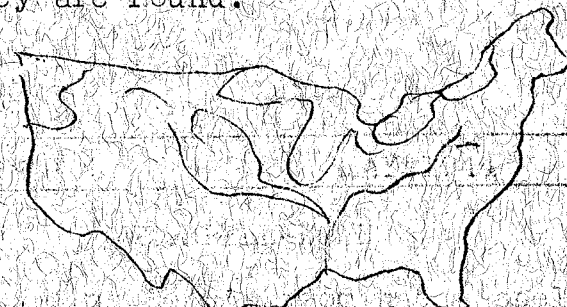

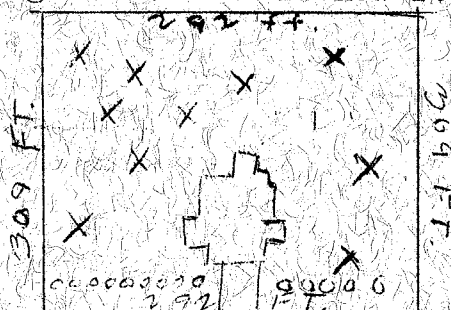

The father sings his very best, so the mother bird can rest.



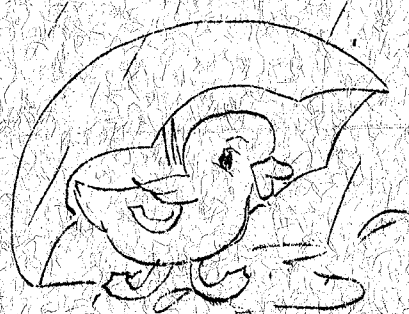

## OUR VISIT TO THE NEWS JOURNAL

The staff of the Wind-Up went down to the News Journal office to see just how our daily newspaper is made.

We first went to the news room. There we saw the Editors and Reporters at work at their desks.

Then we watched the teletype machines. They are like automatic typewriters. News may come from London, England to Mansfield in five minutes. The machines travel at sixty words a minute and work eight hours a day.

We saw some pages that were completed and ready to go to the composing room. Then there was the proof press. That's a machine to find out if they have made any mistakes in the paper. In the composing room they fit the different pages together.

In the "Mat Room" is where mats are made of the set type, the roll that has the type on it rolls over a heavy cardboard leaving the letters imprinted on it. From there the mat is sent down a chute into the press room. Hot lead is poured over it making a set of type used on the press to print the paper.

The "Photographic Room" was an interesting one. A camera that cost \$3000 was there. A screen in the camera 16'' by 22'' cost \$300. The screen itself was made about 150 ft. below the surface of the earth because the vibrations above would break the screen while being made.

From the camera the film goes into a vacuum container that develops it. Hot zinc is poured over the pictures and hardens. It is called "halftone" or "newtone". These are put in an acid that makes the picture useable in the paper. Sixty-five lines of dots make up a picture. They have a file of five thousand pictures of service men and twenty thousand pictures

of other things.

The last room was the press room. There we saw great rolls of paper which weighed from 1400 to 1500 pounds. They use from 4 to 6 rolls of paper a day and 10 rolls for the Sunday edition.

The paper starts at the roller and gets bleached, goes through the print cuts and comes out ready to read. The press cuts, folds and counts the papers into groups of fifty.

About 13,000 copies are used in Mansfield, the rest are used in surrounding communities.

Last of all Mr. Lindsay gave us each a copy of that day's paper as it came off the press.

We wish to thank Mr. Lindsay for being our guide at the News Journal, also Mrs. Freeland, Mr. Christ and Mr. Clark for taking us in their cars.

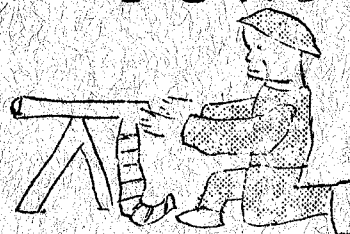
## MUSIC WEEK PROGRAM

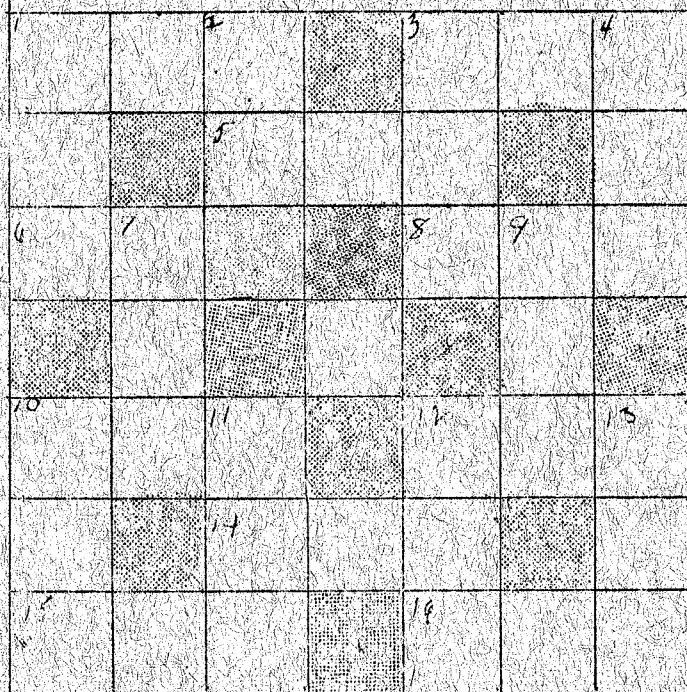
