Sometimes if a young man found an ear of red corn he would get a kiss from a pretty girl.

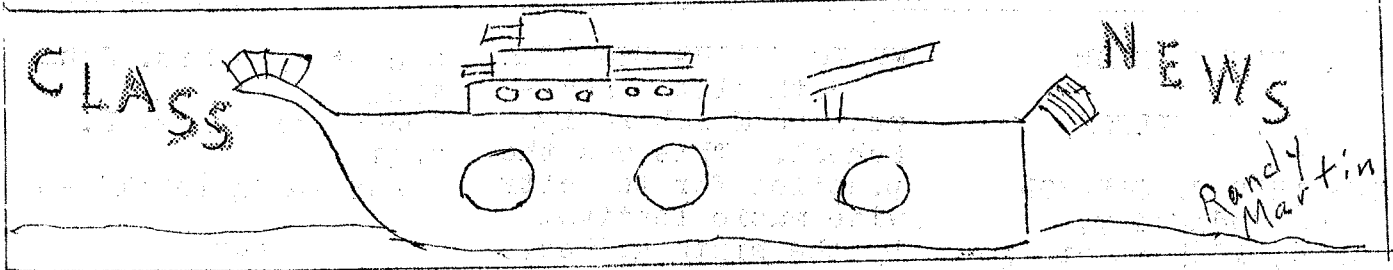
Life was hard, but, it was fun at times.

The canceling machine averages about 30,000 cancellations a day. During a single day at Christmas time last year there were 900,000 cancellations.

There is a machine that wraps string around bundles of letters and ties them together.

Mansfield is a sectional city. In a zip code 44 stands for Ohio, 90 for the district, 6 for Western Avenue.

The pouches for first class mail are sent out every day even if it is empty or has only one letter in it. They put a lock on the pouch. One key opens all the pouches in the United States.

We had two guides, Miss Helen Skarholt

and Mr. Jerry Wolfert.

We saw how the photographs are made ready for the paper. There was a lathe machine. Behind it was an electronic eye that picks up everything it sees and transfers it to a cutting needle to a roll on another machine. It usually takes a half hour to transfer an average size picture.

The "morgue" room has the files of all the newspapers printed since 1891. The copies of the papers were made on microfilm and then can be seen on the Kodagraph machine. One film contains the newspaper for one month.

In the teletype room news was coming over the automatic machines from the Associated Press, United Press, and the International News Service.

The composing room with the linotype machines was very interesting.

All of us liked to watch the big press.

We saw how the ton rolls of paper were put on it and then how they came off the press as finished printed, cut and folded News Journals. It could print 42,000 papers an hour.
