Going through the Greenhouse I saw many different kinds of plants. Mr. Robertson, our guide, said that on an estimate over three hundred plants were growing at Kingwood Center

Greenhouse.

If you have ever wondered how you get two different colored flowers on one stem, it may be because of mother nature's power. But Mr. Robertson told me you might use the budding system.

First you slit the "skin" or bark of the plant. Then you push the bottom of the bud of another plant into the slit and wax it over. This is not hard to do. Many plants have been in the breeding process. The Greenhouse at
