

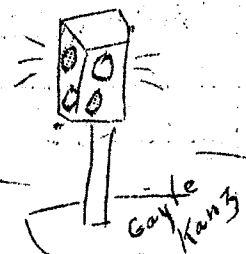
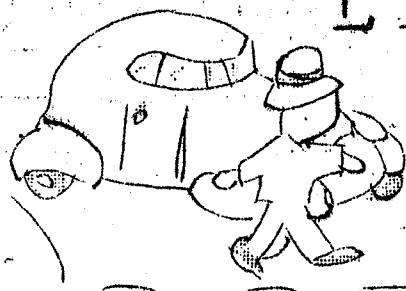

## LAWN FETE

The annual Western Avenue lawn fete will be held May 14 at North Lake park. Baked beans, cake, coffee, sloppy joes, potato salad, ice cream, hot dogs, popcorn, potato chips, and soft drinks will be served. For entertainment there will be ring toss, darts, movies, adult and children bingo, lpony rides, fish pond and a spill the milk.

There will be adult and children raffles. The adult prizes will be a \$100 Westinghouse table model AM and FM radio, a \$40 Sunbeam Mixmaster, electric mixer, a Westinghouse electric iron and an electric clock.

The children's prizes will be a Shelby bicycle, a wood-carving set, and a bat and ball. Adult chances will be twenty-five cents each or five for a dollar. Children's chances will be ten cents each or three for twenty-five cents. The drawing will be shortly after nine o'clock.

The prices will be the same as last year. Serving will start at five thirty. There will be four food lines.

The food that the parents will be asked to bring should be taken to the pavilion. The tape bearing the owner's name should be placed on each pan or container to be returned.

The children of the school will sell the tickets. The tickets will be five cents and ten cents. There will be a prize for the child in the school who sells the most tickets. There will be a prize for the child in each room who sells the most tickets and one for the room selling the most tickets.

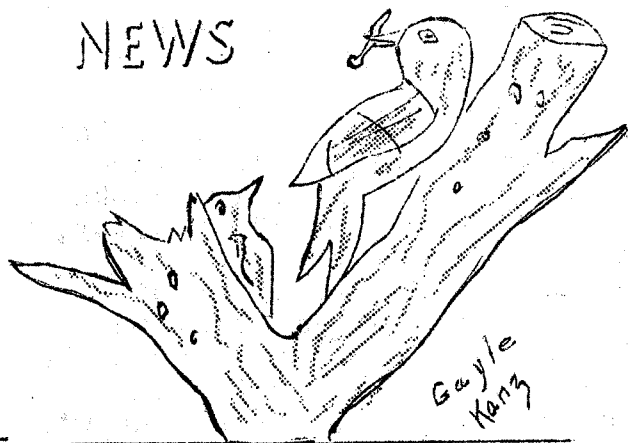

We spend one reading class a week reading library books. We make reports on the stories we have read. Some of these reports are:

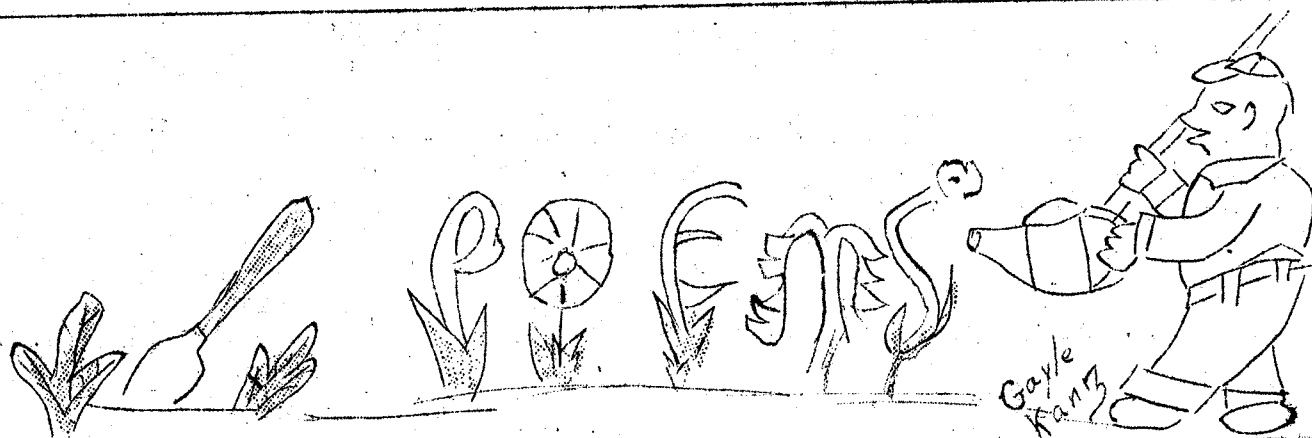

On May 1, the Western Wind-Up staff took a trip to the Mansfield News Journal.

Our guide was Mr. C. Stine. The first thing we saw was the editorial room where the editors of the different departments write their articles. Next we saw the teletypes. They are automatic typewriters which bring news from all over the world. One piece of news was about an airport built in Japan. It would take nearly thirty months to build it.

There was a room with books of old files of newspapers which go back to 1885.

In the composing room we saw the metal sets for the paper. These develop the mats which are sent down to the press room where the paper is printed. Large rolls of paper are placed at the end of a big press. Newspapers are turned out printed, cut and folded from this one machine. It only takes 45 minutes to put out 25,000 papers.

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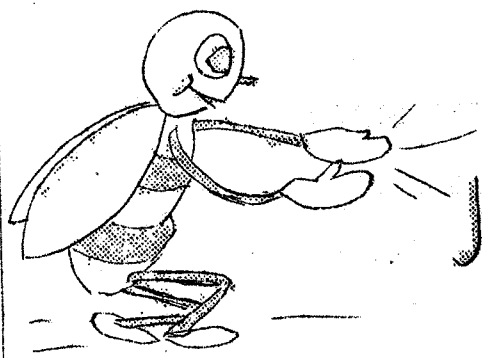

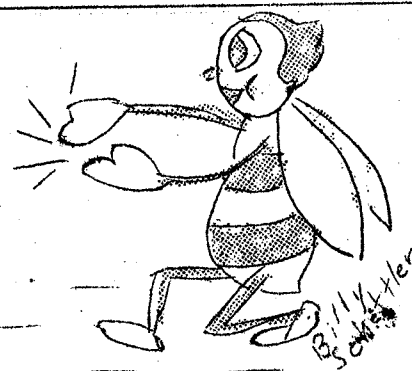

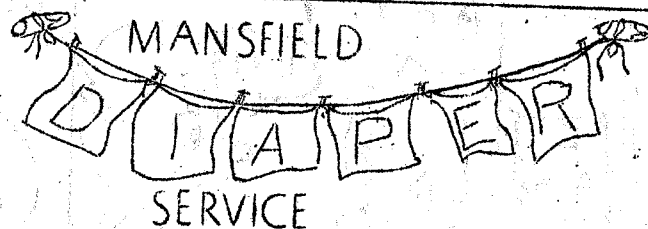
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
