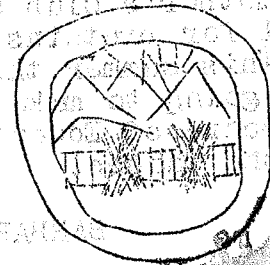
Here are a few things that you can be sent to court for; riding at night without lights, riding without a license, riding two people on a bicycle, and riding on the sidewalk with a bicycle.

Our school was going to have a musical, celebrating Ohio's 150th. birthday. It was cancelled because of all the things taking place at the end of the school year



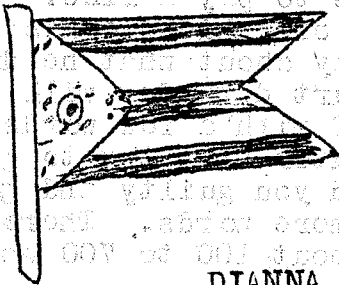

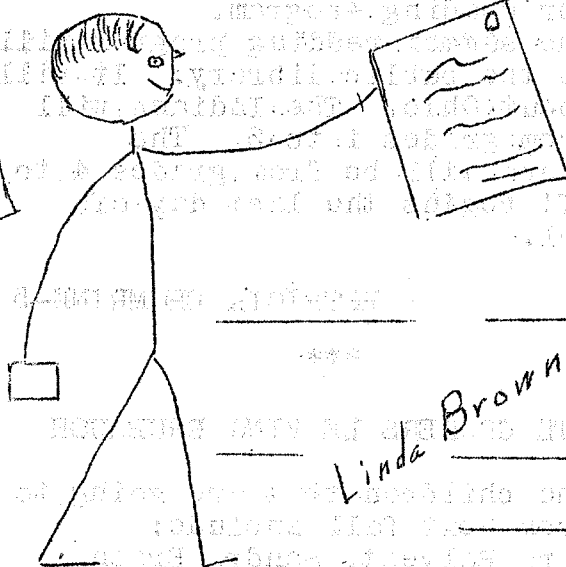
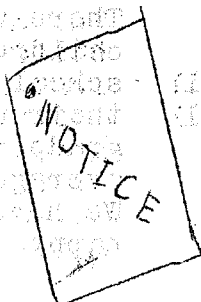
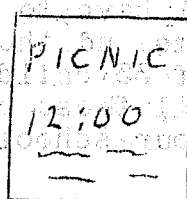
### MEMORIAL DAY

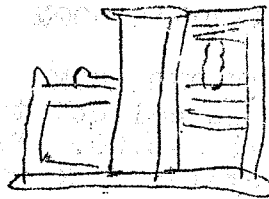
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## JOHN GUTENBERG

This became the first printed alphabet. To make his press he got money from John Fust, a notable goldsmith. When the press was finished Gutenberg didn't pay his debt and Fust sued him. Fust took his equipment and money. Then Gutenberg got money elsewhere and started his business again.

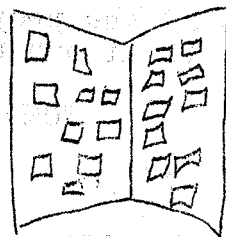

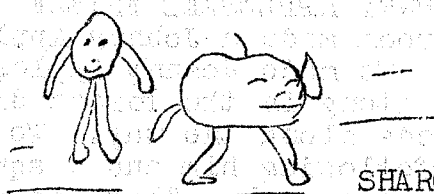
## HEALTH PARADE
