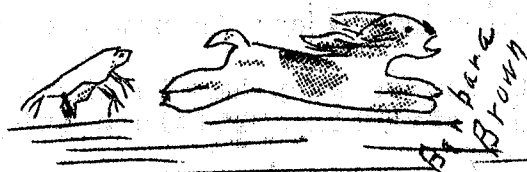
I have a cat and fish. The cat is black and white. The fish is gold. I call my cat Duchess and my fish Jean.

The one who is in charge of arranging the paper knows fairly well what it will look like when printed. The colored funnies are made in Buffalo.

We saw the papers printed for that day. While we waited for the presses to start we went to a room where all the paper is kept. Each week they use four tons of paper. They're able to print about 10,000 papers an hour. This was an interesting trip and was enjoyed by all.
