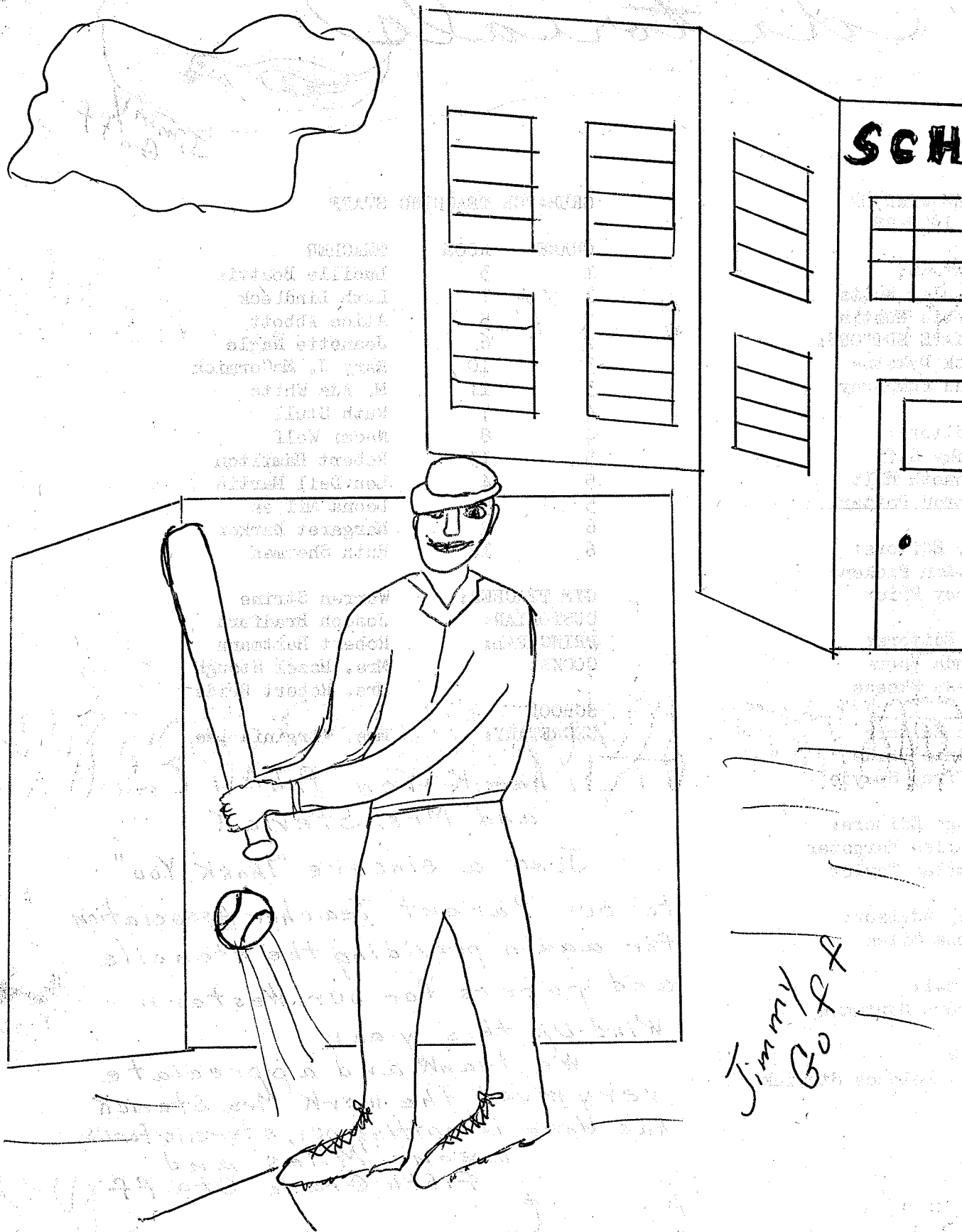
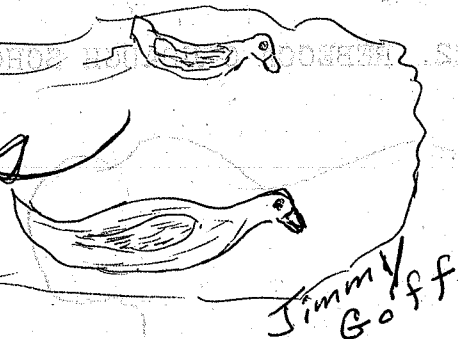

MOTHER'S DAY

Mother's Day is a day set apart every year in honor of mothers. It is the second day in May. The day is celebrated in many churches and by family gatherings. One of the customs of this day is to wear a carnation. A colored carnation means that one's mother is living. A white carnation is worn if one's mother is dead.

A day for honoring mothers was observed many years ago in England. In the United States in 1872 Julia Ward Howe, author of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic", suggested a Mother's Day as a day dedicated to peace.

In 1915 the President was authorized to proclaim Mother's Day as a yearly national observance.

Arbor Day is a day set apart for the planting of trees. It is observed especially by school children. The first Arbor Day was celebrated in Nebraska on April 10, 1872. By that time, settlers had cut down most of the trees in Nebraska. Many trees had been used in building homes or for firewood.

Many had been destroyed in order to clear land for farming. All over the the western plains, a traveler could go for miles without seeing a tree. Arbor Day was the idea of J. Sterling Morton, a newspaper publisher of Nebraska City, Nebraska. People soon began celebrating it throughout the country. Birdsey G. Northrup of Connecticut traveled all over the United States and even to Europe and Asia urging people to plant trees. Every state now celebrates Arbor Day. So do many Canadian provinces and the Territory of Hawaii. In Northern States Arbor Day comes late in April or early May. The Southern states and Hawaii celebrate it at various times from December through March.

Summer the season of the year which in the northern hemisphere generally may be said to comprise the months of June, July and August.

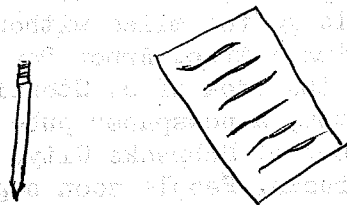
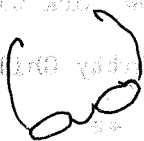

FLAG DAY

Lack of uniformity in the matter of displaying the flag by civilians led to the adoption of a flag code. The National Americanism committee of the American Legion called a conference in Washington, flag day, June 14, 1923, and delegates from 72 patriotic organizations there assembled adopted a universal flag code. Although that code lacked any federal authority it was generally followed. When World War II came congress asked to enact a federal flag code. This was done and on Dec. 22, 1942 the president signed the joint resolution, known as public law 829.

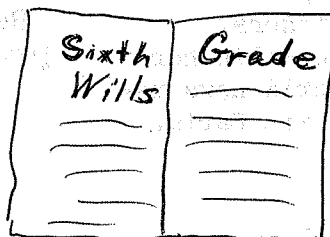

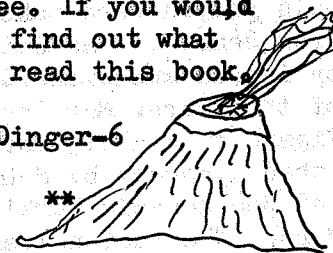


ALL ABOUT VALCANOES AND EARTHQUAKES

A field of war was the square of fortified houses, with a block-house at each corner of the square, in which the Marietta pioneers took refuge during the Indian War from 1791 to 1795. Seventy-two rooms were included in the fortress, which measured one hundred and eighty feet on each side.
