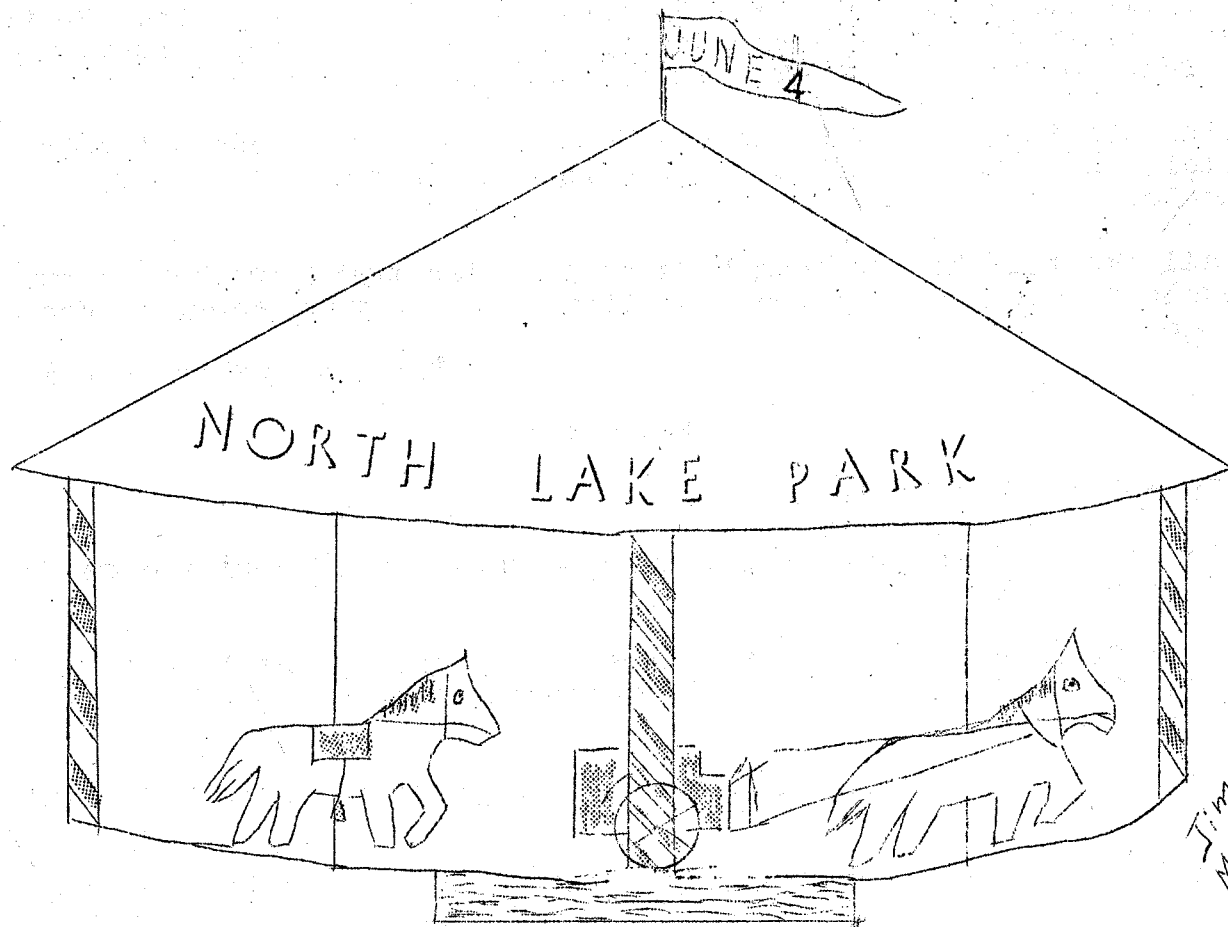

Mr. W. L. Miller

Mr. Miller resigned March 12 and the resignation will be effective August 31 of this year. He has been head of the Mansfield city schools since 1935 or for 19 years. His present contract will expire in 1957.

He said that his plans for the month of September were to go to his country home (just south of Ganges) and sit in a rocking chair.

Mr. Miller was superintendent of schools before coming to Mansfield in Chillicothe from 1929 to 1935 or six and one half years. He was also superintendent in Wayne County, Ohio and Freedom, Pennsylvania for four years. He was at Willard, Ohio for two and one half years.

During his time in office he has helped direct the most extensive building and modernization program in the history of our city schools.

In all the time he has been here he has been trying to better our schools to give us a better education. We are very sorry to see him go.

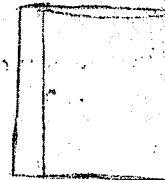
MS. SHERMAN'S ROOMOUR BOOK REPORTS

But I will have to be at school at 8:00 o'clock and I won't get out untill 3:30.

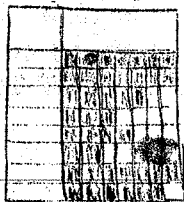

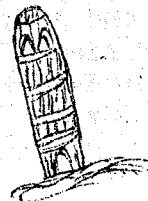


THE LEANING TOWER

The first place winners were Roger Stahl, Linda Pfahler, Clay Bixler, Douglas Leach and Tommy Templeton.

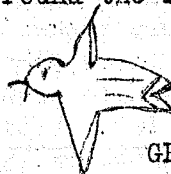

The flag is raised in the morning and lowered at night. It should not be left in the rain.

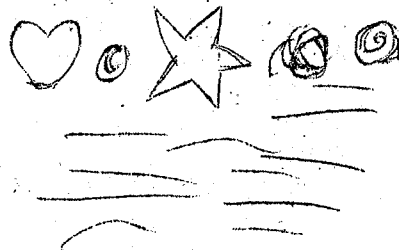
