circled Mansfield and came back to the airport. For most of the boys it was their first trip in an airplane.

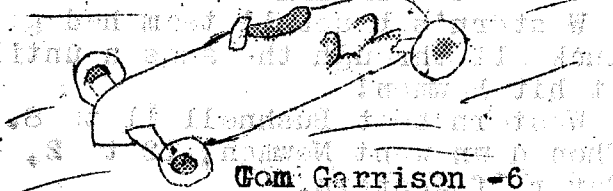

THE GIRAFFE

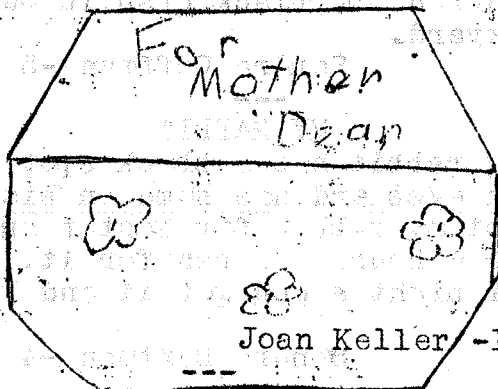

You'll walke up early with the dawn.

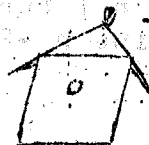

We all had a very nice time. We did all this to help earn our second class badges.

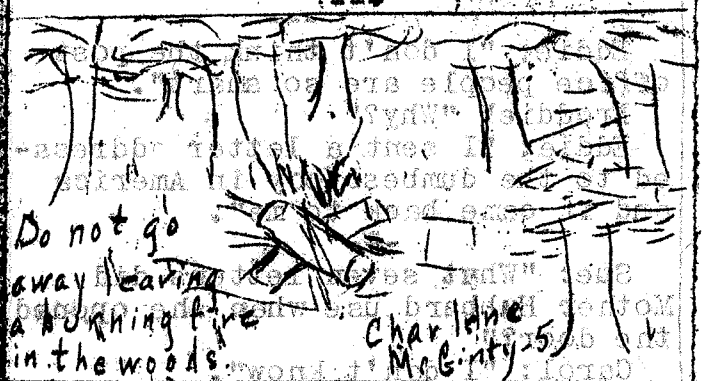
