A three-reel comedy will be shown. Bingo will be played, with cakes as prizes. There will be ponies for the children to ride, as well as a fish-pond.

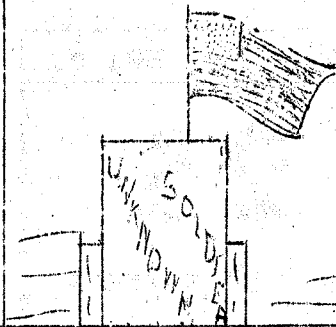
Refreshments may be purchased - hot dogs, potato chips, Coca-Cola, fudgecicles popcorn, ice cream bars.

For the fish-pond the children in the school are bringing in small articles to trade with another school.

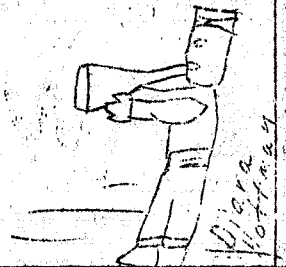
Children will sell tickets again this year. The room selling the most per pupil will receive an award.

2. The combined garden shall not be more than 20' by 25', nor less than 5' by 12'.

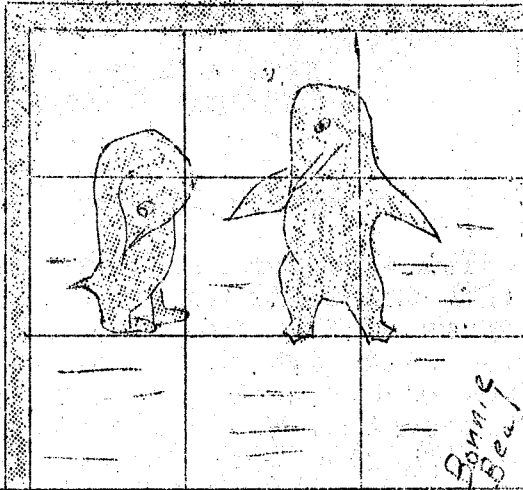
The garden plot must be a separate unit apart from the garden of the child's parents, or close by in the neighborhood.

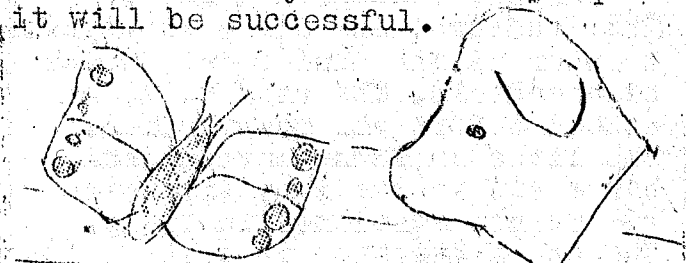

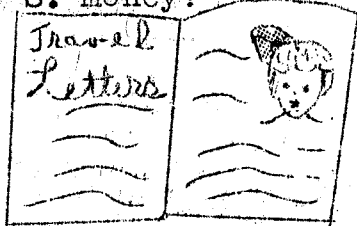

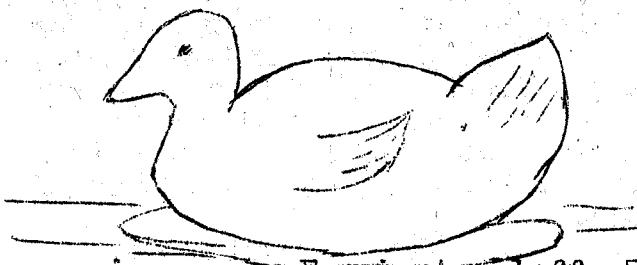

Give me the milk and also the meat.

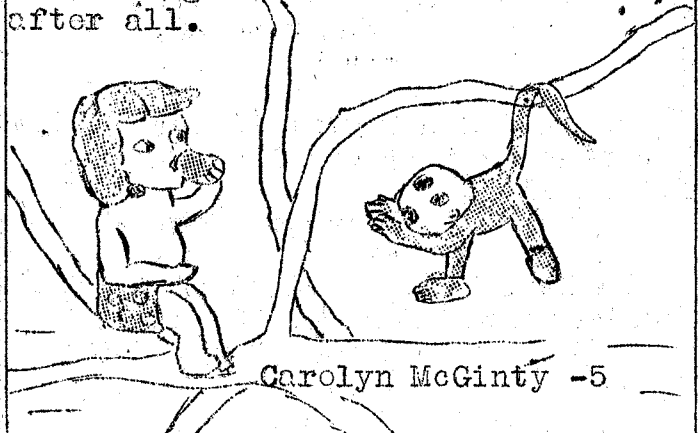
Oh please, don't be such a pig,

I thought that would be better, after all.

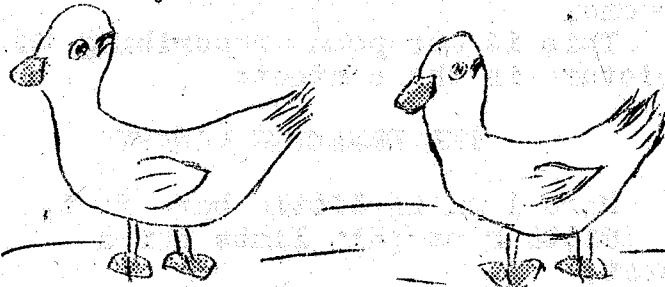

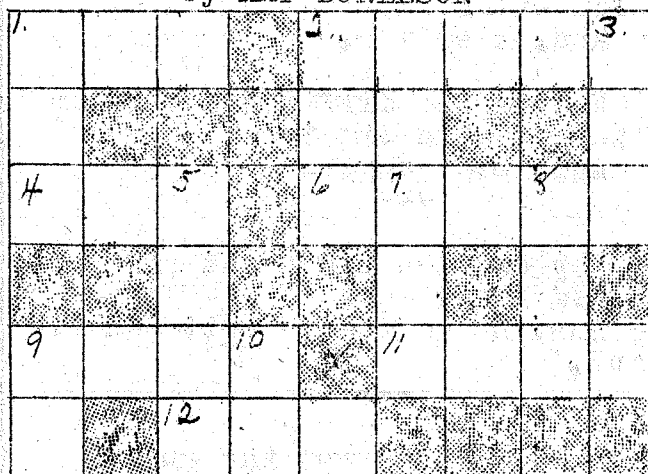
