500 acre farm went to another barn and came riding back on a tractor and hitched the tractor to a wagon of hay and in we piled on the hay. Away we went to the maple forest. We were delighted for we had not expected a hayride.

We drove down the main road, then to a side road by the farm house and behind the house across the fields where no car could go. Then deep in the forest we stopped and got out and walked — across a tiny stream, and up a small hill, and there sat a little hut with steam pouring out the cracks in the roof and the sides. We went inside and the steam was pouring up like a Japanese hot bath. We could barely see each other.

The clear, almost tasteless sap was pouring in the
boiling vat from a pipe at one
end of the room and as it boiled,
it went into different vats until it became concentrated syrup in the last one. Wood fires
underneath kept it boiling. We
stuck our fingers in to taste
until the little old man in
charge finally poured glasses

of the syrup for us to drink. I ran outside and got a piece of snow and poured some of my syrup on the snow and was it ever good!

It takes 60 gallons of the sap to boil down to make one gal-

lon of pure maple syrup.

We went outside again and learned how the sap is taken from the maple trees. A hole is drilled into the tree with a brace and bit. Then a spile is put into the hole, a bucket is hung on the spile and the sap runs through the spile and drips into the bucket.

We walked deeper and deeper into the forest looking at the maple trees. Some trees had as many as three buckets hanging on them, but most had only one. Before long a man came up driving a jeep with a tank on the jeep that holds 500 gallons of sap. We ran in all directions to help empty the sap buckets into the tank on the jeep.
